FR. T'S TIDBITS:

I wanted to discuss briefly this week our policy on alcohol at St. Jane Frances de Chantal. One of the first issues brought to my attention when it was announced that I was appointed Pastor of St. Jane Frances de Chantal was the consumption of alcohol at parish events. I understand that there has been a policy in place that no alcohol be served or sold at parish events. I plan to honor that policy and enforce it.

I do not believe that alcohol should be used to entice parishioners to attend parish functions. That being said, the world has changed, and the legal system has changed as well.

If someone were to attend a parish function where alcohol was served, and after a few drinks that person leaves the function and was involved in an accident where someone was injured or killed, the families of those involved could come back to the church and sue for damages. Not only could they sue the church, they could sue the organization that sponsored the event, the individuals who are a part of the organization, and they could sue the pastor of the parish. The liability and the risk are too great.

One thing that I have shared with my family and friends when I was appointed to St. Jane Frances de Chantal, was the fact that no alcohol was served at any parish events. In the climate of this society the people of St. Jane Frances de Chantal should be seen as an example of forward thinking on this issue and concern. Alcoholism is an issue and a concern that our society has to address. We will never eradicate this health issue but we do not have to enable it at parish events.

I've been to many parish events in other parishes where people abused alcohol and then they vent their anger and their frustration with the Church towards me. Needless to say it did not make for a wonderful evening. We all have stories of similar experiences.

May we, the people of St. Jane Frances de Chantal, be the example that people need to see. I would like to thank all those who were involved in making this policy a reality.

Sometimes there are far better words than I could ever write about Worship...

The following article appeared on the America Magazine website on December 13, 2017:

VATICAN CITY (CNS) -- Just like a plant needs sun and nourishment to survive, every Christian needs the light of Sunday and the sustenance of the Eucharist to truly live, Pope Francis said.

"How can we carry out the Gospel without drawing the energy needed to do it, one Sunday after another, from the limitless source of the Eucharist," he said Dec. 13 during his weekly general audience.

"We don't go to Mass to give something to God, but to receive from him that which we truly need," the pope said. Sunday Mass is the time and place Christians receive the grace and strength to remain faithful to his word, follow his commandment to love others and be credible witnesses in the world.

In his catechesis, the pope responded to the question of why it is so important to go to Mass on Sundays and why it is not enough just to live a moral life, loving others.

Sunday Mass is not simply an obligation, he said. "We Christians need to take part in Sunday Mass because only with the grace of Jesus, with his presence alive in us and among us, can we put into practice his commandment and, in this way, be his credible witnesses."

"Just like a plant needs the sun and nourishment to live, every Christian needs the Sunday Eucharist to truly live," he said.

"What kind of Sunday is it for a Christian if an encounter with the Lord is missing?" he asked in his main talk.


Unfortunately, in many secularized countries, the Christian meaning of the day has been lost and is no longer "illuminated by the Eucharist" or lived as a joyous feast in communion with other parishioners and in solidarity with others, he said.

Also often missing is the importance of Sunday as a day of rest, which is a sign of the dignity of living as children of God, not slaves, he said.

"Without Christ, we are condemned to be dominated by the fatigue of daily life with all its worries and the fear of tomorrow. The Sunday encounter with the Lord gives us the strength to live today with confidence and courage and to move forward with hope," he said.

The December issue of <u>focus</u> (Vol.45, No.4) from the Michigan Catholic Conference "focused" on *Promoting a Respect for Life.* Throughout the month of January, I will be sharing some of the articles from this issue.

ALTERNATIVES TO ABORTION

For most parents, bringing a child into the world is a time of celebration and joy. Unfortunately, for others, the news of a pregnancy can be overwhelming and unexpected. To those facing challenging circumstances, abortion may seem like the only answer. According to the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, the state reported 26,395 induced abortions in 2016. The lives lost and the pain caused to individuals and families are significant. These children would have been brothers and sisters, moms and dads, friends and spouses, colleagues and neighbors. Catholics are called to reaffirm the value of all children and mothers. There is a need to accompany women through difficult situations, especially "where abortion appears as a quick solution to their profound anguish," to help them see options that respect the life of their child. One such initiative is the Michigan Pregnancy and Parenting Support Services Program, administered by the Pennsylvaniabased nonprofit Real Alternatives. After years of advocating for this program, Michigan Catholic Conference first saw funding included in the 2013-2014 state budget. The program's goal is to promote childbirth and to provide alternatives to abortion for women in crisis pregnancies — other words, accompanying women in need. These women gain confidence and skills and receive pregnancy counseling, prenatal health information, and parenting education. They also obtain material support, such as clothing, diapers, and formula for their child's first year of life. This program contributed to the decrease in state abortions by 2.8 percent from 2015. Currently, Real Alternatives is partnering with eight service providers in nineteen locations across Michigan. Since its inception, the program has helped almost 6,000 clients, from forty counties in the state, with approximately 20,000 client visits. ("Characteristics of Induced Abortions Reported in Michigan, 1982-2016," Michigan DHHS, https:// goo.gl/JijPWW) The Michigan Pregnancy and Parenting Support Services program is the only state-funded program that specifically provides women in unexpected pregnancies with alternatives to abortion. Couple with other efforts from pregnancy center, maternity homes, and pro-life organizations, important work is happening to recognize the dignity of every mother and baby.



The U.S. Bishops' annual novena, 9 Days for Life, takes place Thursday, January 18 – Friday, January 26. Pray for the respect and protection of all human life with new intentions, brief reflections, and more each day. On December 12, 2017 the Michigan Knights of Columbus dedicated its 44th Ultrasound Machine in the state. This was installed at Life Choices of Central Michigan. This was the third machine

that St. Jane Frances de Chantal Council #13340 has helped to purchase and the first where we were the lead council.

Through the generosity of our parish members, as well as funds received from the Livingston County Ultrasound Initiative, St. Patrick K of C Council #3129, and St Therese Lisieux Council #11957, we raised over \$17,000. The total cost of the Ultrasound Machine was \$33,374, and we wrote a check for \$16,687 which was matched by the Knights of Columbus Supreme Council. The dedication of the machine was attended by more than 50 people including our State Deputy and a dozen students from Central Michigan University. The number of lives being saved by these machines is growing everyday, and all who put money into the baby bottles distributed each October help in saving these



The Denis Connection started with an idea I had after my brother passed away. His name was Dennis, and I believe he died of loneliness. It made me realize that since I was the only person who spent time with him, one person is not enough. People need people. I named the ministry after my brother, and it stands for "Delivering Encouragement, Nurturing & Increasing Socialization". We started as a visiting ministry but have now expanded to provide transportation to appointments and errands. In this day, many people have their family out of the area, working full time, or sometimes are estranged. There is no judgment or shame in asking for help; that is why we are here. We currently have 18 volunteers, and since our start in May 2016, have served 22 clients. There is no cost to you for these services.

It's Monday evening, I have already written my bulletin article, I am "All Set!" So I sit down at the computer at 9:00pm, search the cloud for my bulletin page that I know I wrote Friday, and my article is gone. The rest of the page is there, but the article is gone. Must be Monday!

I had a reflection on Jesus' witness to Andrew, His first interaction with Simon, and the foreshadowing of Simon becoming the rock upon which Jesus tells us that He will build His Church. Cephas (rock or stone in Aramaic) - Petros (rock or stone in Greek) - the man known from this point forward in the Bible as Peter. He was a slightly stubborn man and a simple man. *Most* people would chuckle at the notion of his being a leader of a movement. Jesus uses about 3 years to teach, guide and mold this "Peter", this "rock," into someone those naysayers would not recognize, and give Peter a faith so monumental that he becomes the first leader of the Christian faithful once Jesus ascends to heaven.

In the first reading we heard about Samuel, a young boy given into the service of God, by his mother, raised by Eli (a priest of God). We hear of Samuel's first hearing God's voice, but not knowing it, until Eli recognizes the call and tells Samuel to answer, "Yes, Lord. Your servant is listening." Thus bringing forward the last of the Judges of Israel, who will consecrate the first King of Israel, Saul..

A young boy, born of a barren woman, dedicated to God. A fisherman who worked hours many of us couldn't even imagine to scrape out a living for his family. Each of these, called by God to something more than the world believed they could amount to.


We are celebrating the second Sunday of Ordinary time, the time where our Liturgical colors turn back to green until we begin the next Liturgical season (Lent). So what is "ordinary" about Ordinary Time? Do we fall back into the ruts of daily living? Do we simply "plod along" in our daily lives? Is anything special in Ordinary Time? Will we each take up a challenge to make Ordinary Time, not so ordinary?

When we just "make do" with the things given to us, we sometimes block out God's call in our life. We wake up, go about our ordinary day, shower, sleep, repeat. We, however, have each been gifted; gifted with abilities different than those around us. Maybe similar, but never identical. We each come into contact with a unique grouping of people - how do we treat them? Like "ordinary people?" Why not treat them like *extraordinary* people?

When I come to Mass, do I dress like I do when I go to work, like when I am sitting at home on the couch watching TV, maybe going to school? If that's the case, I know that I get stuck in that rut of wake up, do what I do, shower sleep repeat. I seem to miss something that's hard to put my finger on, but when I wake up, press some slacks and a button down shirt (that I don't wear every day) grab my shoes, put a nice coat of polish, and buff a shine onto them, take a shower and take a little time to realize that this is a special day, a special time that has been gifted to me by God, the Sunday Mass experience changes from ordinary to extra-ordinary. It's hard! There are days that are a complete struggle! I've burned holes in my fair share of dress shirts, slacks and ties, but to me, a little effort on my part, for all the effort that my parents put into me is worth it.

Think back to Samuel, to Simon—each at that point of the day where they have hit the wall and are sleeping, they hear the voice of someone calling, they get up and they answer the summons. Each unknowing what is to come into their lives, each deciding NOT to just roll over and ignore the person calling for them. Know that God has put a call on EVERYONE's heart. Can you hear that call? Have you spoken with God and *listened* for His answer? Each of us is unique and brings a different gift to the table, but each and everyone of us is called to an Extra-Ordinary life. I pray that God opens our hearts to hear and feel that call for and to each of us.


