As the new staff liaison to the St. Jane Frances de Chantal Health Ministry, my JJacobs@sjfparish.org column will be divided between the two subjects. Let me first thank our Health Ministry leaders Chris Cosnowski and Kathy

Pawlik for their dedication to our physical health during these uncertain times. These ladies are awesome! As soon as we're able to open up programs in-house, you'll read it here first.

As September rambles on into the throes of fall, winter is not far behind—and that means flu season. The flu has taken a back seat, but now, people are wondering how the flu and COVID-19 will interact, and what steps can be taken to fend off both. This information, courtesy of Chris and Kathy, should be helpful regarding flu shots during the pandemic:

While not as deadly or as transmissible as COVID-19, influenza still sends at least 100,000 people to the hospital each year—and 62,000 flu-related deaths are estimated this year. Serious illness and death from flu are particular risks for older adults, very young children, and those with chronic illness.

Nobody really knows what will happen with both viruses circulating at the same time, because the COVID-19 virus is so new. Will the flu make you more susceptible to COVID-19? Can you get both infections at the same time? Does having influenza make COVID-19 worse? No one really knows.

But we do know that simultaneous infections will likely overwhelm our health care system—so it certainly makes sense to prevent what we can. The CDC recommends that everyone over the age of six months be immunized for influenza. It takes about two weeks to develop immunity after the shot, so getting immunized before the start of flu season (October to March) is best. However, getting the immunization anytime during flu season helps, too.

The influenza immunization does not protect 100%, but it does prevent a lot of infections, and can decrease the severity of those infections. You might also suffer a reaction from the shot, with a fever or aches in the inoculation area, but those should pass. If they do persist, see your doctor. Most primary care offices and local drug stores have the flu vaccine available, and flu clinics are popping up all over. Most insurances cover flu shots, and many drug stores have discount programs for those without coverage for immunization.

Above all, make sure to keep your immune system strong by eating properly especially lots of fruits and vegetables—getting adequate rest, exercising, and reducing stress. And don't forget those vitamins! Zinc and Vitamins C and D are helpful in fighting off what ails you.

Music thoughts for September: Currently, there are no plans to alter COVID-19 Mass restrictions with regard to music. It is still Ordinary Time until the Feast of Christ the King—November 22nd—but I'll change the Mass settings this week.

I also promised song titles to ponder for this month's liturgies. While I cannot include all of these within the liturgy, you can listen to them online: Prayer of St. Francis, The Master Came to Bring Good News, Now We Remain, Let Justice Roll Like a River, All Are Welcome, Be Still My Soul, Eye Has Not Seen, Gather Us In, Lord of All Hopefulness, Great Is Thy Faithfulness, Digo Si, Senor (I Say Yes, My Lord), Jesus the Lord, No Greater Love, Send Down the Fire, Unless a Grain of Wheat, Seek the Lord, Turn My Heart, O God, and Canticle of the Turning.

P.S.: Many have asked—Pudge is doing much better. His paw is still sore, but it is healing. Praise the Lord!

This time last year, we held a "Liturgy Day" for the renewal of the many who serve in LHall@sjfparish.org liturgical ministries. In reviewing outcomes of that weekend, I revisited the following article. I don't often repeat articles,

but prayer is a topic that never gets old. Right now, we have several opportunities for group prayer (some via Zoom) which are listed below.

"Follow your own way of speaking to our Lord sincerely, lovingly, confidently, and simply, as your heart dictates."

I have often heard people say they struggle with prayer. We don't always know how to pray, what to pray, or how to hear God's response. Our beloved St. Jane, in the quote above, speaks to those issues. Find your own way to communicate with God. That's what prayer is—communication with God. There are as many ways to pray as there are ways to communicate: publicly, personally, spoken, silent, or sung. We know that God loves us and desires to be in relationship with us. Communication is key to a good relationship.

We can look to Jesus to teach us about prayer. The Gospels record many times that Jesus took time to pray: in the mornings and evenings, before ministering to the people, and before critical events in His life. We can pray the same way. Try beginning or ending your day with a conversation with God, or adding prayers of thanksgiving for the graces and challenges of our lives.

Whether you struggle with prayer or enjoy a full and active prayer life, take time today to reflect on this aspect of your faith. If you are interested in praying with others, we offer four wonderful groups: the Rosary group, the Divine Mercy Chaplet group, the Intercessory Prayer Team, and the Lectio Divina group. All welcome new members at any time and are happy to teach you.

For the Rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet, no registration is necessary; simply come to the parish and join the team in prayer. The Intercessory Prayer Team and Lectio Divina group are currently run via Zoom. If you're interested in joining, please email me and I will get you to the right person and place.

The Rosary is prayed each Tuesday evening at 6:00pm in the Social Hall.

The Divine Mercy Chaplet is prayed on the last Saturday of each month, following 4:00pm Mass, in the Social Hall.

The Intercessory Prayer Team meets on the second and fourth Mondays of each month at 1:00pm via Zoom. This team prays for the needs of the parish as shared through our Intercessory Prayer box, as well as the needs of the world, the Church, and other requests.

The Lectio Divina group prays this ancient prayer form each Wednesday at 7:00pm via Zoom. Lectio Divina is a method of prayer in the monastic tradition of reflection on Scripture. The group reads the Gospel from the upcoming Sunday, reflects, and responds through prayer, action, and resting in God.

Additionally, we have Eucharistic Adoration on the second Tuesday of each month from 1:00pm—6:30pm in the Chapel. Feel free to share in this beautiful prayer at any point during that period. Please know that you can also come into the worship space whenever the office is open to pray before the Blessed Sacrament in the Tabernacle, or to light a candle.

A solid prayer life is refuge in the storm that often swirls around us. May your communications with God be, as St. Jane tells us, sincere, loving, confident reflections of what is in your heart.

Fall is almost here. Last week, I started my senior year at Oakland University—and like most students around the country, it looked a lot different than semesters past.

I've said before how much our methods of communication have shifted with the onset of the pandemic—anything we did in-person, we now have to do over the phone, via a video conference, or in writing (or text). This means we lose out on a lot of the nuances of face-to-face communication; for instance, in my case, there's no more raising our hands in class. Instead, we have to type into a chat box that we have a question. Little differences like that are pervasive when it comes to our new pandemic methods of communication.

Forgiveness is a big theme in this week's readings. Jesus himself tells us not to forgive once, "not seven times," but "seventy-seven times" (Mt 18:21-35). It can be easy to get frustrated with all the changes we've put up with—and still are putting up with. As a student, fully-online learning is new to me, and there are bound to be mistakes, frustrations, and simply bad days. That's why it's important for us to keep forgiveness in mind. None of us knew a situation like this would arrive, but we're all doing our best to embrace it.

Fall would also usually see the start of formation opportunities at our parish. COVID-19 limits what we can offer right now, but I encourage you to explore options like Bishop Robert Barron's *Catholicism: The Pivotal Players* series (visit **sjfparish.org/events** for more details).

I also ask that you embrace our new ways of communication and check us out online. We offer communication via email (**sjfparish.org/news**), by social media (@sjfparish.org on Facebook and Twitter, and @stjanefrancesparish on Instagram), and, of course, the bulletin. We can find comfort in this new situation, so long as we embrace it and remember to forgive.
