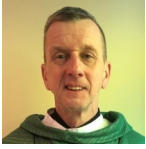

During the early months of the pandemic, I had the opportunity to do a great deal of reading. One of the books that I read was written by Fr. Jack Castlelot. Fr. Jack was a world-renowned biblical scholar. His field of expertise was the New Testament, and he wrote extensively about the books in the New Testament. He was one of many

biblical scholars whose examination of the Sacred Scriptures was compiled in the *Jerome Biblical Commentary*—a commentary used by those who are studying the Sacred Scriptures in depth.

As a young seminarian at St. John's Provincial Seminary in Plymouth, Michigan, I and those studying for the priesthood had the honor of being taught by Fr. Jack Castlelot. He shared his knowledge of the Sacred Scriptures and "broke open the Word" for us.

I recall the first day that our class arrived at St. John's Provincial Seminary. We had a rector's conference that evening, and Fr. Jack went to the lectern and began to speak. He said, "Gentlemen, when and if you are ordained priests, there are two things that you will have to learn to deal with—namely, ambiguity and change."

As I reflect upon my 35 years of priesthood, I can honestly say that there has been a lot of ambiguity and change within the Church as well as in society at large. There have also been some challenging and disappointing times. We all experience the ambiguity and change that life presents to us. We can't avoid it; it's a part of the journey of life. The challenge that it places before us is this: do we see ambiguity and change as an opportunity to grow in our faith and in our understanding of the present situation, or don't we? Hopefully, we do.

If there is one thing that this pandemic has taught us, it is that life is uncertain and that we are a people of hope. The Scriptures give us the hope we need to see beyond our present situation. A quote from St. Pope John XXIII echoes that thought; he said, "It is not that the Gospel has changed; rather, it is that we have begun to understand it better."

Bon mot: "Sacred Scripture is set up as a kind of lantern for us in the night of life."

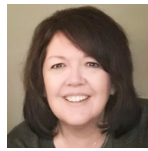

Choices—we make them every day. Some are small, like when we choose what to wear or whether to stay home or go out. But many of the choices we make are so much more

important than that—they are choices that impact our own lives, and often the lives of others.

Today's first reading from the book of Joshua tells of a choice the tribes of Israel were asked to make—a choice that affected those who gathered and the many people they led. Joshua, the successor to Moses, who led the people to take possession of the land of Canaan, has grown old and is reaching the end of his life. In the Scriptures that lead to today's passage, Joshua reminds the people that God has never failed them. Joshua recounts the saving actions of God in the history of the Israelites, from Abraham up to the present day. Joshua then implores the members of the tribes of Israel to serve the Lord "completely and sincerely" (Joshua 24:14).

He asks the leaders of the tribes to make a choice: "Decide today whom you will serve" (Joshua 24:15). The options he presents to them are to either serve the Lord or to serve some other gods. Wonderfully, the tribes all choose to remain loyal to the Lord. After all, their God led them out of enslavement, gave them hope during their hardships in the desert, and guided them to the Promised Land. The choice may have seemed obvious.

In the Gospel today, Jesus asks the Twelve, his closest friends, to make a choice. Many of Jesus' disciples struggled with Jesus telling them that he is the living bread, and that in order for them to have life, they must eat his flesh and drink his blood. This was shocking to many of Jesus's disciples—so much so that they left Jesus and returned to their former way of life. Upon seeing the people leaving, Jesus asks the Twelve if they also wanted to leave him. Surely, they too were shocked and confused by Jesus' words, but Simon Peter speaks to the truth of those who have truly encountered Jesus: "Master, to whom shall we go?" No matter how confused or shocked the Twelve may have been, Peter gets down at once to the essential truth: "You have the words of eternal life" (John 6:68). Having encountered the living God, the choice was obvious.

Through baptism, God rescued us from the enslavement of sin, gave us the hope of eternal life, and guided us along right path. Each of us can choose to serve the Lord and his people or to serve ourselves or some other god, such as power, honor, pleasure, or wealth. Some paths may be easier or more socially acceptable for us to follow, but our moral conscience tells us that they are not the paths that will lead us to our eternal home. While there are other gods to serve, as the Israelites experienced, none are the God who sent his Son to suffer and die for our salvation. The choice to serve God seems obvious.

We are called to choose God—to put him first in our lives, above all else. We choose to serve God in the way we live our lives and in the decisions that we make each day. We choose to live a life in Christ, aided by the grace of the sacraments and by regular encounter with God in liturgy and prayer.

Do we make our choice to follow God obvious? The Israelites made a public commitment to God; the Twelve told Jesus of their commitment to him in response to his direct question. We demonstrate our commitment to the Lord through our worship and through our love of neighbor. Spend time in prayer and reflection today and ask yourself, "What specific action can I take to show my commitment as a disciple of our Lord?"

WHY SHOULD CATHOLICS READ THE BIBLE?

Ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ. Scripture enlightens our minds, unveils God's glorious plan of salvation, teaches us his ways, and shows us how to live as his people. In order to meet with confidence and wisdom the many challenges of our time, Catholics need to be renewed in their zeal to study the Bible and to teach it. Discover now how you can personally draw closer to Jesus through the Bible:

It's well known that Saint Jerome says that ignorance of Scripture is ignorance of Christ. Jesus Christ is the Word of the Father. He's the living Word. And so we can encounter his Word. We encounter Jesus whenever we read the scriptures. Whether we are beginning in the book of Genesis or in the Gospels, Jesus is always present.

People will often ask, "Where do I begin in the Scriptures?" I would say if you're just starting out, start in the New Testament. Pick a Gospel—perhaps the Gospel of Mark. It's the shortest, and you'll feel accomplished when you're finished reading, as you have made your way through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. After you've read through a Gospel, try one of Paul's letters, and then begin to make your way through the Old Testament. Just pick a book. Start. Be committed to it. Spend at least 15 minutes each day delving into the Word of God. Sometimes we can get overwhelmed with names that we can't pronounce or places that we've never heard of. We have to be disciplined in our reading of the scriptures.

There are different ways that we can pray with the scriptures. One way is through Lectio Divina, or divine reading. Lectio Divina calls us to spend some time to contemplate the scriptures—to see how the Word speaks to us—and then calls us to action. Another way would be to use our imagination while we're reading the scriptures. Using our imagination means that we enter into the passage as though we're there. We recognize the details—what the weather feels like to us, how Jesus might look at us. And then we use all of those images. Reading the scriptures is a necessary part of every Christian life. Be disciplined, ask the Lord what he wants to speak to you, and then ask for the grace to live it out.

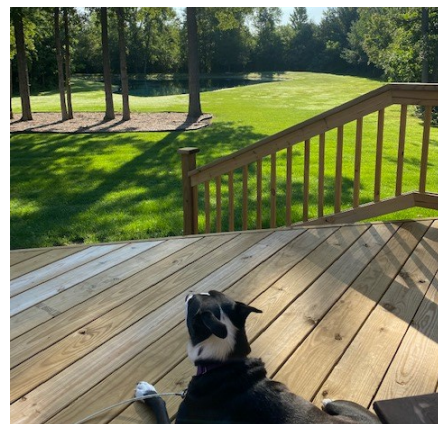

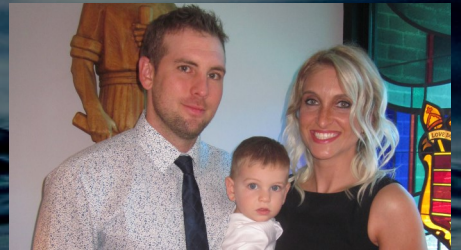

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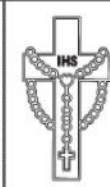
