People often express to me they use to have a warm and solid sense of God in their lives, but now, as an adult, they find that the warmth, the confidence have disappeared and they find themselves struggling to pray as they use to when they were young. They feel a deep sense of loss and ask, "What's wrong with me?"

My answer, in essence, is this: "There is nothing wrong with you. Despite your pain, doubt and loss of confidence you have not lost

your faith. The feelings that were appropriate for you when you were a child are not necessarily fitting or suitable for you as an adult. You are being led into a deeper, not a lesser faith. Moreover, the loss you feel is leading you to a deeper sense of maturity."

For all practical purposes, what the person who feels he, or she, has lost faith is saying is: "I use to be quite sure of myself when it came to faith and religion. There were no doubts in my mind." When that sense of surety is somehow shaken, it is easy, or natural, to doubt and experience bewilderment. When there is the realization that there are not always easy answers to the questions and doubts, then that person is growing, not regressing in faith.

To grow in faith, there is a price that had to be paid. This seems to happen when our world is rocked and when the bottom seems to fall out. St. Thomas, who is one of the two central figures in this weekend's Gospel, is a perfect example of this. Thomas had faith in Jesus, but it was the faith of a child. When Jesus was crucified and died an excruciatingly painful death, Thomas' faith was shaken to the core. He was not quite as cocky, as sure of himself. In fact, Thomas became bitter and arrogant. Sometimes there is no other cure for arrogance other than a painful loss of certitude about our own ideas about God, faith and religion. St. John of the Cross suggests that a deeper religious faith begins when, as he puts it, we are forced to understand more by not understanding than by understanding. But that can be a very confusing and painful experience that prompts the question: What's wrong with me?

A curious, paradoxical dynamic lies behind this: We tend to confuse faith with an idealized image of who God is. Some of the greatest spiritual writers of the Church have said that when we are young, we have idealized feelings about God. These feelings are not unlike a couple who first meets and falls in love and believes that everything will be perfect from that moment on. They truly believe they will live happily ever after in this world. Gradually, over the course of time, troubles arise and things are not always as perfect as they were in those first intoxicating and heady days of wine and roses. There are problems and difficulties that have to be faced in an adult manner, but if the love of the couple remains strong and the problems are faced head on, the bond between the couple deepens. This is also true when it comes to faith and our relationship with God.

There are moments in each of our lives when our spiritual journey seems to "take away" our faith, or perhaps tests us in some unimaginable way. St. John of the Cross refers to this as "the dark night of the soul". This serves to describe the experience where we felt God's presence in a certain warm way and

Easter Time The

God raised Jesus. Repent. Be baptized for the forgiveness of Receive the sins. Holy Spirit. This is the message of Peter and Meaning John as we follow the story of the Church's

growth in the first century after the Resurrection of Christ. The seven weeks of Easter Time give us an opportunity to reflect on this message

as we internalize what it means to be Easter disciples at this time in Church history.


After overcoming their initial fear at the empty tomb, the joy of the disciples is continuously present in the Easter Time readings. Easter joy is ours, too. We faithfully celebrate the Sacred Triduum each year in our parishes. We wash feet, we partake of the Eucharist, we proclaim the Passion and Death of our Lord, and we announce His Resurrection. The prayer we undertake in these liturgies is not for the faint-hearted. Our prayer expresses our faith and the faith in which catechumens are baptized.

The unfettered joy of Easter Time is marked by the Risen Lord's appearances, the disciples' proclamation of the Resurrection, their healing of the sick and baptizing of many households, remains pure even in the face of the disciples own suffering and persecution. Our joy, even if it seems muted in light of tragedies, suffering, and other of life's challenges, really is not. The Lord is still raised; Easter Time helps us see that death has not won. He saved us through the Resurrection.

And, while Jesus ascended to the Father, the same Holy Spirit that the early followers received, we receive as well. The Spirit empowers us to continue to spread the Easter Gospel to all corners of the world. On the Ascension, we accept that ours is now the Great Commission to make disciples of all nations. On the Solemnity of Pentecost, which marks the conclusion of Easter Time, we celebrate our unity as followers of the Risen Lord; in our diversity is unity in the One Body of the Lord and in the one Spirit. Like the early followers of the Risen Lord, we share all things in common, we proclaim the Word, participate in the prayers, and partake of the Sacred Meal that nourishes us for the journey after Easter time. It's been a week since we witnessed the death and resurrection of Jesus. Walking with Him from the triumphal entrance into Jerusalem with the procession of palms, we sang "Hosanna on High!" through His passion and death, through to witness the glory of the resurrection and the first Alleluia's of the new liturgical season. 
VOCATIONS

Praying the Rosary

- For each of the five decades, announce the Mystery (perhaps followed by a brief reading from Scripture) then say the Our Father.

HEALTH MINISTRY MEMORY SCREENING

WHERE: ST. JANE FRANCES de CHANTAL CHURCH May 6, 2017

This screening is affiliated with the Alzheimer's Foundation of America.

A memory screening is a simple and safe evaluation tool that checks memory and other thinking skills. It can indicate whether an additional check up by a qualified healthcare professional is needed. The face-to-face screening takes place in private and will be done by a parish nurse. It consists of a series of questions and/or tasks designed to test memory, language skills, thinking ability, and other intellectual functions. Results of the memory screenings are confidential. A memory screening is not used to diagnose any particular illness and does not replace consultation with a qualified physician or other healthcare professional.

These questions might help you decide if you should be screened. If you answer "yes" to any of them, you might benefit from a memory screening.

- Am I becoming more forgetful?
- Do I have trouble concentrating?
- Do I have difficulty performing familiar tasks?
- Do I have trouble recalling words or names in conversation?
- Do I sometimes forget where I am or where I am going?
- Have family or friends told me that I am repeating questions or saying the same thing over and over again?
- Am I misplacing things more often?

currently reversible, such as Alzheimer's disease.

- Have I become lost when walking or driving?
- Have my family or friends noticed changes in my mood, behavior, personality, or desire to do things?

If a memory screening indicates possible problems, the person should follow up with a doctor or another qualified healthcare professional as soon as possible for a complete medical evaluation. Follow-up is important to identify the cause of the memory problems. Memory problems could be caused by Alzheimer's disease or other medical conditions. Some memory problems can be readily treated, such as those caused by vitamin deficiencies or thyroid problems. Other memory problems might result from causes that are not



there was total solidarity with God. Inevitably, something comes along which tests us and we are left in doubt. This is what Jesus experienced on the cross and what Mother Teresa wrote about in her journals.

And while the darkness can be confusing, it can also be maturing. It can help us move from being arrogant and judgmental to being humble because we recognize that living inside a cloud of uncertainty, where we cannot always be in control of, or in charge of our lives, makes us humble and eventually leads us to rely on God for the faith, the grace and the strength we need to sustain ourselves.



During Child Abuse Prevention Month, we are reminded of the call to be instruments of justice, working for the common good of all, which includes the protection of children. As Jesus entrusts to Peter the care of the flock, we are reminded that this responsibility belongs to everyone as a matter of charity and justice. Child Abuse Prevention Month should lead to heightened awareness of the need to be vigilant about providing a safe environment for all within the Church and for our communities.

Throughout the Gospel, Christ calls upon his followers to care for the most vulnerable among us, especially children. Our faith also calls for us to uphold the value of human life and the dignity of the human person. The protection of children is the responsibility of the entire Church, including the faithful.

Recent statistics tell us one out of every four girls, and one out of every six boys, are assaulted before they turn 18. If those statistics are correct, on every Sunday in our congregation are people who have been abused and are feeling the pain of that abuse. Reaching out to all victims of abuse is critical in bringing hope and the love of Christ to them. Our diocese is here to provide anyone suffering from abuse with steps towards healing.


