THIS WEEK'S JERRY-ATRICS



In the Book of Genesis, when we read the account of Noah and the flood, the author of the first book of the Bible writes that God's love for humanity is made known in the form of a rainbow after the deluge which occurred over a period of 40 days and 40 nights. Have you ever wondered how rainbows occur? Scientifically speaking, rainbows happen when sunlight and atmospheric conditions align in just the right way *and* the viewers are positioned in the right place to see this phenomenon. When sunlight shines through water droplets, the light passes through the droplets and the light bends, or refracts, slightly. When the light is bent we see the light in a different way – through a myriad of colors which comprise a rainbow.

As the Creator of Heaven and earth, God is the author of light, both in a physical and a spiritual sense. The Scriptures also tell us that God is love. In a rainbow, we get to see through the refraction of light a glimpse of the glory, the majesty, magnificence and splendor of God. Small wonder then, when someone sees a rainbow, it takes their breath away.

We speak of God as love, but God is also beauty, and thus rainbows, as well as mountains, sunsets, and humans as well, refract the beauty and magnificence of God.

The beauty of God is also reflected in a very specific event. That event is the moment of Jesus' death. The Gospels tell us that at the precise moment Jesus died on the cross, "the veil of the temple was torn from top to bottom". Have you ever wondered what this symbolizes? Scripture scholars argue among themselves as to exactly what this means. Was the tearing of the temple veil the result of the displeasure of God? There is perhaps a different way to interpret this event mentioned in the Gospels.

The veil in the temple separated the people from seeing what went on in the holy of holies (where the Ark of the Covenant and the Ten Commandments which Moses received from God on Mount Sinai) were kept. This was, in effect, God's most sacred space for the people of Israel. The holy of holies, for the people of Israel, was living proof of the presence of God in their lives.

When the temple veil was torn in two, there was no longer the barrier which served to prevent people from getting a clear view of the most sacred site in all Judaism. Thus, the Gospels tell us that, in the crucifixion, when we look at the death of Jesus on the cross, we get a clear look at the holy of holies; namely, we are privileged to see the pure love of God.

In a very real sense, the cross does what a rainbow does, only in a different way. A rainbow refracts light, bending it so we can see the light in a different way. The cross does the same thing - it refracts; it bends the view we have of God. The cross is transformed from an instrument of torture and death to a means of experiencing eternal life. We see, through the cross, the spectacular love, forgiveness, compassion, and selflessness that is God.

We don't often connect the two, the rainbow and the cross, but we should. The physical beauty of refracted light and the moral beauty of the cross reveal different aspects of the same reality; both show us the love of God in living color.

The beauty of God's divinity shines through both the rainbow and the cross. God is light and God is love. Too often in life we fail to make the connection between the physical and the spiritual worlds. The rainbow and the cross both serve to remind us of light and love. When they are refracted, beamed through a particular prism, we come closer to understanding the beauty of God which surrounds and envelops us in some rather surprising ways.

HEALTH MINISTRY Prevention of Lyme Disease

Avoid Tick Environmental Areas

The ticks that can transmit Lyme disease prefer areas that are shaded or wooded. Trees, brushy undergrowth, and abundant leaf-litter characterize the areas for ticks. They can also be found in grassy or brushy areas as well. In southwest Michigan, blacklegged ticks have been found in areas characterized by sandy soil, oak or maple dominated tree cover, and an abundance of rodents and white-tailed deer. Areas along the coast of Lake Michigan in northern Michigan (Menominee County, UP) are characteristic of areas with ticks.

<u>Protection includes proper clothing and repellants</u>

- Wear light colored clothing so ticks can be spotted more easily, and removed before attachment
- Wearing long sleeved shirts and pants tucked into socks or boot tops can be helpful in keeping ticks from reaching your skin
- Ticks are usually located close to the ground, so boots or shoes and not sandals, are recommended
- Applying insect repellants such as DEET to clothes and exposed skin, and applying Permethrin (which kills ticks on contact) to
 clothes can reduce the risk of tick attachment (DEET can be used safely on children and adults, but should be applied according to
 label guidelines.)

The transmission of the bacteria that causes Lyme disease from an infected tick is unlikely to occur before 36 hours of tick attachment. Therefore, daily checks for ticks and promptly removing any attached tick will help prevent infection.

Removing the tick

This should be done by using fine-tipped tweezers. **DO NOT** use petroleum jelly, a hot match, nail polish, or other products. Grasp the tick firmly and as closely to the persons skin as possible, pull the tick's body straight up away from the skin. Cleanse the area with an antiseptic. Persons should promptly seek medical attention if they develop any signs and symptoms (see below) of early Lyme disease. Early diagnosis and proper antibiotic treatment of Lyme disease are the best means to avoid the complications of infection and latestage illness.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Early Signs and Symptoms (3 to 30 days after a tick bite)

- Fever, chills, headache, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, and swollen lymph nodes
- Erythema migrans (EM) rash:
 - Occurs in approximately 70 to 80 percent of infected persons
 - Begins at the site of a tick bite after a delay of 3 to 30 days (average is about 7 days)
 - Expands gradually over a period of days reaching up to 12 inches or more (30 cm) across
 - May feel warm to the touch but is rarely itchy or painful
 - Sometimes clears as it enlarges, resulting in a target or "bull's eye" appearance
 - May appear on any area of body

Later Signs and symptoms (days to months after tick bite)

- Severe headaches and neck stiffness
- Additional EM rashes on other areas of the body
- Arthritis with severe joint pain and swelling, particularly the knees and other large joints
- Facial palsy (loss of muscle tone or droop on one or both sides of the face)
- Intermittent pain in tendons, muscles, joints, and bones
- Heart palpitations or an irregular heart beat
- Episodes of dizziness or shortness of breath
- Inflammation of the brain and spinal cord
- Nerve pain
- Shooting pains, numbness or tingling in the hands or feet
- Problems with short-term memory

Additional information

- Fever and other general symptoms may occur in the absence of rash.
- A small bump or redness at the site of a tick bite that occurs immediately and resembles a mosquito bite, is common. This irritation generally goes away in 1-2 days and is not a sign of Lyme disease.
- A rash with a very similar appearance to EM occurs with Southern Tick-associated Rash illness (STARI), but is not Lyme disease
- Ticks can spread other organisms that may cause a different type of rash.
