Each year, in January, Catholics have offered eight days of prayers for Christian Unity. Until 1958, the general idea was that those who were not Catholic would return to the Catholic Church. The Catholic Church no longer holds that idea. It was St. Pope John the XXIII, who at the conclusion of the Church's week of Prayer for Christian Unity made a historic announcement that changed the Catholic Church. On January 25, 1959, he announced his intention to call an Ecumenical Council.

St. Pope John XXIII's intention was that this Ecumenical Council be not only for the Catholic Church but for all of Christianity. He desired that all churches, Catholic, Protestants, and Orthodox, come together and overcome their divisions that have separated these churches for centuries.

One of the most famous quotes by St. Pope John XXIII was the quote he used to begin the week of Christian Unity. He said; "Let us begin with what unites us and not the things that divide us." In this simple yet powerful statement the Pope was challenging all those gathered to reflect upon their own Baptismal call. It is our common baptism that unities us as brothers and sisters.

Since 1959, we have seen many ways in which Christian churches throughout the country as well as the world have come together to work as one to proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ and promote unity among each other.

As we celebrate the week of Christian Unity this January, may we reflect upon our own baptismal call and be of service to the Church. God has gifted each one of us; the challenge is to be aware of our gifts and not be afraid to share them with the greater community. **Ut Unum Sint—"That all may be one."**

Sunday of the Word of God

Next week, on the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time, we will celebrate the Sunday of the Word of God for the first time. Last year, Pope Francis instituted the Sunday of the Word of God, “so as to appreciate the inexhaustible riches contained in that constant dialogue between the Lord and his people” (*Misericordi et Misera*, 7). The Scriptures are treasures filled with count-

less riches! From Genesis to Revelation, God speaks to us in human language. By speaking to us, God reveals His part in this great love story: “God is love, and whoever remains in love remains in God and God in Him” (1 John 4:16).

In the Archdiocese of Detroit, we hear a lot about the power of the Word of God. We speak of the Gospel as something to be unleashed. We recognize that the Word of God has the potential to change hearts. When we proclaim the Word to others, they encounter the *power* of the Word and the *person* of the Word: Jesus Christ. But have you personally spent enough time hearing what Jesus is saying to you through the Word?

Pope Francis is asking everyone in the Church, every diocese, parish, family, and parishioner, to read and listen to the Word of God anew. In preparation for the celebration of the Sunday of the Word of God, consider your favorite Scripture passage. How has God used it to speak to you, change your heart, lead you, or bring you peace? Ask yourself: how can I be open in these coming days to receive the gift of loving the Word of God more? How can I make my own these words from today’s psalm, “In the written scroll it is prescribed for me, to do your will, O my God, is my delight, and your law is within my heart” (Psalm 40:8-9)?

Human Trafficking of Children

(U.S. Department of Education)

How to Identify a Victim of Human Trafficking*

- Has unexplained absences from school for a period of time, and is therefore a truant
- Demonstrates an inability to attend school on a regular basis
- Chronically runs away from home
- Makes references to frequent travel to other cities
- Exhibits bruises or other physical trauma, withdrawn behavior, depression, or fear
- Lacks control over her or his schedule or identification documents
- Is hungry, malnourished, or inappropriately dressed (based on weather conditions or surroundings)
- Shows signs of drug addiction
- Demonstrates a sudden change in attire, behavior, or material possessions (e.g., has expensive items)
- Has a “boyfriend” who is noticeably older (10+ years)
- Makes references to terminology of the commercial sex industry that are beyond age specific norms; engages in promiscuous behavior and may be labeled “fast” by peers

Human trafficking involves force, fraud, or coercion.

Report trafficking if you suspect it:

HEALTH MINISTRY

January is **GLAUCOMA MONTH**. Glaucoma is an eye disease that has no symptoms, no warning signs and is a leading cause of vision loss and blindness if left untreated.

What is glaucoma? Glaucoma is a group of diseases that can damage the optic nerve in the eye. The optic nerve is the part of the eye that sends electrical impulses for sight to the brain.

What causes glaucoma? Clear fluid flows in and out of a small space at the front of the eye and keeps the tissues in the eye healthy. If this fluid drains too slowly, it puts pressure on the optic nerve and can cause glaucoma.

What are the symptoms of glaucoma? Often, there are no symptoms at first. Vision stays normal and there is no pain. But as the disease gets worse, side vision may begin to fail.

Who is at higher risk for glaucoma? Anyone can get glaucoma, but people at higher risk for glaucoma are: African Americans age 40 and older, all adults age 60 and older, those with family history of glaucoma, and also those with Diabetes, Hypertension, and previous eye injury.

How is glaucoma detected? An eye care professional can determine whether a person has glaucoma through a comprehensive dilated eye exam. During this exam, drops are put into the eyes to enlarge the pupils. The eye care professional is then able to see more of the inside of the eye to check for signs of damage to the optic nerve. Screening for eye pressure alone is not enough to detect glaucoma.

Does increased eye pressure mean that I have glaucoma? Not necessarily. Increased eye pressure means you are at risk for glaucoma, but does not mean you have the disease. A person has glaucoma only if the optic nerve is damaged.

How is glaucoma treated? Glaucoma cannot be cured, but treatment can help control the pressure in your eye and delay further damage to the optic nerve. The most common treatments include: medications, laser surgery, or traditional surgery. Treatment usually begins with medication and, if needed, laser surgery.

How can I protect my vision? Early detection and treatment are the best ways to control glaucoma before it causes permanent vision loss. If you are at higher risk for glaucoma, be sure to get a comprehensive dilated eye exam every one to two years.

To protect your vision from other risk factors, follow your doctor's instructions for managing diabetes and hypertension. And be sure to use protective eyewear in the workplace and during sports and recreational activities. See your eye care professional and get a dilated eye exam.

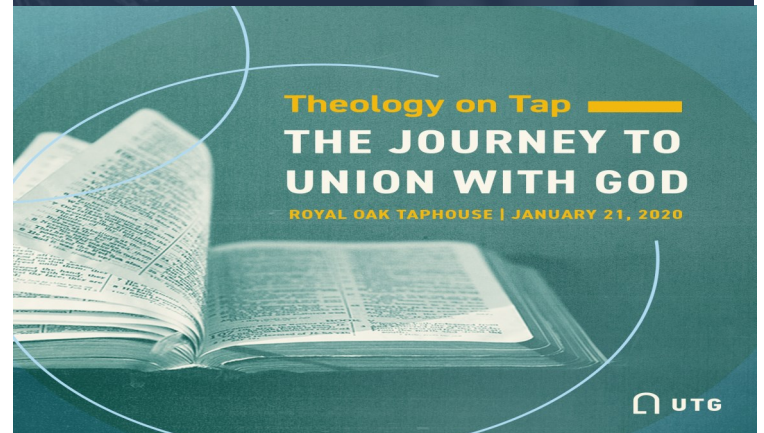

John the Baptist had been expecting the arrival of the Son of God, who would be known when the Holy Spirit came down from Heaven and rested upon Him. John testifies that Jesus is the Son of God, who will baptize with the Holy Spirit.

IN CHURCH:

Look for images of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove in your church. They may be hiding in stained-glass windows, paintings, or carvings on the baptismal font. Take turns standing under or near an image of a dove and asking God to send the Holy Spirit upon you.

QUESTIONS FOR THE WEEK:

- ◆ What is something you can do to share the Holy Spirit with other people?
- ◆ How are we to continue Jesus’ work in today’s world?
- ◆ What was Jesus’ life like before His baptism? After His baptism?

FAMILY PRAYER:

Thank you, God, for sending the Holy Spirit. Help us to be open to the guidance of your Spirit. Amen.

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF NEXT WEEK, IN PREPARATION FOR MASS:

- ◆ What does it mean to be a friend? Who are some of your friends? Why are they friends?
- ◆ Do you know the names of Jesus’ friends?
- ◆ What does it mean to follow someone? Is that different than being someone’s “follower”?

Welcome back to “Ordinary” time! This week, in the Gospel, we hear about Jesus’ baptism from the Gospel of John. It was similar, but different than the Gospel account from last weekend’s Masses. Why bring this up? I think that it is a very “ordinary” thing for us to experience!

Huh? Is this going to be a mind stretching exercise, Ben? Because if it is, I’m just going pack it in now! Wait, though... this is exactly the point. Too often, when something becomes “normal”, we breeze through it, only paying *half* attention to it, because, “I already know this story.” Do we really? At my age, on a three year cycle of readings, I am on my 15th cycle (give or take) hearing the readings in the setting of Sunday Mass. I *still* hear new things in each of the readings when I *actively* listen to them being proclaimed!

Ordinary time is the time that we should be exercising our minds and working out the muscles that had a little too much to eat over the holiday season. We are hit by the secular world every day! We come into contact with people who may or may not be followers of the Trinity. It can be very difficult at times, but that is *our* calling! We are to be out in the world spreading God’s Word to those that we come into contact with. Our celebration of the Mass is the time to offer up those good experiences AND the bad experiences. Mass gives us the nourishment (The Word and Eucharist) to continue our mission, to continue growing, and to offload those things that sometimes weigh us down. Mass (especially the Eucharist) is to be the summit of the week past and the source of the week to come.

If you are like me, you get inundated with messages that aren’t very Christian, or worse yet—messages that offer a watered down Christianity. These watered down versions, stories, TV shows, etc. can too often be taken as truth because they are “ordinary,” but we need to be in constant discernment about being able to filter Truth from truth. Discerning takes regular practice in an “ordinary” world where things rarely go as planned. We need to be ready!

These next several weeks of “Ordinary” time, take some time to look at the ordinary world around us and make an “extra”-ordinary contribution to spreading the message, which has been passed to us, to others! Gain the courage and understanding of how to do this by *actively* listening at Mass, receiving (not taking) the Eucharistic meal, and offering the week just experienced, as well as the week before you, to God. Then share your experience with someone, offer it up next week, and be extraordinary yourself!

For our Faith Formation parents:
 This weather can be tricky to negotiate at times, especially when dropping off and picking up your young disciples! For you, we will be opening up a room, a “lounge” of sorts, so you can remain in the building and complete some work, read a book, socialize with other parents and meet fellow parishioners. Consider coming in from the cold car and taking some time for you. Come in for prayer with your children, and we will get you to where you need to be after!

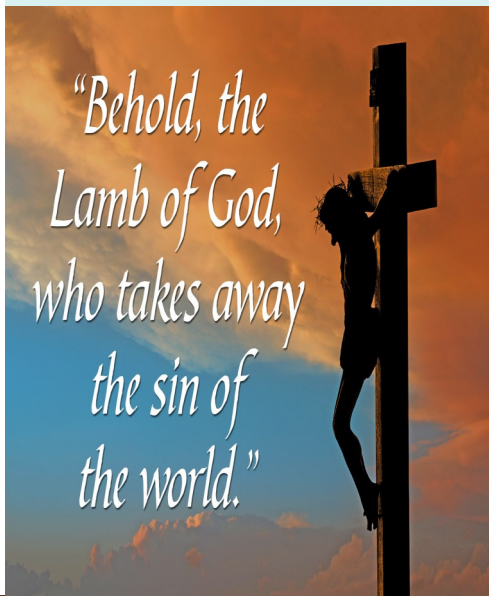
