The traditional day to celebrate the Epiphany is January 6th. This year, we celebrate on January 2nd, as it falls on a Sunday.

Falling twelve days after Christmas, the Epiphany was regarded as enough time for the magi to travel to Bethlehem from foreign lands to pay homage to the newborn King. With their arrival, Jesus is now made known to the outside world. Just as the star in the east symbolized the light of Christ shining for the whole world to see, we are called to show Christ in our lives so others can realize the Good News wherever we go.

We might ask ourselves today: To whom do I pay homage? Are they worthy of my respect?

EPIPHANY BLESSING

“Chalking the door” is a way to celebrate and literally mark the occasion of the Epiphany and God’s blessing of our lives and homes. With time, the chalk will fade. As it does, we let the meaning of the written symbols sink into the depths of our hearts and be manifest in our words and actions.

A traditional way of writing this blessing is to use chalk to write above the home’s entrance, “20 + C + M + B + 22.” The letters C, M, and B have two meanings. First, they are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also abbreviate the Latin words *Christus mansionem benedicat*, or, “May Christ bless this house.” The “+” signs represent the cross, and 2022 is the year.

To begin, first bless the chalk:

Leader: “Our help is the name of the Lord.”

All reply: “The maker of heaven and earth.”

Leader: “The Lord shall watch over your going out and your coming in.”

All reply: “From this time forth for evermore. Let us pray.”

Together: “Loving God, bless this chalk which you have created, that it may be helpful to your people. Grant that through the invocation of your most Holy Name, we who use it in faith to write upon the door of our home the names of your holy ones Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar may receive health of body and protection of soul for all who dwell in or visit our home. We ask this through Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.”

To bless the home:

Using the blessed chalk, mark the lintel of your front door (or front porch step) with “20 + C + M + B + 22.” While doing so, say:

“The Three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God’s Son, who became human two thousand and twenty-two years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the New Year. Amen.”

Then offer the following prayer:

“Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love, and grant that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch.

“May we grow in grace and in our knowledge and love of you. Guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen.”

The St. Jane choir members are always a source of joy and wisdom. Recently one of them mentioned, of all things, haiku, and how a particular verse touched her.

As you may recall if you studied poetry in school, haiku is a very specialized Japanese form of poetry which incorporates all our senses in a brief three-line message with a very specific syllabic form of five, seven, and five syllables for a total of 17. It's basically artistic discipline and is naturally an exercise in neat, concise language. However, the meaning of a haiku is left up to personal interpretation, much like how the weekly Sunday readings and the Gospel speak to us as individuals.

This haiku was written by Kobayashi Issa (also known as Kobayashi Yataro or Kobayashi Nobuyuki). Issa is a pen name which means "cup of tea," or, according to another poet, Robert Hass, "a single bubble in a cup of tea." Pretty specific! The translation is by Jane Hirshfield:

"On a branch
 floating downriver
 a cricket, singing."

Immediately, the senses take over:

Sight: You can see the branch—is it large or small? Old or new? Where did it come from? Did someone throw it in the river, or did it break off? How does it move through the current?

Hearing: Can you detect the sound of the river and the flowing water? Can you hear the cricket? Is it chirping slowly or quickly?

Smell: The aroma of a forest is unique, and the river too—but what do you detect predominantly?

Touch: We all know the silky feel of water; is it cold? Is the branch rough or smooth?

In a sense, we are all on a branch, floating down the river of life, and it is up to us to go along with it—or not—but also to forge our own path based on our faith and beliefs. However, the one element of this poem which speaks loudest is the last line: A cricket, singing...

Despite everything that happens in life, doesn't it seem as if music is constantly a part of it? The cricket sings. We sing. Whether we're happy or sad, busy or not, through all of life's activities, music is a major addendum of what we do. Enslaved people sang when they felt there was no hope in life—it got them through the tough days and nights. Alzheimer's patients might not remember their names or their family members, but they do remember their favorite songs. During major tragedies or catastrophes, there's music of remembrance. At funeral Masses, music is a very important and meaningful aspect of the service. At happy occasions like weddings, baptisms, anniversaries, and birthdays, music is universally present all over the world. In that, we can all embrace as humankind.

So please, whatever happens in this beautiful new year, rejoice in the days God has given to us and always keep a song in your heart. Sing it out loud if you wish (and especially so, in Church!) or keep it to yourself.

Whatever you do, just remember that music can be a direct line of prayer from your soul straight up to heaven.

HABITS OF HIGHLY EFFECTIVE DISCIPLES

Are you a better disciple today than you were a year ago? It's a great time of year to review what we need to change and improve in our lives. To be a better follower of Jesus, we should be practicing the habits of good discipleship.

Jesus should be at the center of our lives. Take the time in prayer to discuss this with Jesus: Who is He to you? Is He at the center of your life? Do you prioritize time with Him? Look at this honestly with Jesus; He is not harshly judging you for imperfections. He wants to draw you closer to Him.

Sacramental life. Christ instituted His Church and the Sacraments as pure channels of His sanctifying grace. This is the lifeblood of a disciple. A disciple makes it a habit to regularly and reverently participate in the Sacraments. If you are able, are you attending Mass on Sundays? Do you prepare yourself in prayer before Mass to receive the Eucharist? If you are not able to attend, are you keeping the Lord's day holy and making spiritual communions?

Prayer is essential for communicating with God and developing that personal relationship with Him. We can pray vocal prayers like the Our Father, the rosary, and the Divine Mercy Chaplet—but we should also be spending time in silence, becoming aware of God's presence and listening to Him. We should share with Him all our hopes, worries, joys, and fears, and then let Him love us, calm our hearts, and direct us.

Scripture. As disciples, a very important habit to develop is spending time with the Word of God. We should set aside a few minutes each day to read Scripture. This can be part of our prayer. The Word of God is living; the Holy Spirit breathes in and out of the words of Scripture. As disciples of Jesus Christ, we need to be immersed in the Word so that we come to know who He is, how He wants us to live, and what He wants us to do.

Community. Another essential habit of discipleship is to be connected to community. We are not saved as individuals but as members of the body of Christ, and we know that where two or three are gathered, Jesus is in the midst of them. We are made for community. God offers us the gift of holy friendship with each other so that we might encourage each other. During the pandemic, we have felt the difficulty of being deprived of connection to others. One of the best ways to connect with a community of disciples is to participate in a small group. These are simple gatherings of a few people to share faith and reflect on Scripture together through regular meetings. It's easy to participate in or even lead a small group. You might want to invite friends or family to convene for this purpose by joining or leading a small group. Regardless of how you connect, be sure you are making a concerted effort to connect with and support fellow disciples, as well as finding disciples who can encourage and support you.

A native of Bohemia, John entered the seminary and was nearing ordination when he departed for the United States. He joined the Redemptorists and served as a priest in New York, Maryland, and Pennsylvania.

In 1852, he was named the fourth bishop of Philadelphia. He founded more than 50 churches and greatly expanded Catholic education.

John had a fondness for immigrants and knew six languages. His pastoral zeal was evident up to his last moments of life. He passed away at age 48.


