Recently, someone saw my chalice and asked me what the history was behind it. The sacristans who set up for Mass have seen the names on my chalice. However, I realized that most of the congregation has not seen it, and may not even know that every priest has his own chalice.

My chalice was given to me by my mother's side of the family, the Jakubiak family, in 1985 at our annual family reunion.

Prior to them purchasing the chalice, I had two requests with regard to it: that it be simple and not ornate, and that it not be too expensive.

On the stem of the chalice is the symbol of wheat. The base of the chalice has a small cross. The names engraved on the base are of those people who have had an impact upon my life and my preparation for the priesthood:

- Anthony and Mary Jakubiak, my grandparents,
- Daniel Harland, my cousin who died at the age of 4,
- 🕆 Anthony Sulkowski Sr., my father,
- Phyllis Sulkowski, my mother,
- ⊕ and Esther Flores, a woman who was like a second mother to me.
- ⊕ On the bottom of the chalice is the initials R.M.F., a good friend.

Every time I preside at the Eucharistic celebration I remember those who have gone before me. I thank God for their influence on my life and my priesthood. All of us have the responsibility to invite people to consider a vocation in the Church—parents, church members, community members, friends, and relatives. Each of us shares in building up the Body of Christ. Case in point: in 2030, there will be 100 less priests to serve the parishes within the Archdiocese of Detroit. I believe that God has already touched the hearts of many people and pointed them to a vocation in the church. The issue is that we have not encouraged them.

As we journey through this season of Ordinary Time, may we always pray for vocation—that God will touch the minds and hearts of men and women and encourage them to respond to and share their gifts with the Church. God always calls; the challenge is that we have to respond to His call.

Sunday of the Word of God

Today, because of the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, we hear from Luke's Gospel—but normally this liturgical year, we hear from Matthew's Gospel. God in His goodness and the Church in her wisdom give us plenty to feast upon when we hear the Scriptures proclaimed in the Liturgy of the Word.

The Gospel: Our Sunday Gospels follow a 3-year cycle. Matthew's Gospel is known for his sermon on the mount (which we will begin hearing from next week) which portrays Jesus as the new Moses, going up the mountain to teach and deliver the law of the new covenant. We pray Matthew's version of the Our Father at Mass. In Christian art, Matthew is often portrayed as the human face, using imagery associated with each Evangelist from the prophet Ezekiel (1:10) and the Book of Revelation (4:7).

The First Reading: While the Gospel readings follow a sequence from week to week, unique Old Testament readings are paired with each Gospel. Sometimes the reason for this is easy to discern, and sometimes it is more challenging! Making these connections is one of the tasks of the homilist, so pray for those who preach the word. The Church has paired the readings together to show us some aspect of Jesus visible in the Old Testament. Often this is a miracle or parable, but sometimes it is an identity, like priest, prophet, king, redeemer, or beloved son.

Read today's first reading and Gospel again with family or friends and ask: how do the prophet Malachi (3:1-4) and the Evangelist Luke (2:22-40) describe the Lord's coming to the Temple? How is the Christ-child both a purifying fire and a light to the nations? God was present in the Temple, but where is He present in the Church today: in the word? In the Sacrament of the altar? In the tabernacle? In the hearts of each person?

The month of February is dedicated to the <u>Holy Family</u>. This year, the first 25 days of February fall during the liturgical season known as <u>Ordinary Time</u> which is represented by the liturgical color green. "Green, the symbol of hope, is the color of the sprouting seed and arouses in the faithful the hope of reaping the eternal harvest of heaven, especially the hope of a glorious resurrection" (CatholicCulture.org). It is a time that the Church recalls the example of the Holy Family for us to emulate in our families. Although February is the shortest month, it gives us the opportunity to spend quality time as a family. How will you emulate the Holy Family? Will you come to church as a family? Will you pray together? Can you help your neighbor in the cold of winter? How can you show the love of Christ?

What will you do as a family? How will you prepare? This may be the time to reflect and listen in quiet meditation.

Here you can access an online Bible, see many documents from the Bishops of the United States, read and study the Catechism of the Catholic Church, order books, etc.

Time to back ourselves up (chronologically, that is) in the life of Jesus. We shift our focus back to the infancy of Jesus as this week we celebrate the Presentation of the Lord. In Jesus' time, this was about 40 days or so after a child's birth. This child's parents presented the child to God and to the community in the temple.

When do we "present" things? The Gospel mentions purification and a time of purification being completed. When we make a presentation of some sort, don't we try to eliminate the weak points of an argument, or at least strengthen our knowledge in whatever it is that we are presenting? Some people may have an innate ability for presentations, but they have still spent time preparing themselves through schooling and studying to have the knowledge to be able to present an idea.

Our first reading from this weekend speaks of the refining of gold and silver. Now, we must remember that when this was done in biblical time, it was most often done by a single craftsman by heating a mix of materials, letting the heavier "precious metal" sink to the bottom of their container, then scraping off the "junk" that wasn't precious metal. After doing this, they could look at the cooling material, and as the material became purer and purer (more and more of the precious metal alone, with no "junk" mixed in), the craftsman was actually able to see themself in the metal, like we see ourselves in the mirror.

I now jump to our second reading, where Paul (in his letter to the Hebrews) speaks of our tests, our fires, and our getting ready for our presentation. Paul reminds us that Jesus became like us, wholly—in body and mind. He suffered and persevered to show us that it can be done. He lived, He died and He joined God in eternity once again. When we work our way through our own trials, whatever they may be, and make our way out the other side, we allow the preciousness of our "godliness" settle into our depths, and let the "junk" that isn't what God wants us to be, rise to the top to be scraped away. This happens over and over in our lives, and we choose to either allow the junk to be scraped off or to hold on to that junk.

The goal for us, when we present ourselves before God at that final judgement, is that THE Craftsman (God) will be able to see Himself clearly in us, that we will be the precious metal, pure and perfect, that He made us to be.
