FR. T'S TIDBITS: THIS AND THAT II

Recently I read an article by Dr. Jeff Mirus entitled, <u>Proverbs, Read Spiritually</u>. The author informs his readers that the book of Proverbs is an instruction on the art of right living. Dr. Mirus states in his article that "the Book of Proverbs deals with the full range of life, from the spiritual heights to the pragmatism of daily life." The Book of Proverbs is about everything.

The same can be said about the Book of Psalms which addresses every human emotion from life to death, to forgiveness and sin, love and hate. Every human emotion that we experience can be found in the Book of Psalms.

I would encourage you to pick up the Sacred Scriptures (the Bible) and open it to either the Book of Proverbs or the Book of Psalms and use them as a form of meditation. In the hustle and bustle of our lives we need to take some time to step out of our day to day life and reflect upon our lives in light of the situation that we find ourselves in.

Dr. Mirus suggests that the Proverbs found between chapters 17 and 26 are of the greatest spiritual interest. With regard to the Book of Psalms each psalm lends itself to a deeper reflection and allows that reader to center his or her attention on a power that is much greater than ourselves, namely God.

You have heard me say so often, that God has a plan for each one of us and He does. It may not be the plan we envision for ourselves. We need to see God's hand in our lives and the many ways that He blesses and enriches our lives with the people and experiences that we find ourselves dealing with. I am reminded of a saying that I heard many years ago which helps me to keep my life centered. Do you want to make God laugh! Tell Him your plans for the day.



"Come away by yourselves to a deserted place and rest a while."

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus and the apostles experienced a need for rest and went off to be alone and regroup. Turns out their deserted place was filled with a vast crowd, all seeking to be taught by the Master. Their need for a shepherd was great and Jesus led them. At some point in our lives we have all experienced the need to just "get away" and recharge. Many of us have experienced when that wasn't possible, no matter how much it was needed. I remember many times as a mom and as a caregiver when I felt I just needed to get away from the responsibilities, but could not. Those were the times when I most appreciated my relationship with Jesus. How did I get through it? Prayer.

Jesus is always here for us, no matter how often we ask, no matter how big or small the request, no matter how little we give in return. So pray and allow yourself to be guided. Pray when you are strong and when you are tired, when you are filled with joy and when you are lonely, when you have given of

all your resources and have nothing left to give. Pray. Pray. Pray. Jesus will hear you and will lead you.

HEALTH MINISTRY: Prevention of Lyme Disease

AVOID TICK ENVIRONMENTAL AREAS

The ticks that can transmit Lyme disease prefer areas that are shaded or wooded. Trees, brushy undergrowth, and abundant leaf-litter characterize the areas for ticks. They can also be found in grassy or brushy areas as well. In southwest Michigan, blacklegged ticks have been found in areas characterized by sandy soil, oak or maple dominated tree cover, and an abundance of rodents and white-tailed deer. Areas along the coast of Lake Michigan in northern Michigan (Menominee County, UP) are characteristic of areas with ticks.

PROTECTION INCLUDES PROPER CLOTHING AND REPELLANTS

- Wear light colored clothing so ticks can be spotted more easily, and removed before attachment
- Wearing long sleeved shirts and pants tucked into socks or boot tops can be helpful in keeping ticks from reaching your skin
- Ticks are usually located close to the ground, so boots or shoes and not sandals, are recommended
- Applying insect repellants such as DEET to clothes and exposed skin, and applying Permethrin (which kills ticks on contact) to
 clothes can reduce the risk of tick attachment (DEET can be used safely on children and adults, but should be applied
 according to label guidelines.)

The transmission of the bacteria that causes Lyme disease from an infected tick is unlikely to occur before 36 hours of tick attachment. Therefore, daily checks for ticks and promptly removing any attached tick will help prevent infection.

REMOVING THE TICK

This should be done by using fine-tipped tweezers. <u>DO NOT</u> use petroleum jelly, a hot match, nail polish, or other products. Grasp the tick firmly and as closely to the persons skin as possible, pull the tick's body straight up away from the skin. Cleanse the area with an antiseptic. Persons should promptly seek medical attention if they develop any signs and symptoms (see below) of early Lyme disease. Early diagnosis and proper antibiotic treatment of Lyme disease are the best means to avoid the complications of infection and late-stage illness.

SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

EARLY SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS (3 TO 30 DAYS AFTER A TICK BITE)

- Fever, chills, headache, fatigue, muscle and joint aches, and swollen lymph nodes
- Erythema migrans (EM) rash:
 - Occurs in approximately 70 to 80 percent of infected persons
 - Begins at the site of a tick bite after a delay of 3 to 30 days (average is about 7 days)
 - Expands gradually over a period of days reaching up to 12 inches or more (30 cm) across
 - May feel warm to the touch but is rarely itchy or painful
 - Sometimes clears as it enlarges, resulting in a target or "bull's eye" appearance
 - May appear on any area of body

LATER SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS (DAYS TO MONTHS AFTER TICK BITE)

- Severe headaches and neck stiffness
- Additional EM rashes on other areas of the body
- Arthritis with severe joint pain and swelling, particularly the knees and other large joints
- Facial palsy (loss of muscle tone or droop on one or both sides of the face)
- Intermittent pain in tendons, muscles, joints, and bones
- Heart palpitations or an irregular heart beat
- Episodes of dizziness or shortness of breath
- Inflammation of the brain and spinal cord
- Nerve pain
- Shooting pains, numbness or tingling in the hands or feet
- Problems with short-term memory

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

- Fever and other general symptoms may occur in the absence of rash.
- A small bump or redness at the site of a tick bite that occurs immediately and resembles a mosquito bite, is common. This irritation generally goes away in 1-2 days and is not a sign of Lyme disease.
- A rash with a very similar appearance to EM occurs with Southern Tick-associated Rash illness (STARI), but is not Lyme disease
- Ticks can spread other organisms that may cause a different type of rash.

Two Mondays ago, I had the opportunity to meet a couple of friends for dinner, one of which, I hadn't seen for years. We sat in a little diner in Ferndale (nice and centrally located from the direction we were each coming from, and heading off to); we ate, laughed, discussed old times, the activities that we had all done together. Then a comment was made that I found quite interesting. We had worked with a youth ministry program together (one of quite a few) and they each had agreed, that since that time, with that particular group, each of them has had their falling out and falling back in, with the Catholic Church. Why? I asked the question point blank.

The many variety of people they had encountered in the church left them (most of the time) warm and welcomed, but there were encounters, especially with people "in charge of certain ministries," that turned them off. There were also communities they visited (and even joined) that didn't meet their expectations of warmth and "welcoming attitude" that they had come to expect from the community we had experienced years ago.

Life is ever changing and rarely does something go "as expected," but should this lead us away from the Church? 10 or 11 years ago, I joined St. Jane Frances. To be perfectly honest, the "ideal church" I was looking for was not in existence, so, at that time, I felt that I had "settled."

Help the shepherd find his lost sheep.

This has nothing to do with the people or the community of St. Jane Frances, but rather shines a light on the "idealistic expectations" I had, and most of us have, in life. It also speaks to us about working toward an "ideal goal," knowing that it will not be perfect, but striving to bring that goal closer to perfection.

In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus had been turned away from His hometown. He had sent His Apostles off to teach, and they had just come back to let Him know of the death of John the Baptist at the hand of Herod (Antipas), the tetrarch of Galilee and Perea. Jesus asked His disciples to come away to rest for a while, but the people followed them even though they were in a boat. When Jesus saw them,

"His heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and He began to teach them many things." Mark 6:34

Even though Jesus and the Apostles were tired and worn down (especially after hearing about the death of His cousin John), Jesus still lead the people that sought them out on a journey of learning.

As we enter into this last part of our summer, wherever we find ourselves—on vacation, in our backyards, on the road (this is my struggle!) - let us all strive to be more welcoming than we currently are (even if we are good at it already). Let us find Jesus in our midst, and recognize Him in EVERY person that we come across, so that they may see His kindness, compassion and love in <u>us</u>. Let us not be like the shepherd in the first reading, who scattered sheep and drove them away, but be Like Jesus, welcoming each other, not talking about people, but speaking to them, and helping those that need help; asking questions, so that we may continue to learn, and be examples for others to follow and help each other so that WE may grow into our "ideal" community.
