Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906-1945) was a German theologian, Lutheran pastor and anti-Nazi dissident. He paid the ultimate price for being a dissenter when he died in a concentration camp on April 9, 1945, just as the Third Reich was collapsing. Bonhoeffer, as a Christian, found it impossible and intolerable to ignore the face of suffering that was going on in his home land. He spoke vehemently and vigorously against anti-

Semitism knowing full well that, as a German citizen, taking a stand against the Nazis was, in effect, tantamount to signing his own death certificate.

In 1937, two years before the start of World War II, Bonhoeffer published a book entitled *The Cost of Discipleship*. This book, written over 80 years ago, is still relevant in the times we live in today. Bonhoeffer's book emphasizes that the words of Jesus and people's response to those words are oftentimes two different realities. To put it in plain and simple terms: too many people who call themselves "Christians" ignore the central message of the Gospel because it is "too hard" or "not meant for me". Bonhoeffer knew that there were many around him who claimed they were Christians yet they were part of the majority who made up Hitler's reign of terror by being members of the Nazi party, thereby either explicitly or implicitly condoning acts of atrocities.

Bonhoeffer, since he was a pastor and theologian, was also particularly critical of the concept of cheap grace. He describes cheap grace as "seeking God's forgiveness without repentance. Communion without confession. Cheap grace is grace without discipleship, grace without the cross and grace without the cross is a grace without Jesus Christ." This is a powerful theme which is stressed over and over again in The Cost of Discipleship. The book's contention is that discipleship requires us to follow in the footsteps of the Master.

There is also a second type of grace which Bonhoeffer labels as costly grace or precious grace because one has to pay a higher price for divine sanctification. Bonhoeffer levels a scathing attack on those who attempt to avoid taking the call to discipleship seriously. He was highly critical of Protestant pastors, elders and lay leaders who he accused of watering down the faith. He goes so far as to issue a stern warning that those who disregard the demands of discipleship trivialize the words of Jesus and are guilty of making a mockery and a sham of the faith they profess.

Bonhoeffer also makes a strong case related to the significance and importance of suffering for Christ. Recall that Jesus said to his disciples that He must not only suffer and be killed, but also be rejected by the world. From this, he asserts, it only stands to reason that we, as Disciples of Christ, are to bear the cross as well. "To endure the cross is not a tragedy, it is the fruit of an exclusive allegiance to Jesus Christ. Suffering is a cross that is laid on every Christian and our willingness to share in the sufferings of Christ is part of our obedience to Him."

The role of suffering for Christ also takes shape in terms of a disciple's separation from the world. This is not a separation from living in the world, but a separation from the ways of the world. A disciple of Christ is not someone who necessarily lives a monastic lifestyle, but rather is someone who is present to the world by making the love of Christ known to those who are in the greatest of need.



Canticum Novum – Andy Langlands

The music of Lent can be quite stunning. Filled with spirituality and the tradition of the church, it has the power to move us forward in our journey. It can also make us stop right where we are in order that we consider for a time, our destination goal and where we are today. Some of this music might be foreign to you by name. If or when you hear it, you may recall having heard it before. One of these pieces for me is by a composer known as Palestrina. He is considered by most to be the great Father of liturgical music. He is best known for taking well known chant melody and constructing polyphony (Greek for many voice). Polyphony has "many" lines which take the melody into a kind of musical game of tag; chasing throughout each voice part as the others have counterpoint. Counterpoint is a secondary theme, lacking the importance of the primary, yet making the primary more beautiful by its presence. The title of the piece to which I refer is "Sicut Cervus" (Ps. 42: As the deer longs). It's in a major key, yet evokes, due to the beautiful counterpoint, an almost 3-minute-long sigh of longing. When its well performed, the singers understand where the melody is, and what part to blend nearest to it to evoke this feeling. "As the deer longs for running springs, so my soul longs for you, O Lord." I think this psalm brings me to the realization that when I separate myself from the Lord, my heart yearns to return. Timely to listen to, pray, and be spiritually fed by the longing to return to God. You may find Sicut Cervus on Youtube.

Number boards musical announcements etc: Here at St. Jane Frances, you have an old style hymn number board. In the 1970's, these became out of style with modern worship. Many churches replaced them with electronic hymn boards. They are larger, lighted, and offer more flexibility for the worship/music minister. We have purchased one of these units, to be installed soon. It will be placed near where the current number board is. I have removed the other board to get you used to looking to the front of church to see the number. We also announce the hymn numbers as well. So, depending on whether its your hearing that is at issue, or your sight, we should have you covered.



Human Trafficking of Children

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(U.S. Department of Education)

How to Identify a Victim of Human Trafficking? *

- Has unexplained absences from school for a period of time, and is therefore a truant
- Demonstrates an inability to attend school on a regular basis
- Chronically runs away from home
- Makes references to frequent travel to other cities
- Exhibits bruises or other physical trauma, withdrawn behavior, depression, or fear
- Lacks control over her or his schedule or identification documents
- Is hungry-malnourished or inappropriately dressed (based on weather conditions or surroundings)
- Shows signs of drug addiction
- Demonstrates a sudden change in attire, behavior, or material possessions (e.g., has expensive items)
- Has a "boyfriend" who is noticeably older (10+ years)
- Makes references to terminology of the commercial sex industry that are beyond age specific norms; engages in promiscuous behavior and my be labeled "fast" by peers

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Health Ministry Symptoms of Stress

The fact is that those people that have stress on a regular basis, 77% display physical symptoms. Physical symptoms of stress may include:

- Low energy.
- Headaches.
- Upset stomach, including diarrhea, constipation and nausea.
- Aches, pains, and tense muscles.
- Chest pain and rapid heartbeat.
- Insomnia.
- Frequent colds and infections.

Those people that have stress on a regular basis, 73% display psychological symptoms that may include:

- Boredom. Repetitive work such as assembly or many forms of administrative work can be an immense source of boredom.
- Tension. A little tension can be helpful!
- Anxiety.
- Depression.
- Insecurity.
- Meaninglessness.
- Powerlessness.
- Disengagement.
- If any combination of these symptoms are exhibited for a length of time, please contact your Faith Community Nurse or consult a physician.

Please try these helpful tips if you are one of those persons exhibiting symptoms:

- Exercise at least 30 minutes a day. Always check with your doctor before starting an exercise program.
- When you get a surge of stress, count to 10.
- Take a 5-minute walk to help clear your mind.
- Squeeze a foam or rubber ball 5-10 times.
- Close your eyes. Imagine a calm scene or say a prayer.
- Allow at least 15-20 minutes a day to be with Christ, uncluttering your mind and refreshing your soul.
- Help someone else in need. Call or text a friend.
- Take a warm bath or shower.
- Get 7-9 hours of sleep per night.
- Take 10 minutes at home or at work to focus on something special in your life.

The Cost of Discipleship also addresses the topic of evangelization. Being a disciple of Christ goes beyond just being individually saved. Discipleship is not exclusively focused on one's own personal salvation. A disciple of Christ has to come to the realization that faith is not something which is shared only with those who are our fellow disciples. The command of Jesus to "follow me", was not just applicable to a group of fishermen who lived in Galilee over 2000 years ago, it also applies to the times we now live in. All Disciples of Christ are empowered to proclaim the Gospel in both word and deed.

In essence the defining rule for all who call themselves Disciples of Christ, can be defined in two words: follow Jesus. If Jesus' example and teaching show one thing, we can have no excuse to believe we should be doing something else.

Settling for cheap grace is something we all are guilty of at various times in our life. Lent is the time to come to understand more fully what costly/precious grace means. The only way the Church can become a force for great change in the world may just lie in helping those of us who call ourselves Disciples of Christ to see the difference between cheap grace and costly/precious grace. Truth be told: it is a lot easier, when it comes to being a Christian, to talk the talk, than it is to walk the walk, but in doing this, are we really being true to the faith we profess?

All this is meant as food for thought; it should be part of our Lenten meditation and reflection. Lent is time for us to ask the hard questions of ourselves and to hold ourselves accountable in differentiating between cheap and costly/precious grace. Such discernment should be one of the challenges we face as Disciples of Christ as we continue our Lenten journey.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation: Revisited March 21st & 23rd; 7:00pm - 8:30pm

If you have not participated in the sacrament of Reconciliation for a long time or do so with great reluctance, please know that you are not alone! In 2008, the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University conducted a study entitled, Sacraments Today: Belief and Practice among U.S. Catholics. Regarding Reconciliation, the basic finding was that 75% of Catholics "report that they never participate in the sacrament of Reconciliation or that they do so less than once a year."(57)

During this time of Lent, I invite you to take part in this two-part series during which we can explore and address reasons and concerns that keep you from celebrating this sacrament which is filled with grace, even as it might instill fear or discomfort in you. This is an opportunity to learn more about Reconciliation; there will be no judging you nor pressuring you.

1) You Are Not Alone:

I Don't Go to Confession Because...

This evening (March 21st) explores the reasons people give for not participating in the sacrament. Are these feelings valid? What is our understanding of the sacrament? What is truth about the sacrament: the theology, the affects of sin, forgiveness, mercy, grace?

2) What I See:

From My Side of the Confessional...; So What's the Next Step?

This evening (March 23rd) explores the priest's experience in hearing people's confession. This does not mean a discussion of the sins that are confessed, but rather the humility, healing, joy, consolation, hope, grace and re-encounter with Christ that the priest witnesses as the confessor. Fr. Jerry Slowinski, pastor of St. Jane Frances de Chantal Parish, will share his personal reflections of his role as confessor. To close out this evening we will review the healing grace of the sacrament, examination of conscience, and practical matters of celebrating the sacrament.

It is the hope that you will leave this series open to the Spirit moving you towards the celebration of the Sacrament of Penance/Reconciliation and to experience the powerful love and compassion of Jesus. Register by contacting the parish office at 586-977-8080.
