LECTIO DIVINA - THE GOSPEL IN HD

If you have shopped for electronics, you know that HD is a basic requirement today. But, did you know you can experience the Gospel in HD at St. Jane Frances? Its official name is Lectio Divina and it involves a people coming together every Wednesday evening from 7:00pm - 8:00pm to focus on the coming Sunday's Gospel.

This is not a class - no pre-reading, homework, or mandatory attendance! Instead find new insights into the meaning of the Sunday Gospel reading & hear the Lord speak more clearly about how to live it in the week ahead. Join us, won't you?



We Three Kings-

John Henry Hopkins wrote this Epiphany carol in 1857 and first published it in his own Carols, Hymns, and Songs in 1863. The first line of the song contains two historical inaccuracies. First, the visitors from the East were magi, not kings. Second, though Matthew 2:11 says there were three gifts, the Bible does not say that there were also three magi, one for each gift; that is a matter of tradition. It is a longstanding tradition, however, and the rest of the song focuses on the three gifts without mentioning their bearers.

There are five stanzas and a refrain. The first stanza describes the journey of the magi, following the star. The next three stanzas elaborate on the significance of each gift; gold signified royalty, and frankincense, deity. Myrrh foretold that the Christ child was born to die. The last stanza summarizes the song, calling Jesus the "King and God and Sacrifice," and ending in a peal of alleluias. The only

significant textual variation is the last line of the fifth stanza, which is given several renditions with the same basic meaning: the whole creation echoes the joy that Christ has come.

The December issue of <u>focus</u> (Vol.45, No.4) from the Michigan Catholic Conference "focused" on *Promoting a Respect for Life*. Throughout the month of January, I will be sharing some of the articles from this issue.

From a baby's conception through their first heartbeat, from a child's initial breaths through a person's last moments on Earth, life has value. Some lives last a few brief moments; others stretch long into old age, but each is a gift because it was made in God's image. As a result, all people have inherent dignity and deserve respect.

Unfortunately, society places limitations on how individuals should be treated, based on their perceived value. Pope Francis calls these limitations the "throwaway culture," a culture that discards individuals when they are no longer deemed to be living lives of usefulness. This happens too often; whether it is an unborn child diagnosed with a disability, a prisoner on death row, an elderly person that cannot live independently, or an individual fighting terminal illness. The throwaway culture believes everything can be disposed of or replaced. The Catholic Church's message of love, however, challenges this notion. At the Last Supper, Jesus gave his disciples a new commandment: "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another" (John 13:34). This message is central to the faith, calling all to respect one another as people loved by God.

The Catholic Church teaches abortion is not the answer to difficult circumstances. Assisted suicide, the death penalty, embryonic stem cell research and gun violence do not solve societal problems. And treating human beings as things to be used should never be a response. Instead, the Church challenges people of faith to serve and to walk with those in need. The Church encourages Catholics to hold the hands of these individuals and to affirm their value, from beginning to end, even when it becomes challenging. Embracing "encounter and acceptance" is the desired response, placing human beings at the center of all discussions, policies and actions. Joseph Cardinal Bernadin of Chicago coined the term "consistent ethnic of life" in describing the Catholic church's pro-life position during a 1983 lecture at Fordham University. Cardinal Bernadin emphasized that every life is sacred, and that "the taking of even one human life is a momentous event." A consistent ethic of life means preserving and enhancing life every step of the way. As part of this mentality, Catholics are encouraged to pray for the unborn, to promote adoption and alternatives to abortion, to call or end-oflife care that truly respects each patient, and to stand against threats that plague American society such as assisted suicide, the death penalty, embryonic stem cell research and gun violence. A respect for life also motivates people of faith to serve the poor, to welcome refugees and immigrants, and to seek quality health care and education for all in the community. This focus highlights several critical respect life issues and encourages people of faith to examine the variety of ways they can promote human dignity.

How do we live out the message of Christmas in the New Year, rather than pack it away with the ornaments?

Each year the Octave Day of Christmas falls on the first day of the New Year, on which we also celebrate the Solemnity of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the Mother of God.

Her open heart and courageous "yes" to God show us how to live year-round—with hearts open to the Lord, following where He leads. We are called to place our trust in Him, to enter compassionately into the suffering of others, and to love one another as Christ loves us. Like Our Blessed Mother welcomed Jesus, we are called to cherish and protect the gift of human life, at every stage and in every circumstance.

It is a New Year and I am wondering what to write about. I sit near my parents and my grandfather; I think of my sister, her husband and my niece and nephews who visited a couple of hours ago; friends, relatives, and loved ones who beat the elements to visit with one another. I think of everyone who had come before in my life, to those who are currently reading this, and those who will come into my life in the future...

Each person that we have bumped into, an acquaintance from the neighborhood, work, church, school, have left us with *something*. A sour taste in our mouth, a smell in our nose, or just maybe, a smile and a nod of the head to brighten our day. In turn, we ourselves have left a similar mark on everyone else. What have we left *them* with?

The well known story of the Wiseman who came from afar, following a star, bearing three different types of gifts, not often given by or to "common" people. Gold, expensive burial perfumes, and incense burned in offerings to God, gifts given *by* people of wealth, *to* people of influence. Every mother (and father) sees and wants for the best when it comes to their child(ren), but strangers? They know only what they hear about and experience for themselves. These Wiseman sought out the King of Judea (Herod) thinking that he, for sure, must know about the important person that this brightly shining star was leading them to, because it "must have been" someone of importance and influence, worthy of pricey gifts.

The feast day that we celebrate today... a time when wealthy (enough to travel for weeks on end *and* give expensive gifts) and influential people came to their own realization that an infant (born in a *very* humble setting) will leave an amazing mark on the world, more so than the King of a nation, more than an Empire that was enveloping the known world. This feast day, should cause us to reflect and come to an epiphany in our own lives. What impact has Jesus made in my life; an impact that has me going out and sharing that life changing thing, with others?

Popular tradition has us making "New Year's resolutions" to better ourselves for the future. How about if we make a resolution for ourselves, to make the world a better place for people around us - the new person in school or at work, the friend that I haven't seen in a while, the person being bullied (guess what, "adults" get bullied by all sorts of people just the same as younger people!) by others around them. Let us each let that "new" Light of Christ shine brightly in each of our lives, so much so, that "church" is transformed from "that place that I go on Saturday or Sunday for an hour", to the entirety of God's people who live with one another (in communion) each and every day, everywhere, at all times. Let us strive to make the church, the Church - the place where God's Love, IS. What an epiphany!
