Today, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. The ascension of Jesus to heaven marks a new time in the lives of the disciples. Jesus had already shown them how to preach, teach, and reach out to the sick,

the poor, and the afflicted in his name. They had even gone out in pairs to do this. But now Jesus tells them to continue to minister in his name, without his presence, after he has been taken up to be with the Father. Jesus promises they will not be alone—that he will give them the Holy Spirit, who will guide them, empower them, and lead them in witnessing to Christ to the ends of the earth. Jesus has not left them orphans, nor does he leave us orphans. We are guided by the Holy Spirit as we witness to our faith in our families, our workplaces, and our communities.

The first disciples faced a very challenging task from the beginning. The people who had shouted for Jesus to be crucified and those who stood idly by remained a factor, as this was only a short time later. The Jewish and Roman authorities were still in power. So when Jesus told his disciples that "you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you," he is not just speaking idly (Acts 1:8). He is reminding his disciples that a power greater than the power men have on earth would be theirs as they boldly proclaimed Christ to a hostile people.

The Holy Spirit is present to us just as the Spirit was present to the first disciples. We can call on the power of the Holy Spirit when we face opposition to the witness we make in the world. How are we actively witnessing to our



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faith? Do we speak up when someone says or does something unchristian? Do we speak out against injustice, whether social, political, or economic? Do we support those who act in charity for those in need? Or are we just "standing there looking at the sky?" (Acts 1:11).

Sometimes, like the disciples, we could also use a couple of God's messengers to remind us that our faith is an active faith. On the day Jesus ascended to heaven to remain with his Father, he commanded his disciples to carry on his ministry, proclaiming the good news to the whole world. Now we are that whole world. Now we are those disciples. As you reflect on this Gospel and the importance of today's solemnity, spend some time thinking about what you can do today to actively witness to your faith. As you reflect and pray, ask Jesus to strengthen your resolve to spread the Gospel in our world today.

## **KEEP BOTHERING HIM**

In the Gospel of Luke, chapter 18, Jesus tells his disciples the parable of the persistent widow: a widow lives in a town with an unjust judge who is described as neither fearing God nor respecting any human being. The widow persistently approaches the judge, pleading him to make a just decision for her against an adversary, and for a long time he refuses, until he decides, "Because this widow keeps bothering me, I shall deliver a just decision for her, lest she finally come and strike me." Because, he says, the widow keeps "bothering" him. The Lord continues to explain to his disciples, "Will not the God then secure the rights of his chosen ones who call out to him day and night?"

#### Beginning with the apostles

Novenas are much like the persistent pleas of this bothersome widow. Derived from the Latin novem, meaning nine, they are nine-day periods of prayer and meditation to implore special petitions, obtain special graces, or prepare for a feast day. They commemorate the nine days the apostles, directed by Christ, prayed in the upper room between his Ascension and the descent of the Holy Spirit. Huddled fearfully, confined in the upper room, the disciples and Mary kept constant prayer. Though we don't know their exact prayers, we can imagine they prayed in fear, unknowing, and sorrow, likely seeking answers, hope, and the "power from on high" that Christ promised them.

On the ninth day, a "strong, driving" wind filled the room where the disciples were gathered, and the Holy Spirit descended on them as "tongues of fire," giving them the ability to speak and understand in many different languages. The Holy Spirit also "clothed" the apostles in many gifts and fruits, equipping them to "go out and preach the Gospel to all nations." Into that room, they went fearfully shaking and sorrowful, clinging to their lives in prayer. Out of the room were born the first Christian evangelists, a Pope's first homily, 3,000 baptisms, and a zealous desire to preach the Gospel and the Catholic Church. The first novena for the infant Church had earth-shattering results.

#### **Outpouring of the Holy Spirit**

Our Church is invited to pray this powerful Pentecost novena, also called the Holy Spirit Novena, every year as a preparation for the feast of Pentecost and to obtain for ourselves an outpouring of the Holy Spirit and his gifts in our lives, as the disciples did unknowingly two thousand years ago. In his pastoral letter *Unleash the Gospel*, Archbishop Vigneron reminds us, "For the Church in Detroit, reliving the Gospel mysteries means that we continually return to the Upper Room, asking for a fresh outpouring of the Holy Spirit on us and on the whole region" (*Unleash The Gospel*, Guidepost 1).

The Pentecost Novena allows us to do just that—to sit in the upper room with the first apostles, comprehending the same sacred realities and mysteries. We can spend eight days alongside those saints in persistent and dedicated prayer, their desires and trials a not-so-distant echo of our own: fear about the future, a hunger for a Christ who may seem distant, sorrow for what and whom we've lost, a hope for something miraculous. And on the ninth day of the novena, we too can expect a Pentecost. We too will be "clothed in power" to preach the Gospel.

This weekend, in our readings for the Ascension of the Lord, the Acts of the Apostles (our first reading) begins, "In the first book, Theophilus..."

Names hold an important significance, helping to guide us in our life, showing us parts of our ancestry, and even redefining us, should we change our name, or elect to be called something else. A name is a recognition of each of us as individual human beings, as opposed to a single animal among many—say, in a flock or a herd. The name Theophilus comes from the Greek Theo, God, and philus, lover or friend. As I read both the Luca Gospel account and the Acts of the Apostles, I can envision a person named Theophilus, but I can also hear Luke addressing each one of us as "friends (lovers) of God."

As a friend, I truly desire what is best for my friend. I want them to be happy, to prosper, to grow, and to thrive. When they are happy, so am I. When they are feeling sick, sad, or low, so do I. If we read these scriptures and really understand ourselves as friends of God, then we know that God wants the best for us and wants us to be happy. Jesus wanted His friends to be happy as well, and He knew that His departure from them could lead to them being unhappy, and even sow fear within them. So, at His Ascension, He urged them to remain together in Jerusalem to be witness to God's promise of Baptism with the Holy Spirit (Acts 1:4-5).

Paul (whose conversion we heard of when he was called Saul), in his letter to the Ephesians, prays for the followers of Jesus, and encourages them "to live in a manner worthy of the call you have received" (Eph 4:1). Paul recognizes our humanity but challenges us to extend ourselves beyond our "care for number one" and to recognize God in each other. Yes, care for yourself, but see God in your neighbor and care for them, because our greatest example, Jesus, did as much (and more) for us. Jesus even sent the Holy Spirit as a helper and a guide to aide us on our mission. Our mission? In our Gospel, Jesus gives us our mission on earth in His "absence." In the Gospel of Mark (16:15), Jesus said to His disciples and to us, "Go into the whole world and proclaim the gospel to every creature."

Our mission is to spread the good news that God created us, loves us, and wants us to be happy in life with Him. We will mess up and move further away from God, but Jesus came and paid the price for our errors. He willingly chose to suffer and die for us, but He has risen from the dead and ascended to be at God's right hand. Because Jesus did this for each of us, we have been given a grace and an opportunity to not just confess our sins, but to have them forgiven and to enter our relationship with God again. When we choose this path, we are called to tell our stories and to help our neighbors (fellow Christians and unbelievers alike) find their way back into God's fold. We do not remain stagnant in faith, but grow and expand from a simple, minimal expectation into more. We are called to be and do more. We are called to be with God and His Son. Will we answer that call? Will we strive to be Theophilus?
