Amen.

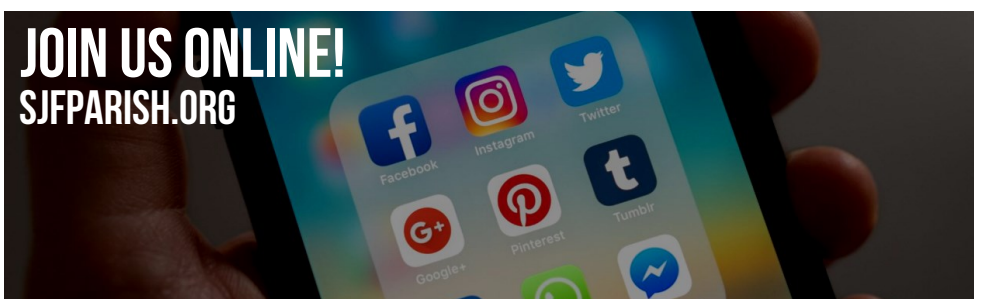

By now, you have received a letter from Fr. Tony regarding our Lenten suggestions for this year. They center around a plan to “Put your ashes into action!” There are many ways to do that, as indicated in the letter.

Here are a few more to consider as you make your plans for this season of praying, fasting, and almsgiving:

Consecration to St. Joseph: The Archdiocese is providing an opportunity to join in a 33-day consecration to St. Joseph. The act of consecration is a way of dedicating and entrusting yourself to the protection, guidance, and intercession of (in this case) St. Joseph. It’s another way to deepen your relationship with Christ through the Saints. You may remember my article on January 17th that covered the proclamation of this year as dedicated to St. Joseph. Pope Francis said, “Each of us can discover in Joseph—the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence—an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble.”

Sign up online at unleashthegospel.org/33-day-consecration-to-st-joseph. The journey begins tomorrow, February 15th, and concludes on March 19th, the feast of St. Joseph. This journey is completed via email and includes a daily email (or text) message with links to the day’s prayer. Please join me in this beautiful prayer form!

Read the Bible in One Year: Two weeks ago, on the Second Annual “Sunday of the Word of God,” which Pope Francis instituted on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, Archbishop Vigneron released a Pastoral Note entitled *The Power of the Word of God* on Scripture in the life of a disciple. The AOD is inviting everyone to sign up for their “Run so as to Win the Race” Scripture Challenge. Many people (maybe even you!) signed up for this challenge on January 1st. If you did not, you are encouraged to sign up and begin on Ash Wednesday. There are options to read the whole Bible or the New Testament in a year, and an option to read all four Gospels in just over five months.

Sign up at unleashthegospel.org/scripture-challenge. Reading Sacred Scripture draws you closer to God, encourages you to live as Jesus did, and provides insight on how to live out the Great Commandment to love God and one another.

Remote Stations of the Cross: If you cannot join us for Stations of the Cross on each Friday of Lent here at our parish (6:00pm each Friday—please take note of the earlier time), there are two options available at sjfparish.org/sotc. The new option for this year is *The Way of the Cross: A Prayer for Hope and Healing Amidst a Global Pandemic* by Zack Stachowski. The booklet is available on our website, along with a link to the guided prayer that’s accompanied by pictures, available at openyourhymnal.com/episodes/stations-of-the-cross.

This week, the Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time, is the last week of “ordinary” time for about 14 weeks. Ash Wednesday is the middle of this week, followed by Lent and the Easter

Season, and ending in Pentecost, the feast that we recognize as the time when the Disciples, of the recently ascended Jesus, received the Holy Spirit like “tongues as of fire” (Acts 2:3) coming to rest on each of them. As we look forward to the future and to upcoming events, we cannot lose sight of where we are now and our duties to the present.

In the current climate, we are asked to wear a mask to protect others from a virus which is easily transmitted from person-to-person. The largest danger with this is that each one of us could be a non-symptomatic carrier of the virus—meaning that I would not necessarily present any of the classic signs that I have the virus, yet I could still transmit it to someone else who could be affected greatly. In Jesus’ time (and before), medical knowledge was nowhere near our present understanding. As such, almost any malady that caused open sores on the skin could have been considered leprosy. Because actual leprosy (we now know this as Hansen’s disease—a curable bacterial infection) is contagious, people in biblical times with this malady were asked to separate themselves from the general public, keep their garments opened so that their sores were visible, and remain disheveled in appearance.

We can further examine the thoughts of the time, wherein afflictions such as leprosy were because of sin, perpetrated by either the afflicted or someone close to them. These afflictions were often thought to be a punishment by God, as a consequence of sin, but now we know better. Our God is a God of good. In God’s goodness, He allows us to make our own decisions (free will), and helps us when we ask for assistance, either for ourselves or for others (intercession). God does not force us to do anything against our will, and as such, we are responsible for our actions (and punishments). Jesus, in the Gospel reading this week, is moving from village to village throughout Galilee when a leper approaches Him. Jesus waits for the request of the man, and then heals him, but he also gives the man more to do: “See that you tell no one anything, but go, show yourself to the priest and offer for your cleansing what Moses prescribed; that will be proof for them” (Mk 1:44).

We are asked to simply wear a mask to protect others. I do not like wearing a mask; it is hard to breathe, my face feels like it is getting chapped from the moisture that collects inside, my glasses get fogged, and there is always that smudge at the bottom of my lenses where the mask meets the plastic. Even though I do not like it, I still wear my mask—for my grandfather, for my mother, and for my doctor who does his best to care for me (as well as everyone who comes into his hospital, many beyond the point that human intervention can help). We are not asked to separate ourselves from society, but simply to put a piece of cloth over our mouths and noses—not to restrict our freedom, but to protect the freedom of those around us: their freedom to live. I do not know what other peoples’ immune systems are capable of handling, so the least I can do is make sure my hands are washed regularly and that I wear a mask to prevent spreading something I might encounter.

In the second reading this week, in Paul’s letter to the Corinthians (1 Cor 10:31-11:1), he states this quite clearly. Take 5 minutes, read the Scripture, and remember: when we do everything for the glory of God, anything is possible!

Not surprisingly, Pope Francis is an ardent classical music fan, citing the works of Mozart, Bach, and Wagner: “Many texts and compositions, through the power of music, stimulate everyone’s personal conscience

and also create a universal fraternity.”

Earlier this month, the Pope praised musicians for “showing new creativity despite severe restrictions imposed on their work by the Coronavirus pandemic.” In a video message to the Pontifical Council for Culture, during the Fourth International Convention on Music, the Pope reflected on the communal dimension of music. He also sympathized with other artists who serve global communities at concert halls and entertainment venues, whose livelihoods have been threatened by all that the virus has wrought:

“We know [...] that since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, activity in the musical field has been greatly reduced. My thoughts are with all those who have been affected: the musicians who have seen their lives and professions disrupted by the demands of distancing; those who have lost their jobs and social contact; those who have had to face, in difficult contexts, the necessary moments of training, education and community life.”

Within the Archdiocese of Detroit music ministry community, I know of several musicians who have either lost their jobs, whose positions were downsized, or who have otherwise been impacted by COVID-19. Foremost in our minds is the fear of what’s to come, and how all of this will permanently affect our work in the Church: will our choir members, cantors, and musicians return? Many also ponder being exposed to COVID-19 and how the virus hampers the body’s ability to breathe, to produce a clear vocal quality, and to maintain energy levels. One colleague came down with COVID-19 last spring and recovered, but continues to suffer from exhaustion and shortness of breath—which is certainly problematic for a singer.

One area of confusion involves each pastor’s interpretation of AOD COVID-19 policies. As I travel to different churches to minister at funerals and weddings, it’s surprising how things vary from parish to parish. Fortunately for me, concerns of exposure don’t matter as much, because I’m somewhat removed from the congregation by the distance of the music area, or am up in a choir loft. Here at our parish, Fr. Tony is following the proper protocols with minimal music and congregational singing, including none during the entrance or closing processions, thus minimizing exposure for us all.

Lent is about to begin, and we’ll continue celebrating Mass as we have over these last ten months. While writing this, I don’t yet know if Archbishop Vigneron will choose to extend the dispensation, but I do know that people will follow their own hearts and safety precautions as to whether to attend Church in person or not. Many of you have said how much you appreciate the music, particularly the Communion songs, so I’ll continue to offer a wide variety of contemplative meditations.

Pope Francis also said this: “I hope that this aspect of social life can also be reborn, that we return to singing and playing and enjoying music together. Many texts and compositions, through the power of music, stimulate everyone’s personal consciences and also create a universal fraternity.” In closing, he quoted Miguel de Cervantes’ novel *Don Quixote*: “Donde hay música, no puede haber cosa mala,” which translated, means “Where there is music, there can be nothing bad.” As a musician, I take great comfort in the Pope’s words.

This way, we will all be working to help the local economy during these trying times.


