> Praying for the sick is one of the seven Corporal Works of Mercy. Praying for those who are ill reminds us that we belong to a community—and we continue to lift up those in

When we celebrate the World Day of the Sick, let us be mindful and lift up in our prayers not only the infirmed, but also those who care for them. I share with you a prayer I recite every day:

> O Lord. I lift up in prayer all those people who are most in need of your attention today.

This prayer is a reminder to me that others are more in need of God's attention than I am.

LENT IS COMING: ASH WEDNESDAY SPRINKLING

While it seems it was just yesterday that we celebrated Christmas, Lent begins early this year with **Ash Wednesday on February 17, 2021.**

We will celebrate Ash Wednesday Mass at 8:00am and 6:00pm. The 6:00pm Mass will be livestreamed. There will also be two opportunities to receive ashes at a Liturgy of the Word at 12:15pm and 4:00pm.

Ash Wednesday will be different this year, as so many of our celebrations have been, due to the pandemic. The Vatican Congregation for Divine Worship released a set of procedures for priests around the world to follow for the distribution of ashes as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to affect our daily lives.

The usual method of receiving ashes will be altered. The priest will use the Roman Missal formula just once, before all those assembled, saying either "Repent and believe in the Gospel" or "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return." Those in attendance will then form lines (as has been done in the past), and, when they approach the priest or minister, they will have a small amount of ashes sprinkled on the head. They will not have the sign of the cross formed in ashes on the forehead. Neither the minister nor the receiver of ashes will speak. Sprinkling ashes on the top of people's heads, rather than marking foreheads with ashes, is the customary practice at the Vatican and in Italy. Given the spread of COVID-19, sprinkling ashes has the advantage of not requiring the priest or minister to touch multiple people.

While our ashes will not be as visible this year, their message remains the same: we are creatures of the earth—"Remember that you are dust"—and our earthly lives will pass away. But we are also a baptized people on a journey to "turn away from sin and be faithful to the Gospel." At the liturgy of Ash Wednesday, we receive ashes and hear Matthew's Gospel, which explains that we are to cultivate three Lenten practices: fasting/abstinence, prayer, and almsgiving. These practices provide a structure for our penitential season. As we hear the message and receive the sprinkled ashes on our foreheads, may we embark on a Lent that brings us ever-closer to our loving and merciful God.

LENTEN REFLECTION BOOKS

Both the Little Black Books and two Lenten reflection books are available in the Gathering Space this weekend. The Little Black Book contains six-minute reflections on the Sunday Gospels of Lent (Cycle B). The reflections begin February 14, 2021 and continue through Easter Sunday.

We also have a supply of two other booklets this year: *Embrace This Holy Season* by Joseph F. Sica and *Mending Our Hearts* by Alice Camille. The booklets contain daily reflections from Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday. These booklets are a great resource for learning more about your faith and deepening your relationship with Jesus through prayer.

Suggested donation for each of the books is \$1.

INTERNATIONAL DAY OF PRAYER AND AWARENESS AGAINST HUMAN TRAFFICKING

With encouragement from Pope Francis, the Pontifical Council for Justice and Peace and the International Union of Superiors General designated February 8th as an annual day of prayer, reflection, and action against human trafficking. On this day, we remember and pray for survivors and victims of modern-day enslavement. We pray that we may work together to remove the causes of this disgraceful scourge that is present in all our cities and neighborhoods.

February 8th is also the feast day of St. Josephine Bakhita. Born in the Darfur region of Sudan in 1869, St. Bakhita was kidnapped and enslaved as a child. Eventually, she was sold to an Italian diplomat and taken to Italy, where she valiantly asserted her freedom with the help of the Cannossian Sisters of Venice. Through her faith, St. Bakhita realized the promise of liberty inherent in the human spirit. She lived out the rest of her life as a Cannossian sister, sharing her empowering testimony of human freedom and dignity.

In this Fifth Week of Ordinary time, I ponder where to go in writing. I have no less than a half a dozen beginnings to this article, none of which made it past three sentences. I have written on

Baptism, on vocation, on answering our vocational call, and on shifting perspectives to better understand the things that go on around us. I do not want to be preachy, or sound arrogant, or be someone to "tell you how it is." I am only a simple thinker in the same world as each of you. What can I possibly talk about that would be of interest?

The simplicity of faith. We live in a world where people like to be right. People don't like being wrong, and they will argue and argue to prove that they aren't. The world wants us to believe that "I" am the most important, and that "I" am the be all, end all. But our faith teaches us that *God* is the be all and end all—the Alpha and Omega, and the beginning and end. God, our creator, wants us to be happy. How many parents ever wanted to have miserable children? People desire happiness and contentment, but they also need challenge, encouragement, and goals to reach for. God is the one who can, and does, provide all of these for each of us.

Our first reading, from the book of Job (7:1-4, 6-7), takes place just after the adversary's challenge to God—that Job only worships Him because of His protection. Job does a good job staying positive (at first), but just like any other human being, he needs to get his frustrations out. We each need to take care in choosing who to tell our frustrations to. Some will tell us what we want to hear. Some will offer words, but not much else. Only the good friend will tell us the truth and help us out of the ditch that we dig for ourselves. This truth is not always easy to hear. It is rarely what we *want* to hear—rather, it is what we *need* to hear! I hope that each of us not only has friends such as these, but that we also heed their counsel.

Paul writes, in 1 Corinthians 9, of preaching the Good News of Jesus—not because he "deserves" to, but rather because he is obliged to. Each of us should heed Paul's example and know that we are all called to share this Good News with others. We may not be eloquent or know all that there is to know, but we each hold an understanding that can help someone else. We need to be the friend who speaks the truth to others. We can share what we know in order to help someone get out of situations that we may once have found ourselves in. We can be a shoulder to cry on. We can simply listen and check in on someone—and in doing so, let them know that we are there.

Jesus was able to do many amazing things while here on earth, and He left us, each of us, to care for His Church. Am I able to continue His mission to bring others closer to God? Have I been diligent in working to further God's Kingdom on earth? These are but a few questions to ponder as I enter the week and get closer to the Lenten season. I hope you will ponder them with me, and I look forward to seeing what we can do to further Jesus' mission to those we see!

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COVID-19 VACCINES: THE FACTS

We are all very tired of this pandemic. We have been masking and social distancing for months now, but the virus is still spreading. Now, vaccines that prevent the Coronavirus disease are available, and they are the best hope we have for ending the pandemic and getting back to some kind of normal.

COVID-19 can cause severe illness and lead to death in some people. There is no way to know how COVID-19 will affect you. If you are infected with the Coronavirus, you can spread the disease to family, friends, and those around you. The COVID-19 vaccine helps protect you by creating an antibody response in your body against the virus without your having to become sick with COVID-19. The vaccine may prevent you from getting COVID-19. If you do get COVID-19, vaccination can help prevent serious illness, long-term complications, or death.

In Michigan, the Pfizer vaccine is most readily available. The Pfizer vaccine was tested in about 40,000 people, was found to be safe and effective, and prevented serious illness in about 95% of people who received the vaccination. It does have side effects, although not everyone experiences them. Most side effects are mild, including pain and redness at the injection site, fever, fatigue, and body aches that last one to two days. There are reports of an allergic reaction immediately after the vaccine. Most vaccination sites observe people for 15-20 minutes after they get the vaccine to monitor for an allergic reaction.

The Pfizer vaccine requires two doses administered about 21 days apart. There is some immunity given after the first dose, but the full 95% immunity only occurs after the second dose is administered. There is no cost to you to get the vaccine. The vaccine is provided by the federal government. They will also cover administration costs if your insurance does not.

Some Catholics are concerned about the origin of the cells that were used to develop and test the vaccine. However, the Vatican's doctrinal office stated that it is "morally acceptable" for Catholics to receive the vaccination and that the "grave danger" of spreading the Coronavirus outweighs concerns about how the vaccine was developed. Pope Francis has said that Catholics have a moral obligation to take the COVID-19 vaccination: "It is the moral choice because it is about your life, but also the lives of others."

Where can you get vaccinated? Right now, health care workers, people over 65, and those with underlying health conditions that make them high risk are eligible for the vaccine. Health Departments in Macomb County (586-463-8777) and Oakland County (800-848-5533) have the vaccine available for people who live or work in their communities. Southeast Michigan Health Systems (Beaumont, Henry Ford, Ascension, DMC) have the vaccine available for established patients. Meijer pharmacies are also now making appointments for vaccination—call your local Meijer for registration information. Supplies are limited, so be patient. It will take time for everyone to be immunized.

Most importantly, it will take time for vaccinations to have a significant impact on COVID-19 infection rates. In the meantime, **it is important to wear a mask**, **practice social distancing, and maintain good hygiene, even after getting the vaccine**. We will get through this!

Many local establishments have been hit hard during the COVID-19 pandemic. While we won't be serving our dinners, we hope you'll enjoy a meal from one of your favorite local restaurants. This way, we will all be working to help the local economy during these trying times.
