Two weeks ago, we heard words from the book of Hebrews that are familiar to every priest. These words are spoken at every ordination:

“You are my son: this day I have begotten you; just as he says in another place: You are a priest forever in the order of Melchizedek.” (Hebrews 5:1-6)

On November 22nd of this year, I will celebrate my 35th anniversary of being ordained as a priest. As I reflect upon the past 35 years, I recall with great fondness the 16 classmates who were ordained with me that year. The time we spent in the seminary as we prepared for our life in service to the Church and to the people of God were four great, very memorable years.

Of the 16 that were ordained in 1986, four have died, four have left the priesthood, three have retired, and five are still pastors of parishes throughout the province of Michigan. Until its closing in 1987, St. John’s Provincial Seminary was a major seminary in the state of Michigan. Anyone wishing to study for the priesthood within the province of Michigan attended St. John’s for his theological studies. So, during my time at the seminary, I was able to meet people from all over the state.

How quickly 35 years has gone. It seems like only yesterday that I was unpacking my bags at my first assignment, St. Linus in Dearborn Heights. A lot of water has flowed under the bridge since those first days after ordination.

I am grateful to God for calling me to the priesthood, for the many people I have met along the way, and for the many experiences I have had. I would be remiss if I did not recall the challenges that have graced my life and my ministry. They serve as a reminder to me that all things are possible with God if we just stay out of His way. As I have said so often, this is God’s work we are about, and not our own. Indeed.

The Church has changed in the past 35 years. The Church I was ordained to is not the Church of today. The Church is ever-changing, just as we are. However, two things will always remain the same: that God is always faithful to His people, and that the Eucharist is the summit and source of who we are as Catholics.

I ask that you pray for me as I will pray for you. Together, we are on a journey of faith. And together, we will build up the Body of Christ.

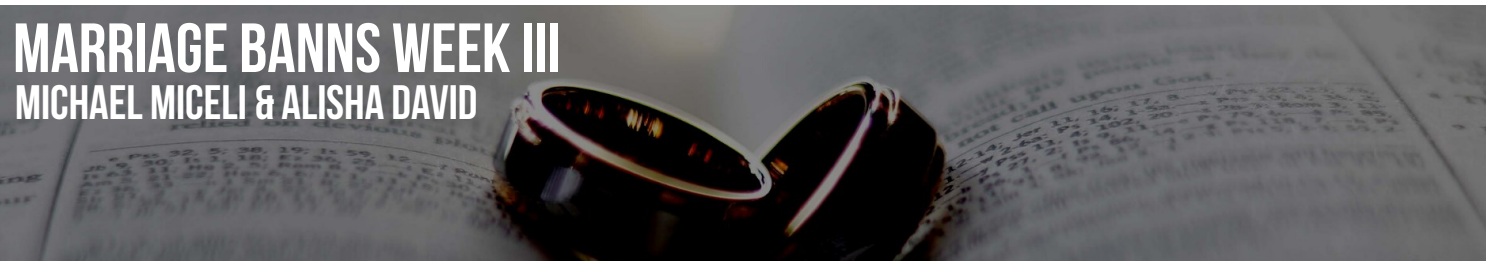

Holidays are a time to give thanks to God for the blessings we have received—**and to share those blessings with families in need.**

For both Thanksgiving and Christmas, our St. Vincent de Paul chapter provides holiday meal packages to **families in need** within our parish boundaries. This only happens because of the **generosity of you, the parishioners.**

DISPOSAL OF RELIGIOUS ITEMS

As Catholics, we are accustomed to having religious objects "blessed," which signifies the permanent sanctification and dedication of an object for some sacred purpose. Once a religious object is blessed and dedicated for divine worship or veneration, it must be treated with reverence and must not be used in either an improper or profane way (Code of Canon Law #1171).

But what happens when the rosary or statue breaks and is irreparable? Or, when the palm dries out, and the following Palm Sunday provides us with new palm? The general direction given is that anything that has been blessed should be burned or simply buried. When we burn something, the ashes should be buried.

As a Catholic, collecting sacramentals such as votive candles, religious pictures, rosaries (which sometimes break), medals, palm branches, and other miscellaneous religious items is fairly common. What do you do if you are unsure if they are blessed? One option, if these items are still usable, is to give them away to other people who could use them. If you can't find any takers, a respectful disposal should be made.

It is not a sin to throw away blessed items, but out of proper respect, one should dispose of them by burning or burial. If devotionals have **not** been blessed, such as some of the holy cards that come through the mail, then they are simply pictures and can be thrown away. If you feel uncomfortable throwing them away, you can burn or bury them as well.

EXPLAINING THE GOSPEL VERSE

This gospel reading is a beautiful introduction to the season we are about to enter, Advent. Its imagery is spectacular with the powerful nature of the sun, moon, and stars contradicted by the simple symbolism of the fig tree.

Each portrayal teaches us about patience and waiting. So many things in nature teach us lessons about life, the world, and God. We only have to open our eyes to see the majesty and many blessings bestowed on us, along with the signs God sends our way to beautify and brighten our day. We receive all this as we wait for what lies ahead in life: the path we have to choose and the decisions we have to make next.

COVID-19 has taught us much about patience, but in today's gospel, we hear lessons about patience directly from Jesus, whose wondrous welcome into this world we will soon prepare to celebrate.


ACTIVITIES

Musical Chairs: Gather some family members, neighbors, or friends and play musical chairs. This game emphasizes that the music can stop at any time, and we need to be ready for it, just like today's gospel reading reminds us to be ready and waiting for signs from God.

Waiting for Advent: Celebrate the start of Advent by making a paper chain to count down the days.

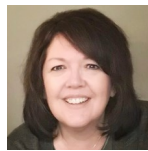

Today is World Day of the Poor.

“True freedom—freedom in Christ—does not seek personal interests, but is guided by love and is expressed in service to others, especially to the poor. Love makes us free, it leads us to choose and to do good. It motivates us to serve.”

(Pope Francis, General Audience, October 2021)

Who lives in poverty in the United States?

All those who make less than the Federal government’s official poverty threshold—which for a family of four is about \$25,700—are living in poverty. People working at minimum wage, even holding down multiple jobs, are living in poverty. Seniors living on fixed incomes are living in poverty. Wage earners suddenly out of work are living in poverty. Millions of families everywhere from our cities to rural communities are living in poverty.

Poverty does not strike all demographics equally. For example, in 2018, 10.6% of men and 12.9% of women lived in poverty in the United States. Along the same lines, the poverty rate for married couples in 2018 was only 4.7%—but the poverty rate for single-parent families with no wife present was 12.7%, and for single-parent families with no husband present was 24.9%. In 2018, the poverty rate for people living with a disability was 25.7%. That’s nearly four million people living with a disability—in poverty.

PROPER DISPOSAL OF PRESCRIPTION DRUGS BY THE ST. JANE FRANCES de CHANTAL & ASCENSION HEALTH MINISTRY TEAM

Keeping unused prescription narcotics in your home can be dangerous to you and your family—but proper disposal can be inconvenient, as drug disposal sites are not always readily accessible. Tossing prescription drugs into the garbage leaves open the potential for someone to retrieve and abuse them or to sell them illegally. Throwing them into the sewer can cause seepage into our water system.

Many people who misuse prescription opioids take them from their friends or family—including from their medicine cabinets, bedrooms, or even purses and briefcases. Your pets or young children could also find unused medications; this can lead to an accidental poisoning or overdose.

The Macomb Partnership for Overdose Prevention (MPOP) has provided our parish with DETERRA bags that can be used to deactivate and dispose of unused medication. Simply empty the medications (pills, liquid, patches) into the DETERRA bag, partially fill the bag with warm water, wait for 30 seconds, seal the bag, and dispose of it in your trash. It is simple, safe, convenient—and free!

Help forestall the spread of drug abuse by keeping your unused prescription drugs off the streets and properly disposing of them through the DETERRA bag or a drug disposal site in your area.

Our Parish Nurses will be in the Gathering Space distributing DETERRA drug deactivation bags **after all Masses on November 20 and 21, 2021**. These bags are free, but unfortunately, we only have a limited supply.

Please also check our Health Ministry bulletin board in the hallway for a list of sites in Macomb County where you can drop off your unused or expired drugs.
