Living with the Coronavirus for the past eighteen months has proven to be challenging for all of us. It has also been a time for us to be creative in how we interact and celebrate with each other. For example, Easter arrived this year as planned. How we celebrated Easter, however, is what was different.

Holy Days and civic holidays are days that “stand out” to us. They allow us to reflect upon their importance in our spiritual and civic life. How we choose to celebrate these days is a choice we have to make.

I would like to wish everyone a Happy Memorial Day. It is the official “kickoff” of summer—a time to celebrate with family and friends. It is also a day when we pause to remember those who served our country in the five branches of the U.S. Armed Forces: the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force, and Coast Guard.

Those who served have sacrificed their lives to fight for the freedoms that we enjoy. May we respect the freedoms that they so honorably fought for. The four freedoms of the Constitution, laid out in a speech given by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, are the freedom of speech and expression, the freedom from want, the freedom from fear, and the freedom of religion.

Last year, I attended the 50th annual convocation of the National Federation of Priests’ Councils in Chicago. I have served on the board for three years and was reelected to a second three-year term. It works through priests’ councils to support and connect the brotherhood of priests throughout the entire United States. The annual gathering allows priests from throughout the country to gather and discuss issues of importance to the church, as well as to presbyterian ministry.

I would ask that you pray for all priests. The challenges that priests face today can be overwhelming at times. Yet, we as priests must always remember that it was the Lord who called us so long ago to the priesthood, and that it is the Lord who continues to call us to shepherd the flock. It is often said that if you want to see an increase in vocations to the priesthood, then you must pray for the priests that you already have.

As we celebrate this Memorial Day, may we recall those things and people who are important in our lives—namely, our faith, our family, and our friends.

Today is the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. It is always observed on the Sunday after the Solemnity of Pentecost.

This celebration dates back to the seventh century. In paragraph 234 of the Catechism of

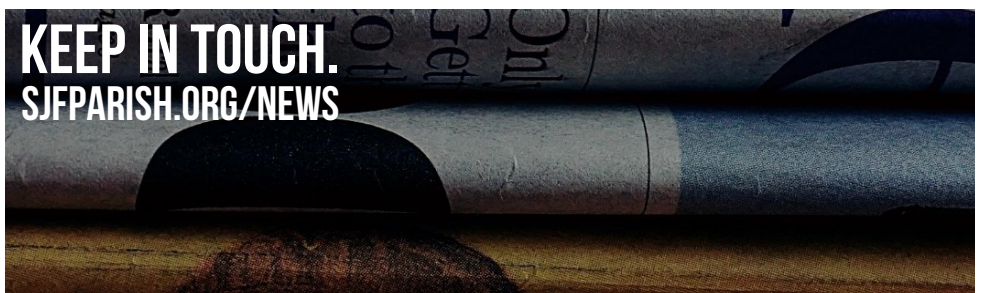
the Catholic Church, we hear that, “The mystery of the Most Holy Trinity is the central mystery of Christian faith and life. It is the mystery of God in himself. It is therefore the source of all the other mysteries of faith, the light that enlightens them.” When we recite the Creed each week, we proclaim our belief in the Triune God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. When you speak the words of the Creed, reflect on what you believe and how you live out those beliefs.

As we conclude the month of May, a month when we remember especially the great gift God gave us of Mary, I would like to share a short review of what Mary means to us as followers of Jesus and as members of the Catholic Church. It is a truth that everything about Mary is relative to Christ and to the mystery of the Church. Before there was the Church, there was Mary. God chose Mary to bring about the Incarnation in a family, not out of necessity, but out of pure gift. Mary is the first disciple, the first Christian, the first to believe in Jesus. We can learn how to be a disciple from Mary.

In order to draw closer to Mary, we can speak of Mary’s “state of life,” or the purpose and place her life holds for us as Christians. Understanding Mary’s state of life begins with identifying the state of life of Jesus. Jesus’ state of life is unique in that it is both divine, in union with the Triune God, and human, here on earth. During his time in the created world, Jesus taught humankind how to share in his life, conforming their life to his commandments.

A Christian’s state of life is found in relationship to Christ, living as the hands and feet of Christ, reflecting his teachings and commandments to love God and neighbor. As the first to enter this life in Christ, Mary demonstrates what all of humankind is called to do. Mary’s state of life takes place completely within Christ’s state of life, beginning with her “yes” to God and finding fulfillment at the moment when Jesus, the divine center of her being, began his earthly life in her womb, making his abode within her.

Mary entered into Christ’s state of life first through the use of her human freedom, out of love and obedience to God. In saying “yes” to God, Mary made possible Christ’s redemptive death, resurrection, and ascension. It is through bearing Christ that Mary finds her calling and provides the example of a life in Christ as the “model of faith and charity” (Catechism of the Catholic Church 967). Mary’s life extends to serve as mother of the Church upon its inception, as “Mary’s role in the Church is inseparable from her union with Christ and flows directly from it” (CCC 964). In Mary, we find the state of life that encompasses every other form of the Christian state of life. Mary freely chose to live her life for Christ, just as our Catholic faith calls us all to do in our own vocations.

As disciples, they (and we, as disciples as well) were given the dictate to, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you" (Mt 28:19-20a).

Last Sunday, there was a high point in this process, as five young ladies from the St. Jane Frances de Chantal Community took the next step toward full communion with the Catholic Church.

Carly, Cecilia, Ella, Isabelle, and Lilliana stepped before the community gathered at the 11:30am Mass and made their First Holy Eucharist. The Holy Spirit guided their and their parents' wishes to take this next step in their faith journeys.

We pray that they will continue this journey in faith, and that the examples that are set for and by them will be bold, to help them see and give witness to the Trinity in the everyday the world around us.

This Memorial Day weekend, it is our privilege to honor those who died to preserve our various freedoms, including the right to worship freely. In today's world, it can be challenging to mention God within

municipal, educational, and community settings. I'm happy to say there are entities which recognize that without God, we are nothing, and have nothing.

My role as President of the U.S. Navy League in Metro Detroit allows me to attend numerous veteran and military ceremonies and events where the Pledge of Allegiance is said and an Invocation is prayed. On May 19th, I co-hosted the Air Force Association's monthly Business Over Breakfast, where over 100 veterans, active military, businesspeople, and political leaders passed by my registration table. Why? To hear a distinguished guest speaker, one of a select group of rare individuals whom most people do not get to meet: a Medal of Honor (MOH) recipient, the highest military honor anyone can receive.

Why the rarity? Most MOH recipients do not live through their bravery. Specialist Five James "Doc" McCloughan served as a medic in Vietnam in May, 1969. During a fierce three-day battle, he ventured out not one, not two, but 11 times into the kill zone to retrieve and treat the wounded and dying. Not only did this 23-year-old save the lives of those to whom he administered field treatment, but saved countless more by putting himself in grave danger as a human "beacon" with a strobe light, signaling a position where supplies could be dropped off to keep his platoon from being massacred.



As Doc relayed his story about being a youngster who had just started teaching school and coaching, was drafted, and then sent to Vietnam, he recalled the terror and single-mindedness that got him out alive: belief in God. When Doc made that eleventh trip out to rescue a soldier stranded in the middle of the battlefield, he noted a gaping abdominal wound which made it impossible for him, a "skinny kid," to grab the wounded man normally and carry him over his shoulders to safety. The odds of getting back this time were poor, and he knew it was likely his last day on earth. But Doc stopped to pray, right there, with bullets and AK-47 fire raging past his ears. He thought about his Dad, and how they knew they loved each other, yet never said the words.

At that moment, Doc vowed that if the Lord let him get through this, the first thing he'd do upon arriving home would be to hug his Dad and say, "I love you." Suddenly, an incredible peace came over Doc, and he knew that somehow he'd be okay. He scooped up the soldier as you'd carry a watermelon, crouched, zig-zagged, serpentine, and made it back, although he did get shot during the rescue. A miracle? Humanly, yes. Spiritually, no. Let go and let God. That was over 50 years ago. Doc went back to work teaching and coaching, never failing to be vocal about his love of family and God. And guess what? He's a great singer, too, and finished his talk with a stirring rendition of *God Bless the USA*.

Have a wonderful Memorial Day, and please, amidst the barbecues, picnics, and other celebrations, take a moment to give thankful prayers that God will continue to bless those who serve, and that He will cradle in His loving arms the ones who died protecting our great nation.
