# FR. T'S TIDBITS: ECUMENISM

Each year, in January, the Catholic Church offers eight days of prayers for Christian Unity. Until 1958, the general idea was that those who were not Catholic would return to the Catholic Church. The Catholic Church no longer holds that idea. It was St. Pope John the XXIII, who at the conclusion of the Church's week of Prayer for Christian Unity,

made a historic announcement that changed the Catholic Church. On January 25, 1959, he announced his intention to call an Ecumenical Council.

St. Pope John XXIII's intention was that this Ecumenical Council be not only for the Catholic Church but for all of Christianity. He desired that all churches, Catholic, Protestants, and Orthodox come together and overcome the divisions that separated these churches for centuries.

One of the most famous quotes by St. Pope John XXIII was the quote he used to begin the week of Christian Unity. He said, "Let us begin with what unites us and not the things that divide us." In this simple yet powerful statement the Pope was challenging all those gathered to reflect upon their own Baptismal call. It is our common baptism that unites us as brothers and sisters.

Since 1959, we have seen many ways in which Christian churches throughout the country, as well as the world, have come together to work as one to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ and promote unity among each other.

As we celebrate the week of Christian Unity this January, may we reflect upon our own baptismal call and be of service to the Church. God has gifted each one of us; the challenge is to be aware of our gifts and not be afraid to share them with the greater community. Ut Unum Sint—"That all may be one."

While Tuesday is dedicated to a day of prayer & penance for the protection of the unborn, there are many ways we can, as Catholics, continue to proclaim our belief that every life, created in the image of God, is sacred. Being "pro-life" is not a polarized political stance, but a way of life that should flow from love. Here are just a few ways for us to share God's love for every life:

- 1) Resist the urge to demonize those who disagree. Remember they, too, are precious to God. The goal isn't to win a debate, but to open hearts to the love, mercy, and truth of God.
- 2) Support people with disabilities and their caregivers. Those with exceptional needs are not a burden to us. How can we extend a helping hand to them and their families?
- 3) Welcome those who have chosen life. Know a pregnant mom in need or a single mom who is struggling? How can you help? Be a voice of welcome, not judgement. Do you know someone who has chosen to give a child up for adoption? Offer encouragement and gratitude for their courage.
- 4) Support families with foster children, and consider supporting a young adult who was a foster child. They often do not have a strong network of support to succeed in college or a work environment. Could you create one?
- 5) Advocate for those in slavery and victims of sex-trafficking. Did you know Michigan has one of the highest rates of human trafficking? Learn more about what to look for, then speak up.
- 6) Don't let immigration be a political landmine. Insist on a calm discussion of this complicated issue. Demand that the dignity of all people immigrants, refugees, & citizens alike is protected. Seek facts, not fear.
- 7) Support the poor and homeless. Consider checking out our St. Vincent de Paul ministry!
- 8) Value the elderly. Do you know about our DENIS Connection? Check out this beautiful resource to help the seniors in our community!



Last Monday, we started "Ordinary Time". In the Catholic church, Ordinary Time refers to all of those parts of the Catholic Church's liturgical year that aren't included in the major seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter. In Latin, this time is *tempus per annum* which translates to "time through the year."

The United States Catholic Conference of Catholic Bishops describes **Ordinary Time** as "a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ. The goal, toward which all history is directed..."

Merriam-Webster's definition of **ordinary** includes "the regular or customary condition or course of things—usually used in the phrase *out of the ordinary.*"

Which definition will you use these next weeks of **Ordinary Time**? Will it be a time of regularity, not varying from day to day? Or will it be a time for "growth and maturation" to bring Christ closer in your lives. To learn more, pray more, meditate more?

# **HEALTH MINISTRY**

January is **GLAUCOMA MONTH**. Glaucoma is an eye disease that has no symptoms, no warning signs and is a leading cause of vision loss and blindness if left untreated.

**WHAT IS GLAUCOMA?** Glaucoma is a group of diseases that can damage the optic nerve in the eye. The optic nerve is the part of the eye that sends electrical impulses for sight to the brain.

**WHAT CAUSES GLAUCOMA?** Clear fluid flows in and out of a small space at the front of the eye and keeps the tissues in the eye healthy. If this fluid drains too slowly, it puts pressure on the optic nerve and can cause glaucoma.

**WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS OF GLAUCOMA?** Often, there are no symptoms at first. Vision stays normal and there is no pain. But as the disease gets worse, side vision may begin to fail.

WHO IS AT HIGHER RISK FOR GLAUCOMA? Anyone can get glaucoma, but people at higher risk for glaucoma are: African Americans age 40 and older, all adults age 60 and older, those with family history of glaucoma, and also those with Diabetes, Hypertension, and previous eye injury.

**HOW IS GLAUCOMA DETECTED?** An eye care professional can determine whether a person has glaucoma through a comprehensive dilated eye exam. During this exam, drops are put into the eyes to enlarge the pupils. The eye care professional is then able to see more of the inside of the eye to check for signs of damage to the optic nerve. Screening for eye pressure alone is not enough to detect glaucoma.

**DOES INCREASED EYE PRESSURE MEAN THAT I HAVE GLAUCOMA?** Not necessarily. Increased eye pressure means you are at risk for glaucoma, but does not mean you have the disease. A person has glaucoma only if the optic nerve is damaged.

**HOW IS GLAUCOMA TREATED?** Glaucoma cannot be cured, but treatment can help control the pressure in your eye and delay further damage to the optic nerve. The most common treatments include: Medications, Laser surgery, or traditional surgery. Treatment usually begins with medication and, if needed, laser surgery

**HOW CAN I PROTECT MY VISION?** Early detection and treatment are the best ways to control glaucoma before it causes permanent vision loss. If you are at higher risk for glaucoma, be sure to get a comprehensive dilated eye exam every one to two years.

To protect your vision from other risk factors, follow your doctor's instructions for managing diabetes and hypertension. And be sure to use protective eyewear in the workplace and during sports and recreational activities. See your eye care professional and get a dilated eye exam.

A wedding is a beautiful time of celebration and gathering with others. When was the last wedding you attended? Wasn't it just awesome when you showed up after the bride had already walked down the aisle? And even better when you left the ceremony before the new bride and groom departed the ceremony?

I'm sorry, it's "Ordinary" Time in the Liturgical year, and our K-8 Faith Formation has resumed here at the parish. Reading our Gospel this week reminds me of how often I've heard of the Mass being likened to a wedding. Our celebrant processes in, down the main aisle of the sanctuary, in persona Christi (the Latin phrase for "in the person of Christ"). Father leads us all in the Holy Mass, sharing stories during the Liturgy of the Word, and at the head of the table during our meal, The Holy Eucharist, leading us in prayer during the Eucharistic Liturgy, and offering us a blessing as we depart. We, in the congregation, play two parts during this time.

- 1) As a whole, we are the guests to a wedding feast (wait, what?). That's right, we are celebrating a wedding-like feast. Where are the bride and groom, you may ask? The celebrant, in his preparation of the Mass, prays and centers his life in that very moment towards Christ, in a special way that I can only imagine, because I do not hold that level of priestly office in my life. Father readies himself and processes in to the gathering, in the very person of Christ. It still looks like Fr. Tony, but he is standing in the ministerial priesthood of Christ, the groom (CCC, ¶ 1548-1551), for us.
- As individual people (as opposed to the entirety of the congregation) each one of us stand in as the bride. Whoa, hold on, I'm a guy! I can't be the bride...

This analogy has nothing to do with gender. What it does articulate is each of our placement in relation to God. At Baptism we are gifted with, and at Confirmation we are sealed in, the 7 gifts of the Holy Spirit. One of these gifts is "Fear of God" or also referred to as "Wonder and Awe". We stand, in Wonder and Awe at the immensity, the completeness, the perfection of the One who we refer to as God. We ask to join His family, we ask to join Him. If you are a guy, and you "expect" your new bride to take your name, THAT is what we are called to be as a "bride" when we ask to Join the One-ness of God.

Sorry for the "man-splaining" here; I certainly mean no offense and there should be no extra "reading-into" what I am saying. Wives are not called to bow to their husbands but rather, we are all called to a mutual respect of each other. God respects us to the point that He allows us to mess up. He respects us enough to allow us the opportunity to learn from our mistakes, and choose Him or to not choose Him. We in turn see and understand that God is the ultimate. The Creator. The One who Was, IS and ever Will BE. HE is the goal that we should strive for.

As a flawed human myself (more flawed than most reading this!), I understand that as I enter the realm of "ordinary" or "normal" time, I tend to fall in a groove. That groove slowly turns into a rut and very soon after, it becomes hard to exit that rut. When I was in my late teens and early 20's, I found every excuse in the book (and used most of them) to not attend Mass, to show up late and leave after the meal of the Eucharist, before the end of the celebration. It took a while to fill in that rut, and make my path a little more even. It took good role models (and a few bad) for me to be able to find my way back to God and the Church, and I am still working at it. All I can do is share my experience and quasi-pragmatic approach to my faith, as I strive for wisdom.


