Today we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, acknowledging that Jesus Christ is above all earthly rulers, past, present, or future. The solemnity of Christ the King was established in 1925, in the aftermath of the Great War and the rise of nationalism, which served to divide people and often cultures. Most solemnities (feast days) are focused on biblical events. In contrast, "Christ the King" is focused on an idea. The original motivation for the feast was to celebrate the dominion of Christ that transcends national boundaries and that makes war a sacrilege against Christ's body.

How can I mark this feast day? Today, war and terrorism still torment many areas of the world. On this solemnity, we can pray for these nations, we can pray for victims of acts of terror and of war. We can also recognize that Jesus Christ should reign in our lives, guiding us in our thoughts, our decisions, and our actions. We can acknowledge that in both the universe that is the entire world and the universe that is our own heart, Jesus Christ is Lord. To state it simply, we can do as we have been called to do – see each other as Christ does – sisters and brothers, sharing in building the Kingdom of God.

In what way is Jesus king in my life? How do I live in this world while living for God's kingdom?

ST. JANE FRANCES DE CHANTAL HEALTH MINISTRY FLU SHOT: YOUR BEST BET FOR AVOIDING INFLUENZA

Getting a flu shot often protects you from coming down with the flu. And although the flu shot doesn't always provide total protection, it's worth getting.

Influenza is a respiratory infection that can cause serious complications, particularly to young children, older adults and people with certain medical conditions. Flu shots are the most effective way to prevent influenza and its complications. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that everyone 6 months of age or older be vaccinated annually against influenza.

WHEN IS THE FLU VACCINE AVAILABLE?

It is available now. It takes up to two weeks to build immunity after a flu shot, but you can benefit from the vaccine even if you don't get it until after the flu season starts.

WHY DO I NEED TO GET VACCINATED EVERY YEAR?

New flu vaccines are released every year to keep up with rapidly adapting flu viruses. Because flu viruses evolve so quickly, last year's vaccine may not protect you from this year's viruses. After vaccination, your immune system produces antibodies that will protect you from the vaccine viruses. In general, though, antibody levels start to decline over time — another reason to get a flu shot every year.

WHO SHOULD GET THE FLU VACCINE?

The CDC recommends annual influenza vaccinations for everyone age 6 months or older. Vaccination is especially important for people at high risk of influenza complications, including pregnant women, older adults, and young children. Chronic medical conditions also can increase your risk of influenza complications, such as cancer or cancer treatment, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), cystic fibrosis, diabetes, obesity and HIV/AIDS. Check with your doctor before receiving a flu vaccine if you are allergic to eggs, or if you had a severe reaction to a previous flu vaccine.

CAN THE VACCINE GIVE ME THE FLU?

No. The flu vaccine can't give you the flu. But you might develop flu-like symptoms — despite getting a flu shot — for a variety of reasons, including:

Reaction to the vaccine. Some people experience muscle aches and a fever for a day or two after receiving a flu shot. This may be a side effect of your body's production of protective antibodies.

The two-week window. It takes about two weeks for the flu shot to take full effect. If you're exposed to the influenza virus shortly before or during that time period, you might catch the flu.

Mismatched flu viruses. In some years, the influenza viruses used for the vaccine don't match the viruses circulating during the flu season. If this occurs, your flu shot will be less effective, but may still offer some protection.

Other illnesses. Many other diseases, such as the common cold, also produce flu-like symptoms. So you may think you have the flu when you actually don't.

WHAT KIND OF PROTECTION DOES THE FLU VACCINE OFFER?

How well the flu vaccine works can vary. The flu vaccine is generally more effective among healthy children age 2 and older and adults age 64 and younger. Some older people and people with certain medical conditions may develop less immunity after receiving a flu shot.

According to the CDC, in past flu seasons when the match between the flu vaccine and circulating strains of flu virus is close, a flu shot is 40 to 60 percent effective in reducing the risk of getting influenza among people of all ages.

All Faith Formation Sessions resume this week and continue until the week before we celebrate the Birth of the Christ Child.

What were you thankful for this past Thursday? Were you thankful for great shopping deals, family getting together, family leaving once they got together? How about the food that was eaten and the sounds of snoring on the couch after dinner with football on in the background (oh wait, that's just my family)?

October was a month that celebrated life, from conception to death. Infants, the poor, the marginalized, those with cancer, and many other factors that surround us in life. November begins with the celebration of the Saints, and the next day we celebrate and remember those that have left us over the past year on All Souls day. We thank the veterans for their service and we celebrate Thanksgiving. Finally the retail industry thanks us by giving us great deals on items that we all "need" and "cannot do without."

A question I would like to raise this week is this: "what is true freedom?" Is it not having to follow rules? No, without rules, I might feel safe because I am "bigger" than most people and I can handle myself, but I can't always be there for my family and what would happen when the next "bigger" person comes along? No rules is NOT freedom! Is freedom doing what I want to do, when I want to do it? That's awesome until someone else expresses their freedom by doing something they want to do and it affects me in a negative way. So, that cannot be true freedom either.

A life of balance, one with rules (geez, just like those 10 commandments that God gave to Moses, hmmm) that aren't too oppressive and really reflect how we want to be treated by others. If we follow these simple rules and treat others how we want to be treated, wouldn't this be freedom? Sure, until someone decides to not follow the rules. Then what? Well, we are human beings, limited by ourselves, living in terms that we dictate to ourselves and decide to follow by our own free will, granted to us by God.

True freedom may never be seen here on Earth, because we are dealing with Human nature, which seems to always be looking at one another as competition as opposed to kindred. God created mankind in perfection to be with Him. Mankind decided that we knew better (just like a bunch of 2 year old children testing the rules of their parents) and we decided to separate ourselves from God. God took care of us and gave us those ten rules (all really focused around the singular concept of Love) to follow, but mankind decided that if ten were "good" hundreds of rules, must be better. Our minds know that hundreds are too many to follow, so instead of following them, we create even more rules to give exceptions to the first rules, that were put in place because someone, at sometime, decided that they had found the exception to the rule that.... Just the kind of circular (spiral?) reasoning that we find ourselves in today.

Jesus Christ King of the Universe—a King, wanting only the good of His subjects, wanting the best for all. That is what we conclude November with, and what we conclude our Liturgical year with—a celebration of the ONE that we should be holding up as an example. Not "just" a prophet, not "just" man, but God as well, who has known from the beginning that true freedom is found in the oneness of God, and who through example of life, leads us back towards God, and through His death has provided us the example of selfless Love which has laid down the bridge that allows us to join God again. Happy "New Years Eve" - we'll see you next Liturgical Year, when we feel the "coming wind" of Christ in our lives again!
