FR. T'S TIDBITS: UNLEASH THE GOSPEL

The Archdiocese of Detroit celebrates the two year anniversary of the promulgation of Archbishop Allen Vigneron's pastoral letter entitled Unleash the Gospel. It is a wonderful document that encourages and challenges the people of God within the Archdiocese of Detroit to live out their baptismal call in proclaiming the Gospel in their daily life.

I will admit that I struggled to understand what it means to unleash the Gospel. After reading and rereading the pastoral letter it dawned on me that each of us have to come to our own understanding of what it means to unleash the Gospel.

I was speaking with a priest friend of mine at the board meeting that I attended awhile ago. He had just received a new assignment in his diocese which will involve uniting four parishes into one. He said that he sees his new ministry as shepherding the people of God to a new reality. For me that is the definition for unleashing the Gospel. Living in the present and proclaiming the Gospel within the present situation.

Evangelization is not a new concept in the Catholic Church it has been happening since the days of Jesus. However throughout the centuries of the church how it is done has changed. One only needs to read a history of the Catholic Church to see that evangelization has changed the face of the church, such as the Vatican Council II that was begun in 1963. Vatican II was about how the Catholic Church saw herself in the modern world.

An example closer to home at my former parish St. Basil the Great, the parish school closed in 1970. It was decided to lease it out to generate income. Wayne State University leased the building as a satellite campus for many years. Later D.D.I. leased the building as a training center. The building was being used for what it was intended for thus a new reality and a new life.

As we embark upon the blessings and challenges of unleashing the Gospel may we do so with a spirit of gratitude and with apostolic boldness knowing that we are doing God's work and not our own. We are a part of God's great plan and in faith we must trust in the plan God has for each of us. And sometimes that plan might not look like the plan we have for ourselves.

THE SYNOD'S FOUNDATIONAL CONVICTION is that the Church in the Archdiocese of Detroit is resolved to obey the Holy Spirit and be made by him a band of joyful missionary disciples.

This means that the Archdiocese, following the call of Pope Francis, is resolved to undergo a "missionary conversion," a change in our culture, such that every person at every level of the Church, through personal encounter with Jesus Christ, embraces his or her identity as a son or daughter of God and, in the power of the Holy Spirit, is formed and sent forth as a joyful missionary disciple. For families this means that every family embraces its role as the domestic church and, in connection with other families and single persons, actively seeks the spiritual and social renewal of its neighborhood, schools and places of work. For parishes and archdiocesan services it means the renewal of structures to make them Spirit-led and radically mission-oriented. For everyone in the Archdiocese it entails making one's relationship with Jesus and alignment with his will the central guiding principle of every aspect of life. This missionary conversion entails a strikingly countercultural way of living grounded in prayer, Scripture, and the sacraments; unusually gracious hospitality; a capacity to include those on the margins of society; and joyful confidence in the providence of God even in difficult and stressful times.

I am enrolled in a course at Sacred Heart Major Seminary this short Spring semester titled, "Liturgical Prayer of the Church." It is a course that includes a close look at the Liturgy Documents, Liturgy of the Hours, and other liturgical prayer resources.

One resource we are reviewing is a small book entitled "Liturgical Worship..." by Joseph A. Jungmann, published in 1941. Although some of the information is dated, many of Jungmann's words speak as clearly today as they did 78 years ago. On the subject of the Sunday liturgy, the Mass, Jungmann states, "From its own inmost creative forces the Liturgy is always sending forth fresh waves of renewed life, of inspiration and vigor, so as to imbue its external forms, old as they are, with an imperishable spirit of adoration and soulstirring reverence." These beautiful words really resonated with me. When we worship God at the Sunday liturgy, do we feel renewed and/or inspired? Do we bring with us a desire to be moved or even transformed

by the liturgy? Do we take time to reflect on our worship and bring it to fruition in our lives and our world?

A second point made by Jungmann is that the liturgy is our public worship of God. The liturgy prior to Vatican II led to many private devotions, as the liturgy didn't involve much participation from those in the pews. Our public liturgy today calls for our participation in all aspects, in song, in spoken prayer, in response to prayers led by the priest, in our gestures and actions. In the Mass we find, according to Jungmann, "...a language worthy...to worship and adore the all-Holy God." Are we participating? Truly participating, mind, body and soul? Are we present to the liturgy or are we thinking about what else needs to be done today?

Our worship, our participation in the Mass is essential to bring about change in our often world-weary souls. The Mass lifts us from the everyday, bringing us closer to God and to the Body of Christ in his people. It invites us to transformation, through the

Word of God and the Eucharist. Take time this week to reflect on your worship experience. Consider how you are engaging in the Mass and how you can deepen that experience. May your reflections lead to a greater appreciation for, and participation in, our beautiful liturgy!

P.S. This fall St. Jane will present a six-week series from Bishop Robert Barron entitled "The Mass." This will be a wonderful opportunity to deepen your understanding of the liturgy and to participate with others, learning, growing and sharing our faith! Watch this space for more details in the coming months.

Recently I attended a Retreat and the theme was "Finding God in All Things"...To be in the present moment (not in the past) and to be open to spiritual awakening. Everyday we all seem to be in a rush, but it's important to stop in the moment to see God in the beauty, truth and love. An exercise to help is a version of the five-step Daily Examen that St. Ignatius practiced:

- 1. Become aware of God's presence. Look back on the events of the day in the company of the Holy Spirit . The day may seem confusing to you—a blur, a jumble, a muddle. Ask God to bring clarity and understanding.
- 2. Review the day with gratitude. Gratitude is the foundation of our relationship with God. Walk through your day in the presence of God and note its joys and delights. Focus on the day's gifts. Look at the work you did, the people you interacted with. What did you receive from these people? What did you give them? Pay attention to small things the food you ate, the sights you saw, and other seemingly small pleasures. God is in the details!
- 3. Pay attention to your emotions. Reflect on the feelings you experienced during the day. Boredom? Elation? Resentment? Compassion? Anger? Confidence? What is God saying through these feelings? Does a feeling of frustration perhaps mean that God wants you to consider a new direction in some area of your work?
- 4. Choose one feature of the day and pray from it. Ask the Holy Spirit to direct you to something during the day that God thinks is particularly important. It may involve a feeling—positive or negative. It may be a significant encounter with another person or a vivid moment of pleasure or peace. Or it may be something that seems rather insignificant. Look at it. Pray about it. Allow the prayer to arise spontaneously from your heart—whether intercession, praise, repentance, or gratitude.
- 5. Look toward tomorrow. Ask God to give you light for tomorrow's challenges. Pay attention to the feelings that surface as you survey what's coming up. Are you doubtful? Cheerful? Apprehensive? Full of delighted anticipation? Allow these feelings to turn into prayer. Seek God's guidance. Ask him for help and understanding. Pray for hope. End the Daily Examen with a conversation with Jesus. Do all this with the spirit of gratitude. Your life is a gift, and it is adorned with gifts from God.

Before Donating:

- Get a good nights sleep
- Have a good breakfast or lunch
- Drink extra water & fluids to replace the volume you will donate
- Eat iron rich foods
- Avoid fatty foods

During Donation:

- Wear clothing with sleeves that can be raised above the elbow
- Show the staff any "good veins" that have been used successfully in the past to draw blood
- Relax
- Take the time to enjoy a snack and a drink in the refreshments area immediately after donating.

After Donation:

- Re-hydrate by drinking plenty of fluids over the next 24-48 hours
- Avoid strenuous physical activity or heavy lifting for about 5 hours after donation



How many have asked this very question throughout the storied (almost) two millennia of the Church's history? Those first disciples were just ordinary people. They worked the jobs taught to them by their parents, be it fishing, housekeeping, carpentry, soldiering, etc. Most of Jesus' disciples were NOT "highly educated" people, but there were some. Paul (who had previously been called Saul) Luke and even more (whose names do not come to mind as I write this), had a more formal education under their belts; these were often the disciples who wrote about Jesus.

These more educated disciples were often (but not always) the ones who would go out and teach and preach Jesus' Word to the surrounding communities. They did this because their education had prepared them for this aspect of ministry, but they were not alone. As a matter of fact, even the more educated disciples came to Simon Peter, to listen and learn from him. They deferred to Simon Peter's judgement in many cases (not always "willingly") and maintained a unity within that close group of disciples who were sent out into the greater world (the Apostles).

I am an ordinary guy. I like to work with my hands. I trained in the Machine Tool industry, starting in Plastic Injection Molding tearing down and rebuilding molds. I learned various different machine tools—mills lathes, grinders, EDMs, saws, CNCs (in most of the previously mentioned flavors). I learned basic home improvement from my father while still in school. I went on to work for with a friend from my previous parish doing home and commercial renovation projects of varying degrees. I have done kitchens, bathrooms, decks, brickwork, electrical, plumbing, tile, cabinetry, and a variety of other aspects in the building trade. In the military, I was a truck driver, licensed on at least 4 or 5 different vehicle systems, different sized generators from a small single dwelling unit through the largest unit which was used to power a "tent city", and could be daisy-chained to go even larger. I was also licensed to operate different pieces of heavy equipment to aid in mission readiness. Why do I bring this up? Each of us brings something to our mission as Church.

So, "What is my role in the Church?" For each of us it changes as time progresses. Sometimes a lot, most of the time only a little, but each of us has a part to play, besides warming the fabric that we sit on. We need to take an active role in the Church to help it sustain and to help it grow. We need each other, to help progress the mission. If your body doesn't work so well, share your brain power. If you need to let your brain rest, come and use your muscles. Volunteerism happens in every aspect of what we do, but are we visibly a disciple of Christ as we volunteer, in school, at work and through our civic community? Do we share the good news of the Gospel with others?

NO ONE ABOVE CIVIL OR GOD'S LAW

A new papal law requiring priests and religious to report sexual abuse and misconduct provides "clear directives for universal accountability in response to the horrors of clergy sexual abuse," Archbishop Vigneron has told Detroit Catholic. The law provides whistleblower protections for anyone

making a report and requires all dioceses to have a system in place to receive the claims confidentially. And it outlines internal procedures for conducting preliminary investigations when the accused is a bishop, cardinal or religious superior.

"I am deeply sorry to all those who have been injured and are enduring a lifetime of physical, emotional and spiritual suffering because of perverse actions by those in authority," the archbishop said. "No one is above civil law, and importantly, no one is above God's law."

Pope Francis announced the new norms on May 9th. They go into effect June 1st. To learn more about the groundbreaking new church law, go to detroitcatholic.com.
