Fr. T's Tidbits: Fall is in the Air

Today's Gospel shows us two people who could not be further apart in their stations in life: the rich man and Lazarus. The rich man had everything he wanted; Lazarus had nothing. But the contrast is just as stark after they die. Now Lazarus has everything he ever wanted, resting in the "bosom of Abraham." The rich man has only suffering, living in torment. The divider between the sides has changed as well. Where once it was a door, which could have easily been opened, now it is a great chasm, impossible to cross. I'm certain the rich man truly wishes he had crossed the doorway when he had the chance!

When the rich man was living the high life, he chose to be ignorant and dismissive of those outside his mansion. It seems that he becomes aware of Lazarus only after he dies. It is only when the rich man is suffering that he opens his heart to others, asking for his surviving brothers to be warned. Abraham tells him it is, essentially, too late. His brothers have the same prophets to listen to as the rich man did. They probably won't listen any more than the rich man did.

It is easy to fall into the trap of the rich man, being comfortable enough to be complacent to the needs of others and to ignore the plight of the poor. But we as Christians are called to see God in our neighbor, in the stranger, in each other, in those who are approachable, who are visible, who can be seen, just like Lazarus. Too often we overlook these people entirely or overlook God within them. The rich man failed to see Lazarus until it was too late, even though he was right before his very eyes.

In your prayer and reflection this week, consider who you fail to see who might need assistance and compassion. This week, take the time and make the effort to see God in their faces.



Worship & Music



As you know, St. Jane has been a leader in developing new strategies for Unleash the Gospel. Truth is, I believe music has been accomplishing that for years. Pretty much everyone loves music, at least some form of it, and its essence can be used to inspire people within our Catholic faith.

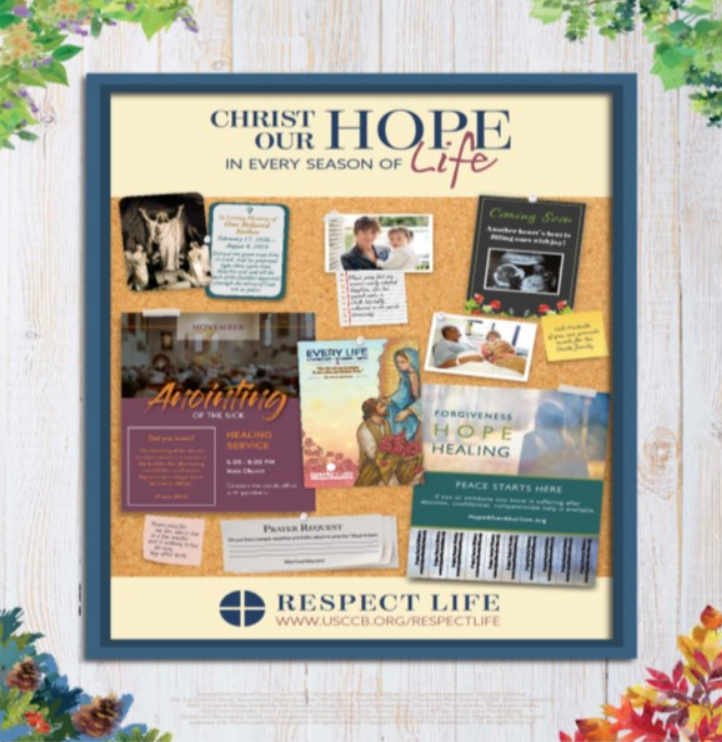
Imagine, if you will, Sunday Mass without music. It would seem odd, even though we would still celebrate the beauty of the Mass. When you go to other churches, you'll note that every parish has its own feel and sound, every Music Minister his or her own style. Is one better than the other? Who's to say? It all depends upon preference, what you grew up with, or with what you feel more comfortable.

Personally, I see music as evangelization. Many of you know that I am involved in so many different endeavors but I use those opportunities to spread the word of what I do here in church. If I am playing golf or busy at my restaurant, and people ask me what else I do, I tell them I am a professional musician and Director of Music at St. Jane...then tell them exactly what it entails. Most people have no clue what we Music Ministers do, so I use that time to educate, to give them a greater understanding of what happens in church every week. I then invite them to come by sometime to see for themselves. And surprise, quite often they do! You have to get people in the door so they can experience our welcoming community. Try it sometime.

To spread the good news, you don't have to be a great speaker or orator or dynamo. All you need is passion and an 'elevator pitch' (30 seconds or less) to let folks know you are proud to be part of a wonderful church.

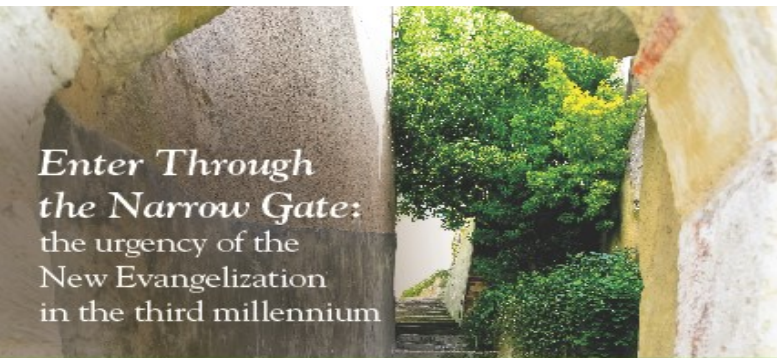

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF NEXT WEEK, IN PREPARATION FOR MASS:

- ✝ How do you grow every day? Are you getting bigger? Healthier? More faith filled? What do you have to do to grow in these ways?
- ✝ Who do you trust? Are you trustworthy? What can we trust about Jesus?
- ✝ Do you have a good friend? Do you talk to them about lots of things? Do you take time to talk to God and Jesus?



In this week's readings, I heard instructions for life in Paul's letter to Timothy, and warnings from the Old Testament and Gospel readings of possible repercussions should we live a frivolous and wanton life. Quite the contrast from the past few weeks' readings! But is there really a stark contrast in the message? I would say no. For a few weeks now we heard of a merciful and forgiving master. One who was kind to dishonest Stewards, a father who forgave his once ungrateful son, and the host of a great feast who invites the "lowly" to the head table and feeds the lost, poor and forgone of society. Some people can read the wrong thing into these messages—I can do whatever I want, because God will welcome me so long as I as forgiveness upon my deathbed. This is NOT the message that Jesus was telling the people! When we hear of the Goodness of God, we should strive to be more good, more kind, more God-oriented. We are given comfort in the knowledge that God is forgiving and merciful, but we cannot just ignore the Commandments of God to satisfy our own worldly (fleshly) desires. Our very lives ARE our personal Testament (our expression of conviction) towards God's Love of us, and all mankind. If we've heard of God's graciousness and choose to ignore it, we are, as a little child, thumbing our nose at God, almost daring Him to renege on His promise to mankind. Each of us has a choice. High road or low road.

The hard road or the easy road. The road of me, I and MY wants, or the road of caring for others and sacrificing many of my wants. Something so easy, we tend to make into such complexity to fit our own selfish whims. Where does it stop? It stops when I say it stops for me, when YOU say it stops for you. Our own personal decision drives our ultimate and eternal reward or damnation. The road is fraught with peril. Let's stick together to keep focused on the Truth, hold each other accountable and lend a hand to those who need help, back onto the path. I'll see you on the journey!

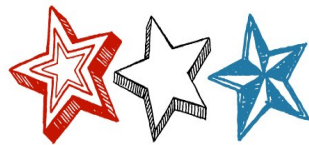
