THE IMPORTANCE OF THE 2020 CENSUS

Everyone deserves to be counted. Our shared faiths teach us that every person is created with equal dignity by God. That means everyone deserves to be counted by their government. The Census is completely confidential. When you fill out the Census survey, your personally identifiable information will not be shared outside the Census Bureau.

Our community benefits from everyone being counted. Over \$800 billion in annual federal funding is distributed based on the 2020 Census for vital community services such as hospitals, fire departments, schools, roads, job training centers, senior centers, and police departments. It also determines how many Representatives each state has in Congress. Our Congressional and state legislative districts are redrawn using census data. If we get undercounted, we get underfunded and underrepresented.

As a consequence of systemic racism, people of color have historically been undercounted in the Census. In the 2010 Census, 3.7 million African Americans and 3.8 million Hispanics were not counted. The legacy of racist systems which have privileged white communities with access to capital and education have contributed to people of color being harder to count. Ensuring everyone is counted in the 2020 Census is a matter of racial justice long overdue. Thus, we have a legal and moral responsibility to participate in the Census. Part of looking out for our community is ensuring that we have the resources we need to thrive. We have a responsibility to participate in the Census. Our families, children and neighbors are counting on us. We must work to ensure that everyone in our community is counted.

Completing the Census is easy, and you can get help or support. The 2020 Census will be the first high-tech Census with an online response option. 80% of households will receive a postcard from the Census Bureau in the mail which includes a link to the official 2020 Census website and a unique identification code. With the identification code, you can answer the 11 questions online. If you do not respond online or by phone, a paper questionnaire will be sent to you which can be filled out and mailed back to the Census Bureau. If you do not respond to that, individual Census workers may come to your door to collect your responses. The other 20% of households—mostly those with older adults and low broadband access and internet usage—will be sent the actual survey to be completed and returned by mail, along with a unique identification code to respond online.

IMPORTANT CENSUS DATES

March 2020: Census Bureau mails or drops off Census packages at every residential address.

March 16—April 20, 2020: Self-response phase of the Census.

April 1, 2020: Census Day.

May 13—July 2020: Primary Nonresponse Follow-up (NRFU) operations encompassing occupied housing that did not self-respond. (Early NFRU operations begin April 9, 2020 for areas with significant off-campus college student populations.)

Summer 2020: Census wraps up.

By December 31, 2020: Congressional reapportionment determined; state population totals sent to the President.

We began preparing our "2020 Vision" with Mission 2020, learning to see your walk with Christ & how to tell your story. Now, we begin the next step: **Growing in 2020: Tell Your Story!** Visit sjfparish.org/Mission2020 for more information.

The Mission 2020 experience brought wonderful testimonials from Debbie and Peter Herbeck about their walk with Christ. We learned how God was present in Debbie's life, leading her conversion from her Jewish roots to Catholicism. Through her story, we found that God works through tragedy, cultural challenges, small signs, and great connections with other people. We saw clearly how her story would inspire and evangelize, just like our stories can do.

Peter also shared his story—one of a Catholic family struggling with alcoholism and the journey to true freedom in the love and light of Christ. Peter shared a moment of grace that transformed his entire family, bringing them back to God and an understanding of how important it is to have dependence on God, not ourselves. His story reinforced how God works through His people.

On Tuesday, Fr. Tony shared his story, inspiring us to bring to God what we have and to know that all of it is of God and reflects His love and mercy.

All three stories provide us a clear view of how God works in each life through different circumstances, bringing the people of God to help us see God's glorious light. Now it is time for us to reflect on our Mission 2020 experience. It may be that we don't take the time to really think about our story; we must identify how God has worked in our lives and how a relationship with Jesus provides the ability to persevere in a world that is both joyful and hopeful and scary and hopeless. Now is a good time to explore how Jesus rejoices with us in the good times, encourages us, and strengthens us in darkness.

Once you have a clear view of Christ's presence in your life, focus on how to tell your story and bringing others to know Christ and His Good News. Peter gave us some things to think about in creating our story, suggesting that it be told in 30 seconds—the length of a quick conversation. He talked about how important it is to mine our histories, to recall our lives before our relationship with and dependence on God, and how we changed after that relationship was formed. Finally, he asked us to formulate a response to "Why am I Catholic?"

From this point forward, through Lent, we shift from Matthew's Gospel to the Gospel of John. I find it interesting that, while similar, these two Gospels were written about 20—30 years apart (Matthew being the earlier version). Not a big deal, right? Well, when you look at the historical climate of that time, it becomes a bigger deal.

This period saw a few major revolts against the Roman government, the destruction of the temple in Jerusalem, and the Jewish people fleeing and/or being forced out of Jerusalem proper. These speak to the tone differences in each of the Gospel writings and can help us understand why and to whom the writings were made. The Gospel according to John was written in an era and to a people who needed a strong Theological (Godunderstanding) root and basis for their faith; enter, the woman at the well.

Think of being in a desert-like climate, where midday temperatures can reach into the hundreds. Dry heat (unlike our humid heat) is super dangerous in that your body's moisture content goes away *very* quickly, and heat exhaustion or heat stroke can occur with very little physical warning signs. People who live in this area will schedule their lives to avoid the hottest part of the day. But this Samaritan woman was making her way to the village well to haul heavy buckets back to her house. Just like the "water cooler" of today's offices, the well was often the place to gather, share, and talk with your neighbors—but she was there alone. Now add on the fact that a *Jewish* rabbi freely started a conversation with a woman who belonged to a group of people that had historic issues with the Jewish authorities. This is a heap of "anything can go wrong here." But Jesus defies convention again, in a very telling Theological lesson (for me at least)!

Luke's Gospel (commonly thought to be written to non-Jewish Christians around the Greek area) tells the story of the Good Samaritan, an "outsider" who helps a beaten man. To me, the writer of John's Gospel (written later than Luke's) brings us together, not as Jewish and non-Jewish (Gentile) Christians, but simply as Christians. Jesus gives us the example of being the ones to begin the healing. We are the ones who are called to re-unify, to bridge division, and to rejoin people who have been apart. We are called to share this good news that Jesus came to free us all from sin, not just a select few. Jesus even accepted the invitation to stay with this community of "outcasts" and share God's message with them. Isn't that the supreme example of what we are called to do, each one of us, in our own way?

I hope this Lent finds you well. I'll see you as we journey along this Lenten path together!

ABOUT THE GOSPEL: Jesus has a conversation with a Samaritan woman at a well. He tells the woman that he can give her living water so she will never be thirsty again. Jesus reveals that he is the Messiah, and the woman spreads Jesus' Good News to others.


