SECOND SUNDAY OF LENT

Last week I learned that a teacher I had in grade school has died. Sr. John Williams O.P. was my sixth grade teacher at St. Augustine Parish School in Richmond. If we were to look back on our school days, we would all be able to think of one teacher who made an impact upon our life. Sr. John Williams O.P. was the person who, for me, made the process of learning an adventure and just plain fun.

She could tell us a story about a particular country or place in the world and draw us into the story to the point that we thought we were there. One of the gifts of teaching is to stimulate curiosity and the desire to learn. Sr. John Williams O.P. would often remind us that you can travel anywhere you wish without leaving your seat, if you only read. Reading has become one of my favorite pastimes.

You may recall that public service announcement from many years ago: "Reading is FUNdemental." Reading is indeed fundamental to our life and to our vocation. In his book Rediscover the Saints, Matthew Kelly writes about twenty-five different saints who inspired change in the way people view life and their existence.

One particular saint in Matthew's Kelly's book is Saint Ralph. Saint Ralph was a Benedictine bishop in the ninth century known for his leadership and his love of learning. A love of learning is a quintessential life skill. The story of St. Ralph is not so much about him but how he inspired others to gain a curiosity for learning. Whether it is Saint Ralph or any saint of the Catholic Church, the stories written about them are there to encourage us, to inspire us, and to move us to do greater things with our lives.

May we encourage each other, and especially children, to develop a "beautiful curiosity"—a curiosity for the things around us, a curiosity for things yet to be discovered, and a curiosity for the many ways in which God reveals Himself to us. Too often I believe we live a life of should have, would have, could have but didn't. To develop a "beautiful curiosity" allows us to see beyond the place we find ourselves at the present moment and experience life in a new light or vision.

Bon mot: "Seize the moment of excited curiosity on any subject, to solve your doubt; for if you let it pass, the desire may never return, and you may remain in ignorance." — William Wirt

WHAT'S A BASILICA?

This past weekend, Ste. Anne Parish, the oldest parish in Detroit, was designated as a minor basilica. This is a great honor, but what does it mean? According to the Second Vatican Council, a basilica is expected to "stand out as a center of active and pastoral liturgy" and "set an example for others" in

the dignified celebration of the sacraments and devotions. Basilicas are expected to be especially attentive to the active participation of the faithful in liturgical celebrations. There are four offices/duties that the basilica should aspire to:

Liturgical education. "In a minor basilica, the liturgical instruction of the faithful is to be promoted by establishing groups concerned with liturgical activity, by special courses of instruction [...] and by other programs of this kind."

Special seasons. The whole liturgical calendar, especially the seasons of Advent, Christmas, Lent and Easter, is to be carried with special significance. "The word of God is to be diligently proclaimed either in homilies or in special sermons," and "the active participation of the faithful is to be promoted both in the Eucharistic celebration and in the celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours, especially at Morning and Evening Prayer," in addition to other devotions.

Singing the Mass. "Since the celebration of the liturgy takes on a more noble form when it is carried out in song, care must be taken that gatherings of the Christian faithful be associated with the singing of the various parts of the Mass, especially those found in the Ordinary." "In a basilica where the faithful from different nations or languages frequently come together, it is useful that they should know how to sing together in Latin the profession of faith and the Lord's Prayer, using more simple melodies like those composed in Gregorian chant which is 'proper to the Roman Liturgy.""

Special feasts. "To make clear the particular bond of communion by which the minor basilica is united with the Roman cathedral of Peter, every year there must be celebrated with particular care: the Feast of the Chair of Saint Peter the Apostle (February 22nd); the Solemnity of Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles (June 29th); and the anniversary of the Supreme Pontiff's election or inauguration into the supreme ministry."

ABOUT THE GOSPEL:

Family Jesus travels up a mountain Corner with Peter, James and John. Jesus transfigures and shines brightly. God speaks to the men

and shares that Jesus is God's beloved son, and God is very proud of Jesus. Jesus reassures his friends that they should not be afraid.

IN CHURCH:

Before Mass, challenge each family member to recognize one thing in the church, or a part of the liturgy, that has changed during Lent. If someone needs help, recommend that he or she pay attention to the Church's decorations, the priest's vestments, the Mass responses, or the music. After Mass, share what you each noticed.

OUESTIONS FOR THE WEEK:

- How have you helped a new person feel welcome at church, in the neighborhood, at school or at work?
- What did Peter, James and John see on the mountaintop?
- What do the brightness of Jesus' face and the whiteness of His clothes show about Jesus?
- Have your friends ever seen a change in you and let you know? What made you 'change'?

FAMILY PRAYER:

God, we know that Jesus is your beloved Son. Help us to listen to him. Amen.

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF NEXT WEEK, IN PREPARATION FOR MASS:

- How do we use water every day?
- What helps you learn? How do you help others learn?
- ♦ Who do you speak up for? Why do you speak up for them?

"(H)e was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light.

Matthew 17:2

God showed and told three of Jesus' disciples the nature of Jesus. We read a little later in this Gospel story that these disciples began to understand more about Jesus-but I wonder if they really understood that Jesus is the Messiah. Jesus does many miracles, and shows all of the people gathered around many wonderous things, but I still think that they see Him as a prophet and only a prophet. A little later, we see the disciples (soon to be Apostles) understand more what Jesus is telling them, but I wonder if they really understand it all. Now, this is my opinion, especially at my reading of this Gospel right now. This could change next time I read it, and again later on. I never claim to be a Biblical Scholar, or much of anything else, besides a person who has an interest in learning.

This is the last that we will hear from this Gospel of Matthew until Palm Sunday. But it (to me, at least) is key in beginning to understand each of our own individual journeys in faith. We walk along the same "path" in our journeys, but we never really walk the same footsteps as one another. Each of our perspectives is different, some glaringly different, some only slightly different, but all different, nonetheless. Everything that we do and experience, every moment of every day, forms us into what we are. Those three disciples needed to see the Transfiguration of Jesus, that is why they were chosen, but also why they listened and came with Jesus.

This past week, we were awarded a great opportunity to hear a pair of speakers during our Parish Mission. Stories were shared, and the Holy Spirit was present each of the evenings that we gathered. Sunday's story of conversion was phenomenal, but the thing that really stuck with me came Monday evening, when the question was asked, "What does this faith [of ours] mean to you?"

I think this is KEY to how each of us live our lives. My faith life has waxed and waned over the years. I stopped going to church for a while, I have explored different traditions, but this faith, which was instilled in my from my parents, became my own, once I decided to get involved, and listen to that little voice inside (as well as a number of voices from outside) that I was fighting against. Very rarely do I hear the messages that I want to hear. Most often I hear messages that I NEED to hear. Often times, these messages come in the form of a young person asking questions, and while I try to formulate an answer in my head, I often fail and I have to rely on the Holy Spirit to give me that answer for them.

I am tested and tried daily. My mind wanders, but the Good News of Jesus' sacrifice for me helps transform me more and more into who it is that God sees. I am still a long way off, and my progression is slow, but I change each day. I would challenge anyone who reads this to take advantage of mission talks here and elsewhere. Go on retreat, join a book or Bible study, sit in prayer, and listen for God's whisper; you will get what you need!

I just thought of an experience reminding us all of how too much pride can backfire. Throughout 47 years of

performing music in area churches, you may think things usually go easily, but quite often, they don't.

I worked with Fr. John Nowlan, a proud Irishman, from 1975—1988 when he was Pastor at St. Rita's in Detroit. After he left, he'd call upon me to do music at funerals and weddings elsewhere. We were a team!

One time, probably 25 years ago, he called me for a funeral in Pontiac at an older church. We both arrived early to meet the Pastor and get the "lay of the land." The Pastor was very gracious and showed us around, but was particularly proud of the organ and music setup. It had recently been modernized, and he was excited to point out that "this organ can play itself!" and that there was also an insert card that could mimic voices as if someone, or a choir, was singing. Father then laughed and said to me, "In fact, I'm not even sure why we need you!"

Fr. John scowled, as he wasn't a fan of all that techno-stuff, simply preferring live music and musicians. Anyway, the Pastor was eager to show us how this masterpiece worked, and he flipped the switch on the wall behind to turn it on. There was a *pop*, then nothing. His startled reply was "Well, *that* has never happened before!" Repeated attempts to restart the system failed. By then, the people were coming in. Fr. John stood stoically, arms folded, and finally asked, "Well... what happens now?" The Pastor turned to me and sheepishly said, "Uh, I guess that's where you come in."

Fortunately, there was also an acoustic piano, and even though the whole sound system was down—microphones and all—we still had a lovely liturgy of resurrection. Fr. John passed away in 2012 but certainly he's still smiling about this adventure. What is that saying—"Pride goeth before a fall"?
