We are in the midst of Ordinary Time. What is Ordinary Time?

The definition of Ordinary Time is taken from the Documents on the Liturgy:

"Apart from those seasons having their own distinctive character, (eg. Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter), thirty-three or thirty-four weeks remain in the yearly cycle that do not celebrate a specific aspect of the mystery of Christ. Rather, especially on

the Sundays, they are devoted to the mystery of Christ in all its aspects. This period is known as Ordinary Time."

In our day-to-day lives, we should celebrate that God blesses us and the people with whom we share our gifts and talents. It is in our everyday lives that we see and experience God. However, with the eyes of faith, we must see the experiences of our life as God-given. We are created in the image and likeness of God, and we are called to project those experiences onto others so that they too can see God's hand in their lives.

One example I use often is the food baskets that we prepare for the needy at Christmas and Easter. It is very easy for us to give at those times of the year. The need is always in the forefront of our mind at Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Easter. However, that need is year-round, and exists even during the ordinary times of the year.

Ordinary Time is not all that ordinary. It can be a challenging season. Seasons like Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter already draw us in and point us toward a direction to celebrate a specific aspect of the life of Christ. In the season of Ordinary Time, the onus, or responsibility, is placed on us. We are challenged to see God in our daily lives and to celebrate the Word made flesh. To be disciples of the Lord is to see the Lord's presence in all aspects of our life and in those we come in contact with.

As I mentioned in my homily on the Feast of the Epiphany, we, like the Magi, must look up so we can see the stars. In this New Year, may we see what the Magi saw: namely, the Word made flesh, and how it has come to dwell among us. In this day of social media and all that it means, it is easy for us to communicate without ever making eye contact or speaking a single word. We need to look up, see our brothers and sisters, and become an active player in our society, our Church, and our community.

It is easier, Lord, to see only what is around us: our lives, our homes, our challenges. Forgive us our isolation. Help us to see with your eyes: eyes which notice one another and help us understand. Help us to dream your dream: of communities that reach out and dialogue and where diverse people creatively cooperate. Help us to be people of solidarity and action, so moved by prayer, encounter, and understanding that peace can become a reality. Amen.

## **ORDINARY TIME**

The Christmas season ended recently; we return to Ordinary Time for just a brief period this year. After the lights and carols of Christmas, Ordinary Time can seem so, well, ordinary. But it is in the ordinary days of our ordinary lives that God asks us to build his Kingdom. The lectionary readings during these weeks take us through the life of Christ. Striving to live Jesus' example of love, reconciliation, and healing can transform ordinary moments into ones of charity. Take time this week to look for God in ordinary moments of your life.

Last week, I wrote a little on vocation—God's calling for our lives. When we are called, we begin as a passive participant in an interchange of intercourse. This is not how that

calling can continue; at some point, an answer is required from those who are being called. Think of sitting in a room and hearing your name called out from another area. If we do not answer, we might be called again—or the caller might just give up trying to reach us. Our response is key to determining where, how, and if the exchange, which was initiated by "the caller," will continue.

Look at the Gospel readings that we hear on the weekends. Sometimes we can be confused by the order of the readings we hear from week to week. Just last week, we heard that Andrew, Simon (Peter)'s brother, was one of the disciples of John the Baptist, who followed Jesus to where he lived. Yet, in this week's Gospel, Jesus finds Simon and Andrew fishing with their father. Do we just become confused, throw up our hands, and forget about scripture? Are we paying enough attention during the readings to notice the difference in the stories? Are we hearing the true "calling" that the reading is evoking in each of us? Critical thinking can help us find ways in which these Gospel readings (from different authors) can work together. Last week, John the Baptist pointed out a man to his disciples and told them that man was special. This week, in Mark's Gospel, Jesus comes back to Galilee (after the arrest of the Baptist) and saw one of the men who had sought Him out. Last week, the men sought out Jesus. This week, Jesus, now in the role as Rabbi, sought out what was to become the beginnings of His band of disciples.

In each Gospel, a "calling" is made and a response is given. This week, the men give up their lives as fishermen to become followers of Jesus. Everything that they know, they set aside, and their lives are changed. Our second reading (1 Cor 7:29-31) tells us the world as we know it is moving on. In the early days of Christianity, people were fixated on the "end of the world"—the second coming of the Messiah, an apocalypse. We know that the world did not end, and we look more to the Greek word *apokálypsis* to see that our knowledge of the world has changed. This letter to the Corinthians tells us that we need to be able to set aside what we know and see how "the other side" lives.

The fact is, God has called each of us to a life in Him. The real question is: How do we respond to His call? Do we give up and return to what we know, or do we challenge ourselves to seek out the answer and see how others might perceive the call? Some people need the stability that comes with repetition; if too many "new things" happen, it burns them out! Other people seek out "new experiences" and are bored by repetition. It really is amazing how different each of us is, and how each of our differences are key to making our world work together. I look forward to working with many different people in the future, growing in faith, and understanding with everyone!

Today is my 65<sup>th</sup> birthday. I tell you this not expecting presents or special treatment, but simply to share some reflections about all the time I've spent—49 years—in Church music ministry.

Some people lament each passing year as the birthdays add up, but after playing and singing the music at thousands of funerals for people of all ages, I have a slightly different perspective, and welcome the privilege of waking each and every day, birthdays included. So many people never get the chance to grow old. What have I learned in 65 years? Here's a snapshot:

Always embrace an opportunity to do good things.

**Cherish your parents,** siblings, family, and friends, because you never know when they'll be taken from you. Tell them you love them. Tell them again.

When you wake up each morning, rejoice in the day. Say a prayer of thanks, and let God lead you to where you should go. He knows better than we do.

**Listen to your heart and your head equally.** Where your heart makes you vulnerable, your head will protect. When your head makes you hard and unyielding, your heart will soften you.

Accept every invitation (within reason). You never know where it will lead. I've enjoyed some of my greatest adventures by saying "Yes" to things when I probably had no idea of what I was getting into. A few: getting into the restaurant business, spending two months in Japan at age 16 representing the city of Detroit, grabbing a "tailhook" landing on an aircraft carrier in the Pacific, and planning events like the commissioning of the USS Detroit Navy ship.

**Don't form an opinion** about a person based on what anyone says. Find out for yourself. There are a number of people I wouldn't be long-time friends with, had I not taken the opportunity to get to know them.

**Professional musician advice:** Whatever your age, prepare your will, trust, and/or estate. Leave instructions regarding your funeral arrangements. No one will know about that one special song or reading if you don't tell them. I've known of several wonderful people who wanted Church funerals but never got them. Yes, you can tell me your songs, but first provide that info to your family.

**People will not often remember** what you said, how you acted, or what you did, but they *will* remember how you made them feel.

Accept the fact that not everyone will like you. If you run across those folks, be nice to them anyway.

When someone is mean or slights you, and you're tempted to retaliate, consider that they may have just gotten some very bad news or received a serious health diagnosis. You don't know what shoes they are walking in.

**Consider adoption!** I believe pets are God's directives about love and true loyalty. I lost my dear Pudge in mid-December and swore "no more dogs!" That lasted three days. Little Marcus was abandoned and needed a good home. He is adorable and helping to heal my heart.

**Those golden years might not be so golden.** Time takes a toll on your body and doesn't cooperate as you "wait" to enjoy everything down the road. Ask any senior about that long-dreamed-of trip or cruise, project, book they wanted to write, or degree they wanted to get that they now can't due to health issues.

Enjoy life now. Today. It is truly God's most precious gift.

## SAINT SPOTLIGHT: ST. PAULA

The patron saint of widows, Paula was a wealthy Roman, widowed with five children at age 32. Another widow introduced her to St. Jerome, a priest and papal secretary to St. Damasus. Jerome became her spiritual director, urging a life of asceticism and charity. When he learned she was fluent in Greek, he enlisted her help in translating Greek biblical texts for his new Latin version of the Bible. Paula had joined the circle of



nobility-born women in Jerome's orbit, and followed him to the Holy Land when he left Rome. She taught herself Hebrew, and exhausted her wealth building a monastery, three convents, and a hospital in Bethlehem.
