On Ash Wednesday, we embarked upon the season of Lent. As we, the parish community of St. Jane Frances de Chantal, begin our Lenten journey, may we pray for each other, but may we also lift up in prayer those people who are most in need of God's attention.

Recently I read an article from *America Magazine*, a weekly Catholic periodical published by the Jesuits. The article, titled "Lent May Once Again Don Its Public Mask," was written in 1978 and was reprinted in last week's edition of *America*. It asks the question, "What relevance does Lent have for Catholics?"

The author reminds us that the three disciplines of Lent, fasting, almsgiving, and prayer, enable us to renew or refresh our relationship with God—but that they also move us outwardly into society and the world, toward the people who are our brothers and sisters.

I often use the example of the generous donations the food pantry receives during the Christmas and Easter seasons. People are most generous at those times of year—and how wonderful that is to see. However, the needs of the poor and needy exist year-round. The good works we do are not only meant to be done during a particular season of the liturgical year. The good works we perform during the season of Lent must become a part of our lives and ministries as children of God.

The article from *America Magazine* states that "Lent calls us to step out of the ordinary precisely so that we can step back into it with eyes opened and hearts renewed. The tradition has always emphasized the practical aim of Lenten self-denial: a greater openness and sensitivity to the needs of others."


The author goes on to say, "Lent is, after all, the season of spring, of new life. Although its image may bear some cheerless connotations, its reality is refreshing. As American Catholics rediscover its ritual effectiveness, Lent may once again don its public face. And American society just might take notice."

This Lent, we continue on our journey to holiness to live life as a reflection of the love and teachings of Jesus Christ, made possible by the grace given us in the Sacraments.

Understanding that God desires to be in relationship with us, we begin our Christian life through the Sacrament of Baptism, the first of the three Sacraments of Initiation (the other two are Confirmation and the Eucharist, which will be covered in subsequent bulletins).

It is through the Sacrament of Baptism that we become children of God (Romans 8:15-17), heirs of heaven (Gal 3:23-29) and members of the Body of Christ (Romans 6:1-4). In the Gospel of John, Chapter 3, verse 5, Jesus affirms that it is through Baptism that humankind is saved: "Amen, amen, I say to you, no one can enter the kingdom of God without being born of water and Spirit." The Apostles were given the mission to carry out the Sacrament of Baptism in Jesus' name, as Scripture reflects: "Jesus came and said to them, 'All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember, I am with you always, to the end of the age"" (Matthew 28: 18-20).

Baptism is necessary for those to whom the Gospel has been proclaimed and to those who have had the possibility of asking for it. The *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (1258-1261) addresses baptism of desire for those who have not heard the Gospel and the issue of children who have died without baptism.

In the Sacrament of Baptism, the matter or "thing" through which God communicates with us is the blessed water that is poured on the head of the person being baptized or the water in which they are immersed. The blessed water symbolizes cleansing and death to sin as well as life and growth in the Spirit. The form, or the words that make present the action of the Holy Spirit, are, "I baptize you in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen." The minister of the Sacrament of Baptism is ordinarily a priest or deacon; in extraordinary circumstances, such as in the case of emergency or imminent danger of death, anyone with the right intention, Catholic or not, may baptize using water and the proper words. When this occurs, a follow-up with the person's pastor should be made and Baptismal records completed.

What are the effects of the Sacrament of Baptism? St. Paul, in Chapter 6 of his letter to the Romans, beautifully describes the grace received in the Sacrament of Baptism: "All of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death [...] We have been buried with him by Baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life" (Romans 6:3-4). When we hear this Scripture proclaimed each year at the great Easter Vigil, it is a strong reminder that we are all dead to sin by the grace of Jesus' sacrifice. As persons freed from the power of sin, we are graced with the ability to avoid sin and choose "the free gift of God" which is "eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23).

WHAT ARE THE SACRAMENTS OF INITIATION?

What are the sacraments? How do they bring us closer to God?

This Lenten season, join us on The Way of Faith as we explore the seven sacraments, how God speaks to us through them, and the great grace they impart.

As baptized Catholics, we take on the roles of priest, prophet, and king (as described in the Rite of Baptism). The role of priest for the baptized is to dedicate your life to serving Christ; the role of prophet is to proclaim the Word of God, and the role of King is to serve the people of God. We do this by:

- Rejecting Satan and sin.
- Following the teachings of Christ and His Church.
- Participating in the Christian community and in the liturgical and sacramental life of the Church.
- Serving others by providing for their temporal needs and also by sharing the faith and witnessing to it.

The Sacrament of Baptism leads us to a life of holiness; it is through prayer, study, community participation, service, and regular reception of the Sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation that we receive the grace needed to build on our Baptism and strengthen our relationship with God. Transformation begins with this Sacrament and our willingness to allow God to work in us.

This Lenten season (and into Easter), as we explore the seven Sacraments, we hope that you will come to a deeper understanding of and appreciation for the way God speaks to us through the Sacraments and for the great grace they impart. Next week, we will explore the Sacrament of Confirmation!

Last week, we found Jesus in the desert, dealing with Satan and what he "proposed" to offer our Lord. Some may see the desert as a hostile environment—and it certainly

can be—but sometimes the starkness, heat, and vast expansiveness of the barren land does indeed promote feelings of inner peace.

Years ago I was invited to a Native American reservation for a ceremony in the New Mexico desert. On our hands and knees, about 25 of us entered a traditional "Sweat Lodge," where we spent three hours of total darkness in a four-foot high circular impermeable tent. Large rocks that had been heated all day in a fire pit were brought into the circle's center and were repeatedly doused with a specially crafted ladle, increasing temperatures inside to over 135 humid degrees. The point? To quiet your mind, cleanse yourself of toxins, and to allow spiritual visions to come to you. Only a few of us lasted the entire time. Crawling out into the cool, crisp desert air, I don't know that I'd ever drawn a breath of air so pure, so welcome as on that night. I never saw any visions, but I did feel totally cleansed. The euphoria lasted for days. Afterward we shared a wonderful banquet.

In this week's readings, we move to the mountain. I've often wondered what calls an adventurer to scale the highest peaks. The preparations and processes are difficult and perhaps life-threatening. Here in the U.S., there are gentler hikes like Pike's Peak in Colorado and Desert Mountain in Arizona. One thing any climber can attest to is that the view from the mountaintop is entirely different from down below. It is magical, and pictures never do it justice. In today's Gospel, we don't know which mountain Jesus ascended, but the changes in His appearance that take place during the Transfiguration astounded followers Peter, John, and James. Witnessing this, wouldn't it be enough to change anyone?

There's a song we used to sing a long while back. It isn't in the more modern hymnals, but the words are an inspiration to us all. The song is titled *We've Been to the Mountain* by Tom Parker:

In the still of the morning, we awake with the dawn.

We live our day in the challenge of faith, but what will we have to lead us on? We'll just say that we've been to the mountain

and caught a glimpse of all that we could be.

We will know that a new day is dawning with a morning sun for all of us to see. In the rays of the sunrise, we find the warmth of new life.

Our faith is strengthened as the mysteries unfold. Where lays the answer? How will we know we've gone with Him to the hillside?

His glory He has shown to all: the sacred promise of a brighter morning sun. And living in our faith, we'll see the dawn...

EXPLAINING THE GOSPEL VERSE

In today's Gospel verse, something called the "transfiguration" happens. Transfiguration means a complete change of appearance to be more beautiful.

The Bible tells us that one day Jesus took three of His disciples, Peter, James, and John, and went up on a high mountain to pray. As Jesus prayed, His face was changed, and His clothes became a dazzling white. Suddenly, Moses and Elijah (prophets who had already died) appeared and began talking to Jesus. Peter and the other disciples had fallen asleep, and when they woke, they saw Jesus and the other two talking. They were stunned and amazed at that wonderful sight. What an experience!

Do you know what caused the face of Jesus to be changed and His clothes to become dazzling white? It was because they were in the presence of God. You and I have many wonderful experiences in our daily walk with Jesus. Others can see that we have the love of Jesus in our hearts by seeing His reflection shining bright in us.
