PLACING PALM BRANCHES IN THE HOME

After dinner, or at another time on Palm Sunday, the household gathers in prayer. All make the sign of the cross.

Leader: Hosanna in the highest! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

Leader: We have come to the last days of Lent. Today, we heard the reading of the Passion. That story will remain with us as we enter into the Three Days when we celebrate the mystery of Christ passing through suffering and death to life at God's right hand. "We are always carrying about in the body the dying of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be manifested in our body. For we who live are constantly being given up to death for the sake of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may be manifested in our mortal flesh." The Word of the Lord.

All: Thanks be to God.

After a time of silence, members of the household join in prayers of intercession:

Leader: For an evening that is perfect, holy, peaceful, and without sin; let us pray to the Lord.

All: Lord, hear our prayer.

HELP NEEDED: DECORATE THE WORSHIP SPACE FOR EASTER!

Many hands make light work! On Good Friday, April 19th, immediately following the liturgy, we will be preparing the Worship Space to celebrate the joy of Easter. If you can stay and help for an hour, we would be very grateful. No special skills or sign-up is needed, simply stay and we will put you to work! Decorating begins at approximately 3:00pm.

TRIDUUM RITUALS

Lent comes to an end before the evening Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday. That liturgy begins the Triduum, the great Three Days that celebrate the central mystery of our faith. Triduum rituals invite us all to baptismal renewal. Here are some examples.

Washing of Feet: After the homily on Holy Thursday, we echo our master in the washing of feet. This ritual reminds us that our baptismal commitment means we are to be servants of one another. In the time of St. Ambrose in Milan, those who were baptized also had their feet washed, because of Jesus' words to Peter: "Whoever has bathed has no need except to have his feet



washed" (Jn 13:10). Many scholars have seen a baptismal reference in those words.



Veneration of the Cross: As part of our observance of Good Friday, we venerate the cross on which Christ died. The veneration challenges us to be willing to accept the cross, too, for it is the only way to resurrection. Through Baptism, we shared in Christ's death that we might come to new

life. Every year we are called to deepen our identification with His cross and resurrection.

Waters of Baptism: The core of our celebrations of the Easter Vigil is the Baptism of the elect. As we share in their joy on this holy night, we are all called to renew our own baptismal promises, to live in the joy of life in the Risen One. Lent comes to its fulfillment around the waters of the font.

APRIL IS CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION MONTH

Ten Tips for Protecting Children and Offering Outreach to Victims/Survivors

- 1. Sexual abuse is about the victim. Many people are affected by abuse but the individual most impacted is the victim who has suffered a violation of trust that can affect his or her entire life.
- 2. No one has the right to have access to children. No one, no matter who they are, has an automatic right to be around children or young people who are in the care of Church without proper screening and without following the rules.
- **3.** Common sense is not all that common. Dioceses, schools, parishes, and especially families, must educate themselves and others on how to protect children.
- 4. Child sexual abuse can be prevented. It is critical to build safety barriers around children and young people to keep them from harm—such as protective guardians, codes of conduct, background evaluations, policies and procedures, and safety training programs.
- 5. The residual effects of having been abused can last a lifetime. The sense of violation goes deep into a person's psyche and feelings of anger, shame, hurt and betrayal can build long after the abuse has taken place. Those who have been abused can heal, but it often takes time, therapy, and the support of loved ones.
- 6. Feeling heard leads toward healing. Relief from hurt and anger often comes when one feels heard, when one's pain and concerns are taken seriously, and a victim/survivor's appropriate sense of rage and indignation are acknowledged.
- 7. You cannot always predict who will be an abuser. Experience shows that most abuse is committed by someone who has gained the trust of a victim/survivor and his/her family.
- 8. There are behavioral warning signs of child abusers. Some abusers isolate a potential victim by giving him or her undue attention or lavish gifts, others allow young people to participate in activities which their parents or guardians would not approve, such as watching pornography, drinking alcohol, using drugs, and excessive touching, such as wrestling and tickling.
- 9. People can be taught to identify grooming behavior. Grooming behaviors are the actions which abusers take to project the image that they are kind, generous, caring people, while their intent is to lure a minor into a inappropriate relationship. Offenders can be patient and may groom their victim, his or her family, or community for years.
- **10. Background checks work.** Background checks in churches, schools and other organizations keep predators away from children both because they scare off some predators and because they uncover past actions which ban an adult from working or volunteering with children.

HEALTH MINISTRY MEMORY SCREENING

This screening is affiliated with Alzheimer's Foundation of America.

A memory screening is a simple and safe evaluation tool that checks memory and other thinking skills. It can indicate whether an additional check up by a qualified healthcare professional is needed. The face-to-face screening takes place in private and will be done by a parish nurse. It consists of a series of questions and/ or tasks designed to test memory, language skills, thinking ability, and other intellectual functions. Results of the memory screenings are confidential. A memory screening is not used to diagnose any particular illness and does not replace consultation with a qualified physician or other healthcare professional.

These questions might help you decide if you should be screened. If you answer "yes" to any of them, you might benefit from a memory screening.

- Am I becoming more forgetful?
- Do I have trouble concentrating?
- Do I have difficulty performing familiar tasks?
- Do I have trouble recalling words or names in conversation?
- Do I sometimes forget where I am or where I am going?
- Have family or friends told me that I am repeating questions or saying the same thing over and over again?
- Am I misplacing things more often?
- Have I become lost when walking or driving?
- Have my family or friends noticed changes in my mood, behavior, personality, or desire to do things?

If a memory screening indicates possible problems, the person should follow up with a doctor or another qualified healthcare professional as soon as possible for a complete medical evaluation.

Follow-up is important to identify the cause of the memory problems. Memory problems could be caused by Alzheimer's disease or other medical conditions. Some memory problems can be readily treated, such as those caused by vitamin deficiencies or thyroid problems. Other memory problems might result from causes that are not currently reversible, such as Alzheimer's disease.

- What signs of spring are happening out in nature?


As we gather this week to celebrate the Passion of our Lord, we hear not only the story of Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, but also the events that will transpire at the end of the week after the Passover meal that Jesus celebrates with His disciples. Over the span of a week, He went from being treated like a prince or king, to being tortured, whipped, beaten and finally crucified. The thing that really gets me, is that Jesus knew that this was going to (and HAD to) transpire... for **us**.

Deep in our minds we know and understand that life ends. Each of us will, at some time, pass on. I feel bad for those who have NO concept of and/or deny God! What more is there to life? To what purpose do we exist? Are we but meaningless, accidental specks in the universe? There has to be more.

Oneness with an Almighty Being, our Creator is the only purpose to life that I can fathom. If I did not have the capacity for knowledge, Understanding and Wisdom, this would be a moot point, but each of us DO think, we rationalize, and we grow. Each one of us, from the moment of conception (the joining of those two gametes, each with half of a genetic code) to the moment of our passing has potential. We each have the potential to be perfect, only one person has reached that full potential in our belief, and He suffered for it... willfully.

We learn, we grow, we screw up, we (hopefully) learn again from our mistakes and we grow more. If we continue this cycle, and purposefully expand ourselves, we learn to love each other better, individual flaws and all. We love the person, not the actions. When we see another's love of us, and acknowledge this love, and see God's love in and through another, we will hopefully try to do God's Will, for it's sake alone, not because I feel good about myself, or so that I get a "warm and fuzzy feeling" when I do it, but because it is RIGHT and JUST to do it, because it is what God would do. (See what I did there? Plugged in part of the Liturgy??)

My dad loved me, of this I had no doubt. Nothing I could do, yelling, insulting smarting off could change that. Nothing that I could do would "earn" his love, he gave this freely to me, and this is what God does for each one of us! Even if we have a less than "perfect" family (and we all do) God Loves US! This week is how we can begin to learn about this Love even better! Take part in our church's retelling of the Passover story. Watch the washing of the feet, hear the crucifixion, experience the Vigil, where we tell OUR stories of creation through redemption, and witness new people join our church in the most full way through Baptism and Confirmation. Start to live the Love that Jesus shows us, and the freedom that it gives us! Happy Easter! Hopefully I'll see you this week!
