We are stewards—caretakers of all God has given us.

To be a steward is to care for that which we do not own.

When God made the world, He "looked at everything he had made, and found it very good" (Gen 1:31). God gave people the responsibility to care for His creation and each other.

"As Christian stewards, we receive God's gifts gratefully, cultivate them responsibly, share them lovingly in justice with others, and return them with increase to the Lord" (USCCB, *Pastoral Letter on Stewardship*).

Our stewardship shows our respect for God, our Creator.

When I was growing up, I learned to reduce, reuse, and recycle. In my community, newspaper drives were common—but people all over the nation and the world help care for the world in different ways.

In the Athabaskan culture (native Alaskans), people "don't just hunt to take an animal; they hunt to feed their family, and then they would never take more than they need. More would be disrespectful to the Creator who provided all that for you in the first place" (Br. Bob Ruzicka, *OFM in The Alaskan Shepherd*).

Efforts to reduce, reuse, and recycle are important. But in our global society, there is so much more at stake.

"Our common home is falling into serious disrepair" (Pope Francis).

"We are all in the same boat. We need to develop the awareness that nowadays we are either all saved together or no one is saved" (Pope Francis, *Fratelli tutti*).

The earth faces intense pollution of its land, air, and water. Clean water is not available for many of the world's poor. Forests that cleanse our air of carbon dioxide are being cut down at astonishing rates. Many species of animals are either endangered or already extinct. Landfills overflow with the trash of a society that has too much. And if landfills aren't available, our waste is dumped at sea or transported to other countries. The climate is warming. So long as the environment is in danger, people's lives and livelihoods, especially those of the poor, are in danger.

We must all take responsibility for the needs of the poor and of the world in which we live.

St. Francis of Assisi "shows us just how inseparable the bond is between concern for nature, justice for the poor, commitment to society, and interior peace" (Pope Francis, *Laudato Si'*). "The goods of the earth were created by God to be used wisely by all. They must be shared equitably in accordance with justice and charity" (*Compendium of the Social Documents of the Church*).

What we do today affects the generations of tomorrow. "The world exists for everyone, because all of us were born with the same dignity. Differences of color, religion, talent, place of birth or residence, and so many others, cannot be used to justify the privileges of some over the rights of all" (Pope Francis, *Fratelli tutti*). Jesus reminds us, "Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give" (Mt 10:8).

As Catholics, we must educate ourselves about the crises our planet faces and take steps to fix them. We must practice eco-friendly, sustainable methods of living. We must hold governments and corporations accountable for their environmental impact. And we must listen to science and evidence to learn how our way of living has hurt our shared home.

Triune God, help us to hear the cry of those in poverty, and the cry of the earth, so that we may together care for our common home (USCCB, Prayer to Care for Our Common Home).

How can I make this world a better place for future generations? What decisions and actions can I take at home and in the workplace that will affect the needs of the poor and of our shared world?

Let's spend this week thinking about it.

Fr. Tony Sulkowski Pastor FrTony@sjfparish.org Ext. 102 Some have expressed an interest in praying the Liturgy of the Hours, more commonly known as the breviary. This is a wonderful prayer form that invites its readers to prayerfully reflect upon

the Psalms and to pray for the universal Church. However, before you go out and buy the four-volume set and try to navigate through it, I would like to direct you to two websites that will give you the opportunity to view the layout of the breviary. Give it a try; it may become your form of prayer.

The two sites are **catholicexchange.com** and **ebreviary.com**. These websites also have the new translation of the 1975 Liturgy of the Hours. I hope you find them helpful.

The Church has many prayer forms that are tailored to everyone's spirituality. Of all the prayer forms that are available, the Liturgy of the Hours is the prayer of the Church. It is the prayer said by priests, religious people, and some laity every day for the Church, and unities those who say it with the global universal Church.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church says that the "Liturgy of the Hours, which are like an extension of the Eucharistic celebration, does not exclude but rather in a complementary way calls forth the various devotions of the People of God, especially adoration and worship of the Blessed Sacrament" (CCC 1178).

The Liturgy of the Hours—or the divine office, as it is more commonly known is devised in such a way that the whole course of the day and night is made holy by the praise of God. "In this 'public prayer of the Church,' the faithful, (clergy, religious, and lay people) exercise the royal priesthood of the baptized. Celebrated by the Church, the Liturgy of the Hours 'is truly the voice of the Bride herself addressed to her Bridegroom. It is the very prayer of Christ himself together with the Body addresses to the Father'" (CCC 1174).

The important aspect of any prayer or prayer form is that it calls us and invites us into a deeper relationship with God. A prayer form that works for you may not work for me, and vice versa. I ask that, as I pray for you, that you will also remember me in prayer. We are on this journey together; may we support each other in prayer.

We've been celebrating the memories of our loved ones, both family and friends, JJacobs@sjfparish.org during the month of November. I'd like for you to especially remember Brad Wilson, for whom we've prayed these last few months.

Sadly, Brad died October 9, 2020, which was also his mom Linda's birthday. Some might see this as tragic, but it's just another reminder of the life cycle of birth and death.

Brad was a very creative and spiritual person, an artist, musician, computer whiz, and could craft some mean garments and shoes. Brad's parents own the home in the Keys that I've frequently visited over the last 20 years. Palm trees, bougainvillea, and schefflera abound, but no orchids, which do grow abundantly in that climate.

When someone goes home to the Lord, we often see signs from them that they are okay. After my dad Buck died in July 2009, there were a few things I saw and heard in the months afterward that astounded me. A few days ago, Linda, Brad's mother, posted this:

"We had just gotten to Big Pine Key last week for some R&R. Our yard man told our friend who stays at the house through the winter that there was an orchid growing under the picnic table behind the house. Brad has raised and tended many orchids over the years, as he had a green thumb. He could grow anything! I have never seen one like this in our 44 years on Big Pine Key—very tiny, about the size of a nickel. I think Brad sent it, because it wasn't there when we were the week before. It's a Eulophia orchid, commonly known as a corduroy orchid. Brad sewed so many of his creations with corduroy! I will treasure this orchid that I feel he sent us. He was a magical kind of being."



I believe the clues are there from our loved ones. We simply have to be aware and watch for them. And with that, I must also share something else: over the past months, I've been in cleaning and purging mode. When my brother Michael died in October 2018, I took in many of his things, because his son and daughter had no room to store them. Last week, I was going through boxes, and discovered a true treasure: two yellow spiral notebooks that chronicled my dad's thoughts and feelings from 1984, after my mom died, through 2003. There were many great memories—and some painful ones, too.

Lesson to be learned: when one half of a couple passes on, please, please, do check in on the surviving person. Their loneliness is overwhelming. Make a phone call, write a card, send an email—anything to let them know you are thinking of them. And don't be afraid to remember the person who died with a memory or story. I visited my dad often, but had I known the depth of his loneliness, I'd have checked in on him even more frequently. The good news is, he did find love and companionship after a while. Even so, he still loved my mother deeply, and never stopped remembering.


