**Fr. Jerry Slowinski** ext. 102 **Pastor**  One of my favorite things about Christmas is the lights. Christmas lights. My enjoyment of Christmas lights is that it serves as an antidote for what we face around this time of year. It gets dark so early here in Michigan as we draw closer to the holidays. Sunset is less than 6 minutes after 5:00pm in late December. Winter in these parts can be a gloomy and desolate time. That is

why it is so enjoyable to drive down streets that are bathed in Christmas lights. The glow of Christmas lights transforms a dark night into something warm and magical. It is no coincidence that we celebrate Christmas just a few days after the winter solstice – the shortest day of the year in terms of daylight. In fact, the darker the night, the more radiant is the light which shines through the darkness.

The prophet Isaiah wrote that "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light" (Isaiah 9:2). When the Word became flesh and dwelt among us, St. John writes that He is the "True light coming into the world. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it" (John 1:5). In Chapter 8 of John's Gospel Jesus tells all who will listen that "I AM the light of the world" (John 8:12). Jesus. Light. Dispelling Darkness. Making things bright. Brighter than Christmas tree lights. A light so bright it destroys the shadows and darkness of even sin, despair and death.

What we celebrate on Christmas is that into the darkness, angels appeared over Bethlehem. The Son of God shows humanity, His face from a manger. Into the darkness, God places a star to guide the magi. Into that darkness Jesus walks head on. To heal, to reconcile, to lift up the poor, the marginalized, the destitute, the overlooked and those who were reviled and loathed. Even the darkness of Good Friday could not extinguish the Light which came into the world on Christmas.

Christ enters into our own darkness as well – whatever that darkness may be. Despair. Doubt. Unbelief. Sin in you. Sin around you. A family falling apart. Death stealing your loved one. Into all of this the light of Christ shines through. The Lord offers to us what we long for the most. Peace. Light. Forgiveness. Strength. Consolation. Hope. No shadows. No darkness. Jesus is the light of the world. His birth rescues us from every type of darkness imaginable.

It is my fervent desire that you are able to experience the gifts that the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords offers you, not just at Christmas, but throughout the year. On behalf of the entire staff of St. Jane Frances de Chantal parish, we are grateful for your presence here by joining us in worship and prayer; by giving "Glory to God in the Highest." You are always welcome in this church, this parish, this community of faith. We invite you to experience the Light of Christ, which nothing can douse or snuff out. It is that Light which brings us comfort so that we never have to fear the darkness. It is that Light of Christ that we are called to share with others.



### **The Liturgical Year**

The Liturgical Year begins each year on the first Sunday of Advent and ends on the Saturday that follows the Feast of Christ the King (the last Sunday before Advent begins). It is divided up into five different seasons. As we move through the seasons you will notice changes in the tone and celebration of the liturgies.

**Advent**...Every Advent, we celebrate Jesus' coming as an infant long ago, His ongoing presence with us now, and His return in glory in the future. Advent, [lasting four weeks] is also a season of repentance. We know as Christian disciples in the 21<sup>st</sup> century, during each Advent God calls us anew to figure out how to live in relation to a world that frequently wants little or nothing to do with the birth of Jesus. Ours is the mission to prepare the Lord's way.

**Christmas**...Christmas in the liturgical year is more than a day. (This year we have 16 days to celebrate Christmas.) In the Christmas Masses celebrating the Solemnity of the Nativity of the Lord, we hear of Jesus born for all of us. In Him the grace of God appears. He is the Word made flesh. We are called to respond in worship, in joy, and in love for God and one another.

Lent and Holy Week...Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Lenten discipleship is about returning, about making our way back to the Lord. Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving help us on this journey. Just as Jesus' disciples were not free from sin, neither are we. We need the Lord to remind us of His everlasting mercy, of His covenant with us, of His forgiveness. The forty days of Lent give us the opportunity to accept God's forgiveness, to humble ourselves, to renew our commitment to living the commandments, to have God transfigure us.

**The Sacred Triduum and Easter**...Our journey of discipleship has led us here to the Sacred Triduum, the "Three Days" which celebrate the Paschal Mystery of Jesus' Life, Passion, Death, and Resurrection. These days are the center of the liturgical year and the celebration of the events of these days make them present today. The liturgy of these days in one feast, with the Easter Vigil as the climax of the entire liturgical year.

Jesus is raised from the dead. Repent. Be baptized for the forgiveness of sins. Receive the Holy Spirit. This is the message of Peter and John as we follow the story of the Church after the Resurrection of Christ. The seven weeks of Easter Time give us an opportunity to reflect on this message as we internalize what it means to be Easter disciples at this time in the Church's history.

**Ordinary Time**: Winter, Summer, Fall. Ordinary Time offers us an opportunity to step back and reflect on the meaning of our faith as a whole. This time period allows us to ponder the mystery of faith in its entirety every time we gather to celebrate Mass. "Follow me." "Come after me." These are Jesus' invitations to the first disciples. They are also His invitations to us. In the Seasons of Ordinary Time, the meaning of discipleship centers on our willingness to journey with Jesus. We ought to let the question of how we are to live as disciples here and now resonate with us as we discern daily how to follow Christ in the interim before He comes again in glory.



- Provide transportation for a parishioner to church or errands






#### COFFEE & CATHOLICISM— COMING SOON!

#### NEW EVANGELIZATION

We have many efforts for evangelization in place here at St. Jane Frances. You may be asking what is the New Evengelization? Here is an excerpt from Archbishop Vigneron's Pentecost Vigil homily that explains it. "Our prayer is that God will awaken the hearts of Catholics, 1) to encounter Christ anew. To meet Him freshly again...to fall in love with Him again; 2) to give ourselves completely into His hands again. To awaken the hearts of Catholics to grow daily as disciples. To make discipleship the first and all-encompassing aim in all that we do; and 3) to awaken the hearts of Catholics to witness to the power of His mercy, at home, at work, at school, wherever we are, so that others may know how good God is and receive from God, our Father, the grace He extends to them."

As part of the New Evangelization, we have put together an Intercessory Prayer Team. This group prays for the needs of our parish, our Church, our country, in addition to praying for our local and personal needs. We hope to become a very visible part of the New Evangelization in revitalizing our own prayer and the effects that prayer can have!!

#### Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God, Holy Day of Obligation— December 31, 2016, — Vigil Mass at 5:00pm January 1, 2017 — 9:00am & 11:30am

This feast, closely connected to the feast of Christmas, is the most important and oldest of the major feasts of Mary. It is based on the source of her privileges: her motherhood, Jesus Christ, God's Son "born of a woman", (Galatians 4.4) came to deliver us from sin and make us children of God. He is also Mary's Son, and she, His mother, helps bring His blessings to the world. She is "truly the Mother of God and of the Redeemer...not merely passively engaged by God, but freely cooperating in the work of our salvation through faith and obedience". (LG 53,56).





Merry Christmas and a Blessed New Year It's been some time, now, since I wrote to those of you in the family of St. Jane Frances, who may remember me, and may wonder how I am

doina. I am still seeing a retinal specialist about every six weeks now, to control the Macular Degeneration in my left eye. Each time I see him, he

injects my eye with a chemical that stops the bleeding in the veins affecting the central vision in my left eye. I still retain peripheral vision in my right eye. I have a full range of vision.

Thus, far, these injections and all of your prayers have been effective. I still retain sufficient vision to say my daily prayers, drive to the store for necessary groceries and maintain a relatively self-sufficient life for my sister and me. For this, I am grateful to God and to you for vour continued prayers.

Other than that, with God's continued oversight and support I'm in reasonably good health at this stage of my life.

I extend to all of you my two favorite blessings from scripture:
