August 15th is the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Because the Solemnity falls on a Saturday, it is not a Holy Day of Obligation, and there will be no additional Mass. You may wish to learn

more about this Solemnity. The following is adapted from catholiccurrent.org:

Mary was always a virgin, both in conceiving Jesus, giving birth to him, and remaining virgin ever after. God granted her this privilege to emphasize that this was a unique moment in history—the birth of Jesus who is the Son of God and the Son of Mary. The liturgy of the Church speaks of Mary as "ever virgin."

In the early Church, some denied this, arguing that the Gospels speak of the brothers and sisters of Jesus, and thus maintained that Mary did not remain a virgin after the birth of Jesus. But already in the fourth century, theologians pointed out that the Greek word for brother used in the New Testament can refer also to cousin. [...] It is the constant teaching of the Church that Mary remained a virgin even after the birth of Jesus. In her virginity, Mary lived a life dedicated exclusively to her Son and his mission. Her example has been followed by some of Christ's disciples, who have lived lives of consecrated virginity and celibacy from apostolic times to the present.

In the mystery of her Assumption, Mary experiences what we all will experience eventually: a bodily resurrection like Christ's own. "The Immaculate Virgin [...] was taken up, body and soul, into heavenly glory, and exalted by the Lord as Queen over all things, so that she might be more fully conformed to her Son, the Lord of lords and conqueror of death" (CCC.966). In Mary, we behold what the Church is already like during her pilgrimage of faith, and what the Church will become at the end of the journey.



Please join us in the main Worship Space on Tuesday, August 11th—as well as the second Tuesday of every month—anytime from 1:00pm until 6:30pm for Eucharistic Adoration, ending with recitation of the Divine Praises at 6:30pm.

Eucharistic Adoration "serves to deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the Church" (USCCB). When you enter the Worship Space, you'll find the lights dimmed and the space silent. A monstrance that holds the Blessed Sacrament will be on the Altar table, accompanied by candles. You can sit in any open pew, socially distant from others. Please wear a mask if you attend.

If you are new to Eucharistic Adoration, you may wonder how long you should spend in Adoration and how you are to spend that time with the Lord. If you are starting out, try 15-20 minutes, working up to an hour over time. Spend that time in silent prayer. You may also bring your own prayer books, read the Bible, pray the rosary, or simply enjoy the peace that comes from being in the Presence of God.

You may feel that you can't pray well. Don't let this discourage you. The fact that you took time out to spend time with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is in itself a prayer of great faith.

I am quite the impatient person! I relish my time, slowly waking up to the world—and if you have not already guessed it, I am not a morning person! Oh, I can get up as early as

the next person, and function in a moderate capacity, but don't ask me to think, because if I start to think, then that thinking takes energy (from a limited reserve) away from something else, like that aforementioned small amount of patience.

My family has bore the brunt of many a morning, starting in on me way too soon, asking questions and insisting on things that, in my mind, are definitely not on the radar at that time of the morning.

I enjoyed working early mornings in the shop, following the directions that I had written for myself the night before, alone with my machine (mill, lathe, grinder, CNC—whatever) and numerous cups of coffee and water, working the first three to four hours in a slow wake-up procedure, before having to really confront anyone in person or on the phone. I needed that time to center and brace myself for the day ahead, like running a race—if I start off too quickly, I will tire early, my energy will lag, and then the whole day goes by in a fog.

What in the world am I talking about? Each of us approaches the day in a very different way. These ways change from time to time—take last week's Gospel reading, for instance. Jesus had withdrawn to a deserted place (to grieve for the loss of His cousin, John), but the townspeople heard this and tracked Jesus down. Jesus felt pity and ministered to them, feeding the expansive crowd.

Then, in this week's Gospel, Jesus sent His disciples on ahead, finally dismissed the crowds, and went up the mountain alone to pray. Jesus changed the course of events that He had planned for the day, but still finished these events the way that He had originally intended—alone with the Father of all.

Last week, Lucas Jeffrey wrote an excellent article about personal retreats and spending time with God in various ways. If you have not read that bulletin yet, make a point to read it (you can always access it online at sjfparish.org/bulletin).

If you recall this week's first reading (from 1 Kings), Elijah (fleeing from King Ahab, after demonstrating our true God's power) went to Mount Horeb, where God told him to stand before the Lord. After strong winds, earthquakes, and fires, God presented Himself to Elijah in the form of a light, silent sound (a whisper).

Have you ever listened for, and heard, God's Whisper to you? God is always nudging us along the way, course-correcting us so that we stay along His path, but always allowing us the choice of what we do. Take some time this week and listen for God's whisper in your life. It may come as spoken words, or you may be presented with an action to undertake; maybe it is God's will that we be quiet for a time or get moving before we are "ready" to begin (like me, in the morning—ugh!).

Wherever He leads you, look around, see those alongside you, and listen for His Whisper, so that each of us may witness Jesus ministering to us as He did to the crowds that followed Him.

Last week Fr. Tony's wonderful homily dealt with fears and how to cope with them. His fear of drowning hit home with me; I'd always thought I had a fear of the water, but he was correct—it was more a fear of

being trapped underneath the surface. In today's gospel, the Apostle Peter's trek on rough waters leaves him worried about being swept under—he was scared, too! As kids, we were never a "water" family. Growing up in Detroit, we had no access to boats or seaside dreams. Instead, we were more "land" people, playing golf, baseball, tennis in the streets, climbing trees, and swinging on ropes and monkey bars. I always feared jumping into pools or lakes because my mom constantly told us not to—that we could get tangled up in deep water and never come up! Her words stuck in my mind for decades. I barely learned to swim, I didn't dive, and never went into water over my head.

That all changed about ten years ago when I started frequenting the Florida Keys—a water paradise. Friends tried to get me to snorkel, but I never liked to put my head or face in the water. They said, "But you'll see a fascinating world underneath the surface!" I didn't care. I was scared. One day, we set out for Looe Key, a protected coral reef in the ocean about four or five miles off of Big Pine Key. I was told it would be the perfect spot for an inaugural snorkel. Keys have beaches, right? Most do, so I thought I'd stand on the shoreline or beach-like flats and wade out slowly. Off we went, and of course, there was nothing but deep water as far as the eye can see. We pull up near a number of boats tethered to buoys, and frantically, I ask, "Where are the flats—the beaches?" They said, "There's no beach. We simply tie up and jump in." My heart filled with dread. I said I'd try it, but this was not the deal!

The day was pristine—the water, breathtaking gradients of blue, and the waves, not too rough. One of the guys, an experienced diver, said he'd stick with me. It took a while, but I finally lowered myself off the swim platform and eased into the water—about 100 feet of it. I wore a life jacket, and once I was in, he planned to take my hand and help me. However, I still wasn't ready to put my face in the water. If you've never snorkeled, you have to know that breathing with a mask on is different; you must breathe through your mouthpiece, which is connected to a hose that stays above the water. If you try to nose-breathe, you will get no air and feel as if you are suffocating. It takes a little bit to get used to that. I told my "buddy" that I needed some time to feel relaxed in the water. When I was ready, I'd let him know. About 20 minutes passed. It was now or never.

I took a deep breath, did what they call a "deadman's float" with arms and legs splayed out, then put my face under the surface. Wow! In the space of mere inches, there indeed was a brand new world full of color, schools of exotic fish, underwater formations, crevices, and coral reefs. The deep was awesome and amazing! My buddy then took my hand and we swam to other spots. I'd put my head in, and a different show appeared. My fears had totally evaporated. Now, I jump in all over the Keys and think back to all I would have missed had I not tried, and succeeded, in conquering my anxieties. I thanked all of my friends for bearing with me. However, I'll add this: not long after my original snorkel, one member of my diving party said to the other, loud enough for me to hear, "So, do you think we should have told J about that big shark and toothy barracuda swimming near her when she first jumped in?"

Put out into that deep—there are great rewards waiting to be discovered.
