"Work is fundamental to the dignity of a person. Work, to use an image, 'anoints' us with dignity, fills us with dignity, makes us similar to God, who has worked and still

works, who always acts..." - Pope Francis, Feast of St. Joseph the Worker and World Labor Day, 5/1/13

On this Labor Day weekend, let us be mindful of the importance of work from a Catholic viewpoint. Last year we created an informative video on this topic, you can find it at sjfparish.org under "Quick Links" (Labor Day. The Way of Faith). In addition, here are some thoughts from the USCCB on the dignity of work:

- In the Catholic tradition, work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continued participation in God's creative action. As we mark Labor Day each year, we are invited in a special way to reflect on the persistence of low wages and inequality in our workplaces. In your own experience of work—in an office setting, serving others, as a student, or working in the home—how have you experienced work as a form of participation in God's creative action? How are persistent low wages a barrier to full participation in that creative action? What can you do to support workplaces built upon justice and dignity?
- Catholic teaching tells us that not only are workers due a "just wage" with which they can provide for their families' needs; they also deserve opportunities for rest and dignity-affirming benefits such as quality health care and paid time off. In addition, work should be something that enhances one's human dignity (see Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, nos. 284, 287, 301, 302).
- The experience of many workers in low wage jobs tells us that we must give serious consideration to how we can address areas of inequality in our economic systems. We are called to prioritize the well-being of the human person over the capital they produce (see St. John Paul II in Laborem Exercens, no. 12, on "The Priority of Labor"). In our country today, corporate consolidation of wealth and power in monopoly organizations has led to lower wages for workers. Lower wages mean many workers cannot sufficiently provide for their families or fully participate in the economy and society (see St. John Paul II in Centessiums Annus, no. 48).
- Catholic teaching holds that central to promoting the dignity of work and rights of workers is building solidarity with and among workers. The Church has long looked towards the important role played by labor unions in the effort to protect the needs and rights of workers in situations of inequality and injustice (see Compendium of the Social Doctrine of the Church, no. 305).

Amid the sales and celebrations of this Labor Day, spend some time in reflection on the nature of work and the dignity of workers. Where do you see the dignity of work and the rights of workers being violated? Where do you see it being protected? How will your purchasing and voting choices impact whether the rights of workers are violated or protected?

Sometimes a song from the weekend will simply not leave my brain. How about you?

Last Sunday, I used Psalm 8, "O Lord, our God, how wonderful is Your name, how

wonderful is Your name over all the earth." The planning materials suggested it as an alternative and the melody was so pretty and memorable. And isn't that the point? To remember what we hear at Mass each week, whether it is via the homily, the readings, or in song?

Sometimes the Mass of Joy and Peace 'Glory to God...' bounces around my head as well but it does allow me to continue praying throughout the week. Music has a way of doing that and I am very thankful that it sticks around, because when reviewing the readings to select appropriate music each week, fifty years of music ministry kicks in. My brain's creative processing triggers certain musical phrases. The only trouble is that within those fifty years, there are a LOT of song fragments dancing around and I must figure out the title! Often, it is not an easy task. The music goes round and round in my mind, but eventually, if I leave it alone and let God handle it, the title appears.....in His time, not in mine!

As mentioned in a previous column, our hymnal does not carry every numbered psalm and a search is necessary to identify one that will work for a particular Sunday. In fact, the Cantors also suggest psalm settings with which they are familiar. We actually have practiced psalms all the way through October, so some serious thought does go into those selections.

One other thing about the psalms you may inherently know but don't realize is that many hymns – especially contemporary ones – are actually based on them. Some very popular ones are 'On Eagle's Wings' (Psalm 91), 'Taste and See' (Psalm 31), 'The Lord is My Light' (Psalm 27), 'Be Still My Soul (Psalm 46), 'You Are Near' (Psalm 139), 'A Mighty Fortress is Our God' (Psalm 61) and 'Sing A New Song' (Psalm 98). These are only a few. Here's an idea: as you prepare to celebrate Mass, why not take a look through the hymnal and see how many you can find? Occasionally the psalm number is noted at the bottom of the page, but not always. Read the words to the song and let your mind go free to see if a melody comes through. You'll probably be surprised that it will.

This weekend, Psalm 90 is not in our Gather hymnal, but as soon as I saw the refrain, 'In every age O Lord, You have been our refuge' the song 'In Every Age' (Gather 716) immediately came to mind. It is what we'll use, with the Refrain proclaimed first, then the verses. In preparation for Mass, perhaps you can review the words and ponder what they mean to you?

An Invitation: there have been a few parishioners who have asked about becoming a Cantor. Yes, we can use you! Come join us at Cantor practice on Sunday, September 11th from 10:00am-11:00am in the Chapel. We pray, cover a lot of ground during that hour, and have fun doing it. Please join us!


A GREAT ONE AT THAT






Pilgrimage to Poland Informal Meeting


