This weekend, the Church celebrates the feast of Pentecost—the birth of the Church. We observe the fulfillment of the Lord's promise to his disciples: "I will send you the paraclete. The Holy Spirit will instruct you on what you should do."

We read in the Catechism of the Catholic Church: "On the day of Pentecost when the 7 weeks of Easter have come to an end, Christ's Passover is fulfilled in the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, manifested, given, and communicated as a divine person: of His fullness, Christ, the Lord, pours out the Spirit in abundance."

There are many titles that are used to refer to the Spirit—the wind, the fire, the comforter—but there is one title that sums up what we are called to be as people who have been gifted by the Spirit: the Divine Architect. The Holy Spirit is the architect, and we are the coworkers in the building process. In the essay *Digging the Foundation*, I believe one section is the core of what we must do as people who are empowered by the spirit. It states that:

"[T]o fulfill God's plan for us, we must dig deep into the foundation of who we are; to do that, we must plow into the very depth of our being. God created us in His image and likeness, bestowing upon us gifts and talents that are unique to us and us alone. The challenge for us is to become aware of those talents and gifts, and to use them to enhance and to build up the body of Christ, the Church. As coworkers in the building process, we are called to work as one team with one common goal—namely, to proclaim the Gospel message, knowing at all times and at the core of our being that it is God's work that we are doing, and not our own."

Some questions to reflect upon:

What signs of growth can you detect in our Church?

How do we encourage individuals to share their gifts and talents with the parish community?

What particular gifts of the Spirit provide the foundation of St. Jane Frances de Chantal Parish?

We celebrate 44 years as a parish community in the city of Sterling Heights. May the Spirit that empowered our founders and forbearers continue to empower us to build up the Body of Christ. As we celebrate the Feast of Pentecost, may we reflect upon the prayer of the Holy Spirit. Come, Holy Spirit; fill the hearts and minds of your faithful servants. Spirit of the living God, fall afresh on us.

Pentecost marks the occasion of God sending the Holy Spirit upon Jesus' disciples after his Resurrection.

The book of Acts describes how the disciples

were gathered together in one place on the day of Pentecost. The Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shavuot, or the Feast of Weeks) was a day that commemorated the giving of the law to Moses, a day soon to be marked as well by the giving of the Holy Spirit.

On Pentecost, the Holy Spirit gave the disciples the strength to fulfill their commission to spread the Good News of Jesus. The Solemnity of Pentecost, which crowns and fulfills the Easter season, is a good time to pray for a deeper indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

PRAYER TO THE HOLY SPIRIT

The following prayer was recited by Pope Benedict XVI in a homily on November 7, 2006. This is a prayer to the Holy Spirit. Adapted from catholiccurrent.org.

Let us invoke him so that he will irrigate, warm, and straighten, so that he will pervade us with the power of his sacred flame and renew the earth. Let us pray for this with all our hearts at this time, in these days. Amen.

Quite often in Sunday readings, we hear of journeys near and far. They are teaching moments, and we can certainly learn so much from them. During the Easter season, the story of the Road to Emmaus has always

been a favorite, as it deals with unexpected people you meet along the way.

It was May of 1972 when I was summoned to my high school counselor's office. I sat in the hot seat for mere moments before Mrs. Summerville asked, "What are you doing this summer?" Surprised, I replied, "Well, family vacation to Tennessee, playing golf, tournaments, baseball, bike riding... the usual." She asked, "How would you like to go to Japan?" Because of the auto industries in the "sister cities" of Detroit and Toyota, Japan partnered with businesses like Toyota in an annual two-month student exchange trip, alternately sending four 11th grade students overseas. It was Detroit's turn.

With an application deadline of tomorrow, my mom and I raced around town to gather the needed information. Two interviews and one month later, three other students and I winged our way on a 40-hour journey to Tokyo via Chicago and Anchorage, Alaska. It was the first time I'd ever been away from home. We were supposed to go directly to Toyota, but a typhoon had recently destroyed parts of the city, and while recovery efforts were in place, we stayed in Tokyo for a month, each of us with a different host family. Finally, Toyota beckoned, and after a Bullet Train ride past Mt. Fuji, we met our respective host families. Here's the ironic part: of all the families I could have been placed with, this 16-year-old good little Catholic girl was sent to the home of a Buddhist priest, Benko Akita, and his wife, Yukiko. My first thought was, "Oh my goodness, will I be in trouble with God for staying with Buddhists?" When you're young, all kinds of thoughts abound.

The Akita homestead was remote (though fairly near an expressway, Midori Michi, or Green Road) and fascinating. A brand new "American-style" house was built adjacent to their centuries-old Japanese-style home and the 300-year old Buddhist temple where the priest worshiped. Akita-san (a title of respect) was under five feet tall and was the kindest, most gentle man you would ever meet. He always wore his priest's robe and didn't speak much English, but we managed to communicate, what with the halting Japanese I'd learned in the previous month. One weekend, we students and our interpreters were embarking on a trip to see the wonders of Kyoto, Nara, Ise-Shima, and Toba City, and to camp with the Boy Scouts. Akita-san handed me some spending yen but said that before I left, we must go pray for safe travels in the temple. Immediately, my Catholic senses began tingling and I tensed up with worry as to whether I should do this or not.

Akita-san rang the huge gong that was built on a pedestal just outside the temple, and we went in. On the floor were miniature wooden statues of Buddha. I was handed a small wooden mallet to use, and the priest began chanting repeatedly "Namuami dabutz" and indicated that I do the same while pounding the mallet on the statue. Before I did that, I silently prayed to God, to Jesus, and all the saints, "Please forgive me; don't think I'm forsaking you. I'm only doing this in the name of diplomacy and to honor my hosts!" I'd hoped my prayers were heard.

After returning home in September, the Akitas kept in touch with gorgeous Christmas cards they sent yearly—until I stopped receiving them. I assumed they had both passed on. Buddhists don't celebrate Christmas in the same way we do, but the life of Jesus is highly regarded by them. I realized they wanted to honor my faith as I did theirs. Since then, I have celebrated music during funerals and weddings within many faiths. In the end, I've learned we are all part of the same world, the same universe, and the same heaven. Praise God!



PENTECOST

Pull up a search engine on the computer and research Pentecost. Its historical significance is wide and varied based on where people have come from, their backgrounds, and

how they view the significance of this holiday. Named Pentecost in the Greek language, this festival celebrated the earliest wheat harvest in Jerusalem and the surrounding area. Hebrew men brought the first fruits from their wheat harvest to be offered at the temple to God in Thanksgiving. If we read Leviticus, chapter 23, many things in it sound similar to our offerings at Mass each week. Our difference is that Jesus and our lives are united in sacrifice for our sins. Back in Moses' day, two goats were to be brought forth. One was a sacrifice, and one, upon whom the sins of the Israelites were named and placed, was released into the wilderness, the scapegoat of our sins. Jesus has taken the place of both offerings—as the scapegoat for our sins and as the sacrificial offering for us.

It is truly difficult to condense thousands of years of history, traditions, and cultures (which are foreign to most of us) into a short article. Things can be unpacked, pondered, and re-examined. I can read the same research materials as you in a couple of hours and come back with a different understanding of the events that happened than you do—but some things are always true. God created mankind. Mankind messed up the works and separated itself from God, thinking that it knew better than the omnipotent, omniscient God that created it. No matter what mankind does in an attempt at reconciliation, nothing can reunite it with God. Reconciliation is God's choice. God has already made that choice by sending down His son, Jesus, as redemption for the cost of our sins, my sins, your sins, and everyone's sins. This salvific action of Jesus has given us the opportunity of reconnecting with our creator; all we must do is say, "Yes." Here is the rub—we say yes, and then, more often than not, we turn around and separate ourselves from God again. Then we need to say yes again!

The more modern Christian understanding of Pentecost is of the Holy Spirit coming as "tongues as of fire" (Acts 2:3) upon the disciples, allowing them supernatural gifts, like speaking in tongues. Supernatural means "of or relating to an order of existence beyond the visible observable universe," according to Merriam-Webster. Today our gifts are varied; St. Paul wrote about these gifts (see 1 Corinthians 12 and Galatians 5). Here is the thing though—these are only truly gifts when we recognize the graces that God gives to us through them. We may have talent and skill at something, but it is *only* through God's grace that we can recognize Him in these gifts.

This weekend, we welcome five young disciples to the table of our Eucharistic feast. Carly, Cecilia, Ella, Isabelle, and Lilliana, welcome to this amazing privilege, celebrating our Lord's Sacrifice for us. Too many of us take for granted our ability to attend Mass, the mercy of God, and the freedoms that we have which allow us to be able to gather together for worship. You are not simply the Church of the future; you are the Church *here* and *now*! You shape me, your parents, and those around you. Thank you for saying, "Yes." Thank you for continuing traditions thousands of years in the making. Let this Pentecost be awakened in each of our hearts as we witness these young ladies step further into discipleship and spread God's word. Let us all witness and be witness to God's grace in the world around us. Let us each say "Yes" to God again.
