Today we hear Luke's account of the Beatitudes. Luke's version is different and more challenging than Matthew's, the one we usually hear. Luke's "blesseds" are immediately followed by complementary "woes" that are, well, not at all complimentary. In fact, they are more like blessings and curses. The first half of this teaching speaks of the joy that will be found in the kingdom of God. All that you struggle with now will be repaired in heaven. All of the kingdom shall be yours; your hunger

will be satisfied, your sorrow will turn to joy, your suffering for the faith will be rewarded. The second half of this teaching may cause many of us to struggle as those who are rich will not see riches in heaven, the filled will be hungry, the happy will be sad, those with good reputations will be challenged.

Why? Why curse those who have plenty or those who laugh? We have to dig a little deeper into the meaning of this teaching. It would seem it has something to do with where we put our trust. Do we put our trust in people and the things of this world or do we trust in God? Do we find joy and purpose in material things or in following the teaching of Jesus? Those who are cursed are those who turn away from God, turn away from the suffering, the poor, the marginalized, the joyless.

Jesus calls us to transform our lives. We can do this by changing our perspective. As you reflect on today's Gospel, consider where you put your trust. Where do you find the truth? Is it in the things of this world or in eternal life? Ask yourself: How can I change the way I live my life in accordance with the Beatitudes? What can I do to receive the blessings of God and to help others receive those blessings as well?

Often times, when we go to a funeral, or know someone who has passed away, we don't know what to say or how to respond to someone who is grieving. Recently I attended a grief workshop and thought I would share some of "The Do's."

- Be honest, and be yourself. Let your genuine concern and caring be visible through your presence.
- ♦ Say you are sorry about the griever's pain and situation. Simply say, "I'm sorry" or "If there were words I could say to change this, I would."
- Support the griever to express as much grief as he/she is feeling at the moment and is willing to share.
- ♦ Allow the grieving person to talk about the human qualities of the person who has died.
- Remember to extend condolences to forgotten mourners: grandparents, siblings, stepchildren, aunts, uncles, cousins and friends who were close. Be observant of the children, realizing that children mourn too.
- ♦ Be aware of special and meaningful dates and holidays, especially during the first year.
- Know that nothing you say or do will stop the grieving person's pain.
- ♦ Keep in mind that pain is a natural part of the grief process.
- ♦ Remember that everyone is responsible for his/her own grief. People need to process grief in their own way.
- ♦ Be open to and validate all types of loss, including but not limited to that experienced by partners, companions and significant others.
- ♦ Be sensitive to and accepting of different cultures and lifestyles. Remember again that each person processes grief differently.
- ♦ Be aware that each person's loss is as individual as each person who experiences loss. Grief can never be compared.
- Be a good listener and be patient.
- Offer to help with everyday chores or assist with cards and letters. Lend a hand with meals.
- Give reassurance.

There is no time limit to grief and everyone experiences it differently. Keep them in your prayers.

### **HEALTH MINISTRY—SHINGLES UPDATE** (by Mayo Clinic Staff)

Shingles is a viral infection that causes a painful rash. Although shingles can occur anywhere on your body, it most often appears as a single stripe of blisters that wraps around either the left or the right side of your torso. Sometimes the shingles rash occurs around one eye or on one side of the neck or face.

Shingles is caused by the varicella-zoster virus, the same virus that causes chickenpox. After you've had chickenpox, the virus lies inactive in nerve tissue near your spinal cord and brain. Years later, the virus may reactivate as shingles. While it isn't a life-threatening condition, shingles can be very painful. Vaccines can help reduce the risk, while early treatment can help shorten a shingles infection and lessen the chance of complications. Shingles is more common in older adults and in people who have weakened immune systems.

The <u>signs and symptoms</u> of shingles usually affect only a small section of one side of your body. These signs and symptoms may include: pain, burning, numbness or tingling, sensitivity to touch, a red rash that begins a few days after the pain, fluid-filled blisters that break open and crust over, and itching. Some people also experience: fever, headache, sensitivity to light, and fatigue. Pain is usually the first symptom of shingles. For some, it can be intense. Some people experience shingles pain without ever developing the rash.

### CONTACT YOUR DOCTOR PROMPTLY IF YOU SUSPECT SHINGLES, BUT ESPECIALLY IN THE FOLLOWING SITUATIONS:

The pain and rash occur near an eye. If left untreated, this infection can lead to permanent eye damage. You're 60 or older, because age significantly increases your risk of complications. You or someone in your family has a weakened immune system (due to cancer, medications or chronic illness). The rash is widespread and painful. A person with shingles can pass the varicella-zoster virus to anyone who isn't immune to chickenpox. This usually occurs through direct contact with the open sores of the shingles rash. Once infected, the person will develop chickenpox, however, not shingles. Until your shingles blisters scab over, you are contagious and should avoid physical contact with anyone who hasn't yet had chickenpox or the chickenpox vaccine, especially people with weakened immune systems, pregnant women and newborns.

### FACTORS THAT MAY INCREASE YOUR RISK OF DEVELOPING SHINGLES INCLUDE:

**Being older than 50**. Shingles is most common in people older than 50. The risk increases with age. Some experts estimate that half the people age 80 and older will have shingles.

*Having certain diseases*. Diseases that weaken your immune system, such as HIV/AIDS and cancer, can increase your risk of shingles. Undergoing cancer treatments.

**Taking certain medications**. Drugs designed to prevent rejection of transplanted organs can increase your risk of shingles — as can prolonged use of steroids, such as prednisone.

### **COMPLICATIONS FROM SHINGLES CAN INCLUDE:**

**Post herpetic neuralgia**: For some people, shingles pain continues long after the blisters have cleared. This condition is known as post herpetic neuralgia, and it occurs when damaged nerve fibers send confused and exaggerated messages of pain from your skin to your brain.

Vision loss: Shingles in or around an eye (ophthalmic shingles) can cause painful eye infections that may result in vision loss.

**Neurological problems**: Depending on which nerves are affected, shingles can cause an inflammation of the brain (encephalitis), facial paralysis, or hearing or balance problems.

Skin infections: If shingles blisters aren't properly treated, bacterial skin infections may develop.

### **PREVENTION**

Two vaccines may help prevent shingles — the chickenpox (varicella) vaccine and the shingles (varicella-zoster) vaccine.

**Chickenpox vaccine:** The varicella vaccine (Varivax) has become a routine childhood immunization to prevent chickenpox. The vaccine is also recommended for adults who've never had chickenpox. Though the vaccine doesn't guarantee you won't get chickenpox or shingles, it can reduce your chances of complications and reduce the severity of the disease.

Shingles vaccines: People looking to receive the shingles vaccine have two options: Zostavax and Shingrix.

**Zostavax**, which was approved by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 2006, has been shown to offer protection against shingles for about five years. Zostavax isn't recommended until age 60.

**Shingrix** was approved by the FDA in 2017 and is the preferred alternative to Zostavax. Studies suggest Shingrix offers protection against shingles beyond five years. It's a nonliving vaccine made of a virus component, and is given in two doses, with two to six months between doses. Shingrix is approved and recommended for people age 50 and older, including those who've previously received Zostavax.

As with the chickenpox vaccine, the shingles vaccine doesn't guarantee you won't get shingles. But this vaccine will likely reduce the course and severity of the disease and reduce your risk of post herpetic neuralgia. The shingles vaccine is used only as a prevention strategy. It's not intended to treat people who currently have the disease. Talk to your doctor about which option is right for you.

We will resume with our normal schedule on the week of February 25<sup>th</sup>


Between last week's Gospel reading and this week's, Jesus called out to another disciple (soon to be an Apostle) Levi, who was called Matthew. He healed a paralytic and answered questions about fasting and about doing good works on the Sabbath. He then went to a mountain to pray and prepare for what we hear in this week's Gospel with His "inner twelve" disciples (who were becoming His Apostles). Today, we hear Jesus preaching on the plain about some of His teachings that are referred to as the Beatitudes.

As I read and re-read the different Gospel accounts, my sense of the Ministry of Jesus is one where Jesus is asking us to think outside of the narrow rule of man, where we follow the "letter of the law", into a much more enlightened state where we begin to follow the "Spirit."

Laws are (most often) written, when one person or group tries to restrict the rights and freedoms of another person or group. If we simply treated each person with (not so) common courtesy, we would not need the number of laws that we now have governing our lives. Jesus offers us a simple, yet very challenging, path to follow. Simple in the reality that there are only a few "rules" to follow, challenging, because these few rules ask us to think not just of "me" but to think of all of those that we come into contact with daily, as well as those that we do not.

Catholicity is countercultural. It goes against the thought of "taking care of #1—namely, ME" and challenges us to think of and help others achieve a more universal (catholic) life, of oneness in God.

As we enter into this upcoming week, may we each look at those around us, and work at treating each other not just the way that we'd like to be treated, but better. Let's look out for those less fortunate and be intentional in prayer and witness to the Good News that Jesus gave to us—this life is not all. We have an eternity in happiness, if only we ask for forgiveness and strive to live like Jesus, spreading the loving Word of the Father.





Jesus taught his disciples how to live a Good life. This lesson is called the Sermon on the Mount.

Spring Sports are open to boys and girls in 5<sup>th</sup>- 8<sup>th</sup> grades who are parishioners of St. Lawrence or one of the surrounding supporting parishes. CYO allows dual participation for spring sports, so you may try out even if you play for a travel baseball/softball team.

To be eligible to play St. Lawrence CYO sports, your child must belong to a Catholic parish (either St. Lawrence or a surrounding parish), must be enrolled in a Catholic Religious Education Program for the 2018-19 school year or attend a Catholic school.

A CYO-A form is required to verify CRE attendance if not attending St. Lawrence.
