### FR. T'S TIDBITS: SILENCE

It is difficult to believe that summer is soon to come to an end. It has been an enjoyable summer and I do look forward to getting back into the routine of parish life. This summer I had a chance to do some reading. One of the books that I read this summer was written by Robert Cardinal Sarah entitled *The Power of Silence, Against the Dictatorship of Noise.*

In our society we seem to be inundated with various things that call for our attention. Whether it is the internet, social media, the hustle and bustle of daily life, road rage, or social engagements, many of these things seem to call for an immediate response. Noise seems to fill our day from our rising to our resting; it is all around us. We can't avoid it, but we can take control of it. We can choose silence as a means to confront the noise that is a part of our lives.

Throughout his book Robert Cardinal Sarah shares with his readers the importance of silence in our daily life. He does this by using many examples from spiritual writers to illustrate that we come to hear the voice of God in silence. In order for God to speak to us we must seek to be silent. Cardinal Sarah seeks to restore to silence its place of honor and importance. He states that silence is more important than any other human work, for it expresses God. The true revolution comes from silence; it leads us towards God and others so as to place ourselves humbly and generously at their service.

Jesus provides us with the greatest example. There is one discipline (if I can use that term) we see as an important part of the life and ministry of Jesus, and we also see it throughout the scriptures. After Jesus has taught the people who have gathered to hear him, he goes off by himself to a deserted place and prays, to put himself in the presence of the Father and hear the voice of the Father.

The book highlights the importance of silence but it also reinforces the point that our relationship with God is always an ongoing process, a true inner stillness that is built on silence. We must slow ourselves down so we can hear the voice of God and respond to it.

It has been a hard week for the people of God. Scandal once again has rocked the Catholic Church. Between the revelation of the allegations of abuse against Archbishop McCarrick, and the Pennsylvania report detailing the systemic coverup of the horrific

- Remember that it is Christ who we worship. Not bishops, not structures, not organizations. Everything and everyone in the "church" serves Christ as the head. Run to Him. Be the church. Embrace and use the gifts you've been given to serve the people of God (everyone).
- 2) Begin with prayer and fasting. "I turned to the Lord God, to seek help, in prayer and petition, with fasting, sackcloth, and ashes." (Daniel 9:3) Prayer is not inaction. It is starting with the source of all action. Our sacrifice in fasting is united with Jesus on the cross who gave everything, who weeps with us. Begin here.
- 3) Be silent before God, then speak out. Silence in grave matters has been the enemy too long. Take time for silence with God, then speak up as He leads you. Write letters to church leaders. Console victims. Encourage those who are desolate. "Do justice, love goodness, and walk humbly with your God." (Micah 6:8)


What does it mean to "have a relationship" with Jesus?

Definitions of "relationship" from Webster's Dictionary and Dictionary.com:

- the way in which two or more people, groups, countries, etc., talk to, behave toward, and deal with each other
- the way in which two or more people or things are connected
- a connection, association, or involvement
- an emotional or other connection between people

Talk to, behave toward, deal with, connection, emotional...These words all describe relationships we have in our lives. We have relationships with our spouse, our children, our parents, extended families, co-workers, co-ministers, doctors, professionals, etc. We exist in relationship with the world around us. We talk to others, deal with them and behave toward them in varied ways. We are connected. We have feelings that are associated with each different type of relationship. We feel love toward both our spouse and our co-workers, but we don't emotionally connect with them the same way. We have positive associations and negative ones; we have strong bonds and we are loosely attached to others. Relationship with Jesus is, in many ways, just like the relationships we have with those in our lives. Sometimes our relationships are simple, easy-going, comfortable. Sometimes they are turbulent, challenging or intermittent.

So then, how do we strengthen those connections? Through prayer, fellowship, discovering Jesus' relationship with you and sharing that friendship with others. All that can be found in Christlife: Discovering Christ.

## VACCINATIONS AND THE COMMON GOOD

In March, the Michigan Catholic Conference published a newsletter on vaccinations. With the school year quickly approaching, I thought I would share some of the information.

Medical advances have significantly reduced the rates of serious diseases in the United States. Vaccinations have become a major part of these preventative measures for children and adults, stimulating the body's immune system to recognize and to destroy diseases more effectively. Many people today are unfamiliar with the devastation caused by illnesses such as diphtheria, which can lead to extreme difficulty in breathing and swallowing, or polio, which can cause lifelong paralysis. Before vaccinations, these illnesses were widespread. For example, in 1921—prior to the existence of a vaccine— 206,000 Americans became ill from diphtheria and more than 15,000 died from it. In contrast, between 2004 and 2015, only two cases of diphtheria were reported, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). In the years preceding a vaccine, polio caused between 13,000 and 20,000 cases of paralysis annually. Polio vaccines were introduced in 1955 and 1963. In 1960, the CDC saw 2,525 paralytic cases of polio. Five years later, there were only sixty-one. Now polio has been considered eliminated from the United States for over thirty years.

Today, vaccines are regularly recommended in the United States to prevent against sixteen diseases: Diphtheria, Haemophilus Influenzae Type B (Hib), Hepatitis A, Hepatitis B, Human Papillomavirus (HPV), Influenaza (flu), Measles, Meningococcal, Mumps, Pertussis (Whooping Cough), Pneumococcal, Polio, Rotavirus, Rubella Tetanus, and Varicella (Chickenpox). Several others may also be recommended, depending on an individual's travel or circumstances, to prevent against illness such as typhoid, shingles, and rabies. Each are designed to protect individuals throughout their lives by boosting their body's natural defenses against a particular virus or bacteria. At the same time, vaccines also provide benefits for public health. Research shows that a greater number of people with vaccinations makes it more difficult for germs and disease to spread.

Recent events, such as the measles outbreak in a California amusement park in 2014, serve as a reminder that these diseases still have a significant impact on public health, especially in areas where many are unvaccinated. Physicians and parents benefit from having open discussions about vaccines and their effects on children, adults, and society as a whole. These discussions should include information about positive impacts, as well as the possibility of adverse events or symptoms a person may experience after a vaccination.

Michigan law requires children to receive certain vaccinations before attending daycare or school, before kindergarten, and before seventh grade. (See Michigan DHHS for further information)

God IS Good—ALL the time! The days are getting shorter, it is beginning to get cooler, and the last week of summer vacation has either slipped by us, or is upon us. Time flies faster and faster the older I get, yet there is still so much of life that is out there to experience. HOW I choose to experience it is MY choice.

Joshua give the Israelites a choice  $(1^{st} \text{ reading} - \underline{\text{Jos } 24:1-2a, 15-17, 18b})$ , Jesus gave all of His disciples a choice in the Gospel reading (Jn 6:60-69). Paul tells us how we *should* choose, in the light of the Good News (Eph 5:21-32), while Ephesians 2(a) tells us (very simply I might add) the right choice - <u>Live in love, as Christ loved us.</u>

Sounds kind of like a demand, doesn't it? It isn't. **We** decide, each and every day, in each and every decision, how we <u>do</u> and <u>will</u> live our lives. In college, the choice to attend a class, lecture or lab period, or to skip it to do something else (sleep, eat, read, study, etc.) leads us in our future choices. It *begins* to set the stage for our lives, adding bricks to build upon, sandbags to try and reinforce a weak system, or even a pile of loose dirt that can be easily washed away with a tiny amount of liquid.

I had a pastor once, who was watching a young boy in the congregation as the young boy watched his parents and mimicked everything that they did. A Sign of the Cross; kneeling, sitting, standing; singing along with the music and saying (loudly) "AMEN!" at the appropriate times during Mass. My pastor used this as an example at the end of the Mass as not just children learning from their parents, but the community learning from the community. We each teach, through our words and our actions, others as well as ourselves.

#### "Live in Love as Christ loved us."

I don't "need" to go to class this week, I know all of the material. I can take this pencil, they have them sitting all around and I need one, no one will miss it. I can miss Mass this week, I'm overly tired (on vacation, working, need to do homework). These decisions form (and malform) us as creations of God. He *gave* us the choice to "Live in Love" or not to. We are given chances (I have been given plenty more than I deserve) to "right" ourselves and to choose Love, for Love's sake. We are to choose it because it is the right thing to do. No one is pressuring us, but everyone IS watching us and learning from us.

I have always told the teens from various Youth Ministry programs that they are my check, my balance. They are the ones that watch what I do, when I'm having a good day *or* a bad one. They are the ones that have a responsibility to pull me aside when needed and straighten me out. When we are stressed, upset, tired, frustrated, depressed, etc. we open ourselves to stumbling from the wide line of Love. We all need people to tug us back, push us straight and sometimes to tow us, kicking and screaming, with Love TO Love.

Make a choice because it is right, people all around us are watching. Each one of us is the example (good or bad) of who and what we each purport to be. I am Catholic, because I choose (every moment) to do my best and follow the teachings (all, not just select ones) of the Church Universal. I fail at times, but God gave me (and each one of us) a mind to realize errors, a mouth to apologize for them, eyes to watch out for stumbling blocks AND for each other and a heart to forgive, accept forgiveness, and hold Love. The Love of our friends, our parents, our Pastor, strangers and most of all, the Love of Jesus in (and for) the world around us. Be the example (the best that you can be, constantly striving to be better) to all of those around you each day. This builds our virtue(s) and strengthens them so that they become reflexive, and we don't have to "think" about being good. We just will do the right thing.

I am trying to be a better example, but I still have to think too much about it! If we pray for each other, and give each other a hand (I need a few hands) we will each travel the road well. I hope to see many of you at <u>ChristLife—Discovering Christ</u> and learning from each of **you**, so that we all may,

"Live in Love as Christ loved us."


