“None of us is an island” (Pope Francis).

Imagine living on Mackinac Island in the winter. The water freezes, so you can’t travel by boat. There is no bridge. There is a small airport, but travel is limited and expensive. **People rely on each other.** The community comes together for the common good—and they have **solidarity** among each other.

Our world is an island in space. We, all of us, live on the earth together. We are interconnected, standing in solidarity for our survival and our betterment. Our bond transcends national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. We are not just responsible for ourselves, but also for our global family.

“If someone who has worldly means sees a brother in need and refuses him compassion, how can the love of God remain in him?” (1 Jn 3:17).

We are in solidarity with each other.

St. John Paul II tells us that solidarity is a determination to “commit oneself to the common good”—“the good of all and of each individual.” We are not only responsible for ourselves—“we are really responsible for all.” “[E]very man is his ‘brother’s keeper,’ because God entrusts us to one another.”

Solidarity unites us in Christ.

St. Paul explains that “a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, **so also Christ**” (1 Cor 12:12).

“God has so constructed the body [...] so that there may be no division in the body, but that the parts may have the same concern for one another. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part is honored, all the parts share its joy” (1 Cor 12:25-26).

Our world functions much like the body St. Paul describes. “From the food we eat and the clothes we buy, to the news we read and the websites we browse, we are connected to people and places all over the world” (Caritas New Zealand).

Before we can act in solidarity with each other, we must acknowledge our global family and address the struggles that others face.

We are responsible for each other.

The choices we make have an impact all over the world, whether we realize it or not. We must recognize our human bond and understand our responsibility for each other.

So how do we act in solidarity with each other?

Pope Francis says that solidarity “finds concrete expression in service,” “combatting the structural causes of poverty, inequality, the lack of work, land, and housing” and “the denial of social and labor rights” (*Fratelli tutti*).

We must work for justice and peace for all.

Almighty and ever-living God, empower your one human family to join hands on our journey of faith. Send us your spirit of hope, so that we may work to alleviate human suffering and foster charity and justice in our world. Amen (USCCB Prayer for Solidarity).

*What are some practical ways I can show solidarity with people in need locally and globally?
How can I work in solidarity with others to ensure peace and justice for all?*

Let’s spend this week thinking about it.

Last week, we celebrated the Solemnity of All Saints. This solemnity has begun the last month of the Church's liturgical year.

We will see the readings reflect more on passages about the end times and preparing for those times. The readings from All Saints Day were from the book of Revelations, the first letter from John, and the Gospel story of the Beatitudes. This week's readings are from the book of Wisdom, Paul's first letter to the Thessalonians, and, again, from the Gospel of Matthew.

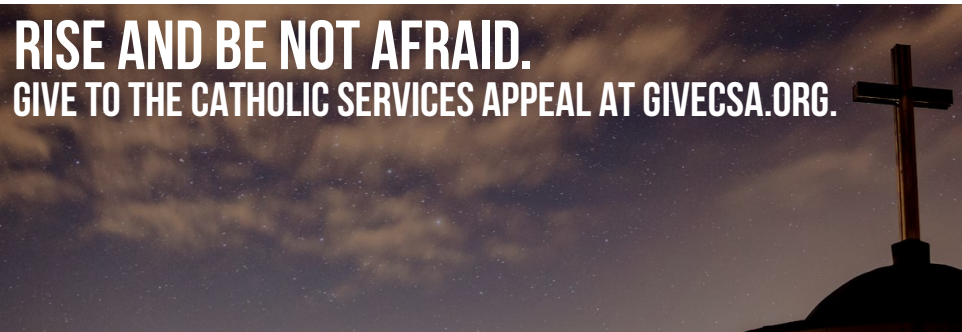
Last week's readings spoke of one of John's "end times" visions—the throne of God, His angels, and the great multitude that come to join Him in His "One-ness" (Heaven). The second reading (from John) spoke of us as children of God, and the Gospel from Matthew taught us that as children of God, we need to go beyond conventional "worldly" thinking to a much greater view, beyond just ourselves and those that we know, to encompass those that we do not know, and even our enemies. Following the "letter of the law" is not enough; we need to begin seeking out the very spirit and essence of the law to be an example for all. As we live more like Jesus in these ways, we will be recognized as followers of Him.

In this week's readings, we take the next step, learning that those who seek and love wisdom can find it and better understand it—but it takes that step of wanting to know and grow in wisdom, because we do not simply become "wise." Wisdom is active in its very nature.

Paul then speaks to us (as he did the Thessalonians) about our faith—faith in God, faith in His Son, Jesus, and faith in the tenets of Jesus' teachings; in this faith, we find knowledge and hope. This world (as we know and see it) is not the be-all, end-all. We have knowledge of God's mercy and His desire for us be with Him for eternity, and in this, we find an endless well of hope. Death is not the end, but the beginning of the rest of forever.

However, knowledge of things is not everything; it simply uncovers the path upon which we need to act. In the Gospel reading from this week (Mt 25), we hear of the ten virgins waiting for the bridegroom. There was no set "time" for the bridegroom to arrive, so a few brought a lot of lamp oil, while the rest brought only what was in their lamps. When the hours passed by, and the oil in the lamps was running low, some were prepared—but those who were unprepared ended up getting locked out of the feast.

We have knowledge of God's teachings, and when we act using that knowledge, we gain hope and wisdom, which we act upon even more. We do not need to fear "the end" when we properly prepare our hearts and minds, because we know that God is our reward! Be prepared for the journey, and I'll see you on the road!

We invite you to join our annual Giving Tree project and share your blessings with those less fortunate.

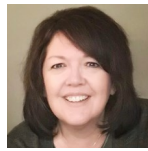
We will not be able to collect toys, clothing, or other items this year. We ask that donations be made in the form of **gift cards or cash.**

This week's Gospel acclamation (the Alleluia) stuck out to me when I read it: "Stay awake and be ready! For you do not know on what day your Lord will come" (Mt 24:42a, 44).

I think, right now, we might all be feeling a little bit fatigued. Winter is creeping in, the sun is setting earlier, and while Advent is on the horizon, we have just a few more weeks of Ordinary Time to push through before it's here. This might be a time for many of us to put things on a "back burner"—Advent will be here soon, so we'll pay attention to it when it gets here.

But that isn't what God—and this weekend's Gospel acclamation—calls us to do. We're called to be ready and open to God at all times, even when we are waiting for "more important" things, like Advent, to happen. I feel this is a common fatigue many have with Ordinary Time—we are 32 weeks in, and we are getting tired.

It reminds me of the same fatigue I feel as the semester gets closer and closer to a close. Final exams are just a few weeks away, so shouldn't I set my sights on them, rather than what's happening right now?

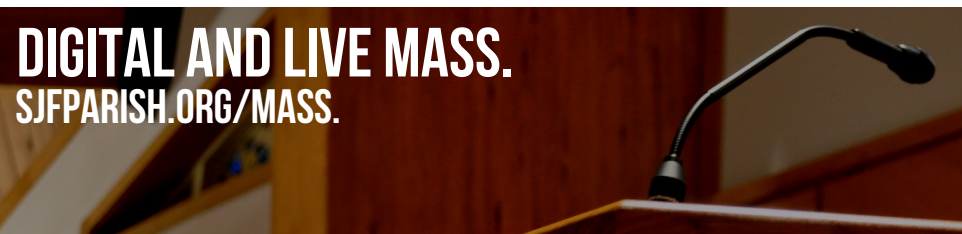
No. As tempting as that might be, we must stay present in the moment, aware at all times; otherwise, we may lose our footing. If I took a step back during the last month of the semester, I might not be prepared for final exams when they arrive.

In much the same way, if we "take a step back" in the weeks leading up to Advent, we won't be ready for Advent when it arrives. Advent is what prepares us for the coming of Christmas and the birth of Jesus, but there is so much for us to learn during the four weeks of Advent. If we disconnect now and take a moment to recharge, we might not be ready to learn what Advent has to teach us when it arrives.

Instead, I think these last few weeks of Ordinary Time are a time to be gracious with ourselves. The snow is falling, and the days are getting shorter—that might make us exhausted. But our response to that exhaustion shouldn't be to draw in on ourselves and hibernate until Advent. Rather, we should turn to the Lord and ask for his grace, strength, and guidance.

This weekend's Gospel speaks of the ten virgins who waited for the bridegroom. They waited with lanterns, but not all ten were prepared for the long wait—so some had to leave to get more oil for their lanterns. While they were gone, the bridegroom arrived, and those who left to get oil were left behind.

We must not be left behind when Advent comes. Instead of leaving to refuel our "lanterns" during the weeks before Advent, we must come prepared and stay the course. The Lord has much to teach us during these last few weeks; if we listen, we will enter Advent prepared, with our hearts open and ready to anticipate the birth of Jesus. Let us stay awake and be ready as we proceed through November, because we do not know on what day our Lord will come.

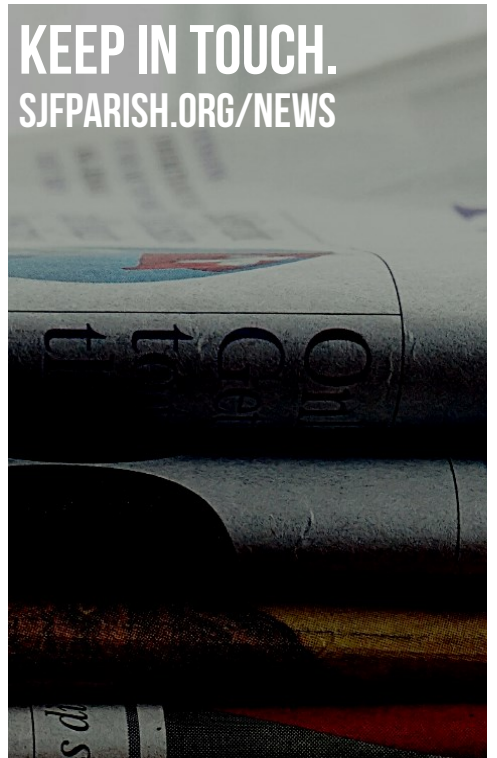

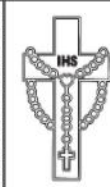
