BLESSED SOLANUS CASEY FEAST DAY & NOVENA





HEALTH MINISTRY Prevention of Lyme Disease

Avoid Tick Environmental Areas

The ticks that can transmit Lyme disease prefer areas that are shaded or wooded. Trees, brushy undergrowth, and abundant leaf-litter characterize the areas for ticks. They can also be found in grassy or brushy areas as well. In southwest Michigan, blacklegged ticks have been found in areas characterized by sandy soil, oak or maple dominated tree cover, and an abundance of rodents and white-tailed deer. Areas along the coast of Lake Michigan in northern Michigan (Menominee County, UP) are characteristic of areas with ticks.

Protection includes proper clothing and repellants

- Wear light colored clothing so ticks can be spotted more easily, and removed before attachment
- Wearing long sleeved shirts and pants tucked into socks or boot tops can be helpful in keeping ticks from reaching your skin
- Ticks are usually located close to the ground, so boots or shoes and not sandals, are recommended
- Applying insect repellants such as DEET to clothes and exposed skin, and applying Permethrin (which kills ticks on contact) to
 clothes can reduce the risk of tick attachment (DEET can be used safely on children and adults, but should be applied
 according to label guidelines.)

The transmission of the bacteria that causes Lyme disease from an infected tick is unlikely to occur before 36 hours of tick attachment. Therefore, daily checks for ticks and promptly removing any attached tick will help prevent infection.

Removing the tick

This should be done by using fine-tipped tweezers. **DO NOT** use petroleum jelly, a hot match, nail polish, or other products. Grasp the tick firmly and as closely to the persons skin as possible, pull the tick's body straight up away from the skin. Cleanse the area with an antiseptic. Persons should promptly seek medical attention if they develop any signs and symptoms (see below) of early Lyme disease. Early diagnosis and proper antibiotic treatment of Lyme disease are the best means to avoid the complications of infection and late-stage illness.

Signs and Symptoms

Early Signs and Symptoms (3 to 30 days after a tick bite)

- Fever, chills, headache, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, and swollen lymph nodes
- Erythema migrans (EM) rash:
 - Occurs in approximately 70 to 80 percent of infected persons
 - Begins at the site of a tick bite after a delay of 3 to 30 days (average is about 7 days)
 - Expands gradually over a period of days reaching up to 12 inches or more (30 cm) across
 - May feel warm to the touch but is rarely itchy or painful
 - Sometimes clears as it enlarges, resulting in a target or "bull's eye" appearance
 - May appear on any area of body

Later Signs and symptoms (days to months after tick bite)

- Severe headaches and neck stiffness
- Additional EM rashes on other areas of the body
- Arthritis with severe joint pain and swelling, particularly the knees and other large joints
- Facial palsy (loss of muscle tone or droop on one or both sides of the face)
- Intermittent pain in tendons, muscles, joints, and bones
- Heart palpitations or an irregular heart beat
- Episodes of dizziness or shortness of breath
- Inflammation of the brain and spinal cord
- Nerve pain
- Shooting pains, numbness or tingling in the hands or feet
- Problems with short-term memory

Additional information

- Fever and other general symptoms may occur in the absence of rash.
- A small bump or redness at the site of a tick bite that occurs immediately and resembles a mosquito bite, is common. This irritation generally goes away in 1-2 days and is not a sign of Lyme disease.
- A rash with a very similar appearance to EM occurs with Southern Tick-associated Rash illness (STARI), but is not Lyme disease
- Ticks can spread other organisms that may cause a different type of rash.

A few weeks ago when it was pouring down rain, a kind parishioner I didn't know kept me under her umbrella so I didn't get wet. What are some holy acts of kindness you've experienced this week? Take some time to write them down and then pray to God for those people!

Well, here I am, at it again and hoping that I am not causing too much grief and consternation between myself and our newest staff member here at St. Jane Frances, Ally Hynes. I am sitting to write this article at 2:00pm(ish) on Tuesday, when articles were due at 10:00am. Yikes! Such is the way with me and writing. Staring at a blank screen forever until inspired.

Today (Tuesday) I was in Macomb Twp., for a doctor's appointment and since I was out there, I ran an errand at a church that was across the street, as we get ready for our summer Youth Ministry outing. I try to make a single trip have many purposes and accomplish a couple of different tasks, so I made my list and checked one thing off at a time.

Why bring these things up? As I read this weekend's readings I started to really feel the "plight" of Martha in the Gospel reading. I have a list of things to do that always seems to get added to and made longer. I knock 2-3 things off my list, and suddenly 4-5 things have been added on. I make plans, God chuckles (most of the time I think that I hear guffaws!) and rearranges my plans, to suit His wants and plans for me. Martha was intent on her list of things to do and making sure that they were all attended to, while her sister, Mary, sat at the feet of Jesus listening. Of course I, I mean Martha, began complaining about all that I (she) had on my (her) plate, and lamented the idea that someone would be just sitting there listening to Jesus.

I guess the real question that I have is this: Do I see and hear Jesus when He is talking? Am I seeing Jesus in those that I serve (or am supposed to serve) around me, or am I more concerned with my checklist and making that little satisfying mark, that says, "Yay me, I got another check!"? As we continue growing in and sharing our faith, are we always burdened or feeling that way? If we are, we are not ministering or approaching ministry the right way. We are called to be here for one another, to help and support one another, not to step on our neighbor to get ahead, or nudge them aside to move past them. These thoughts creep through our heads and often times out of our mouths (and NOT in a healthy, shaking the monkey from your back, kinda way).

In our first reading from Genesis, Chapter 18, Abraham RUNS from his tent to offer hospitality to 3 people who happen upon his dwelling. He did this because of who he was, and this was part of the reason that God blessed and promised more blessings upon Abraham. Our second reading is from a writing of Paul to the Colossians. Paul ties all that he is - his works, his sufferings, his very life into the work of the church—Christ's people on Earth. He does his works because it is right to do them, not to "check them off a list", not for "praise and adulation", not to be able to say, "Hey, look at me and what I am doing." He does this because he is fulfilling his Christian "duty", the work that he feels he was put on Earth to do. When we do this, there is no complaining, no comparing ourselves to others.

Ultimately it is our choice alone, how we wish to live our lives, and the consequences (good or bad) of how we lived out our lives is our cross to bear. So we should ask ourselves, do we jump at the chance to be of service to another, and accept the service of others graciously? Do we live our lives for God (for the good)? Do we complain about how much we do and how little others do, or do we *listen* for Jesus in our lives and serve happily even when it is hard, so that others might learn what we already "know"? Do we bear not just our own cross, but assist others with their cross (like Simon of Cyrene helped Jesus with His physical Cross) if we know how to help?

Ally, thank you for your patience! All of the parishioners and guests that read this, thank you for this counseling session! I will work on my ministry to and with you in the future and I hope to see you and work with you on this journey that we partake in towards eternity.

The world is a different place than it was 10 years ago. YouTube had only just started. Facebook was only a few years old. Our goal is draw our digital visitor in deeper so that they eventually want to come into our physical building.
