# Statement by the President of the USCCB and the Chairman of the USCCB's Committee on Domestic Justice:

"We extend our condolences to the families and friends of those murdered in Dayton last night. The lives lost this weekend confront us with a terrible truth. We can never again believe that mass shootings are an isolated exception. They are an epidemic against life that we must, in justice, face. God's mercy and wisdom compel us to move toward preventative action. We encourage all Catholics to increased prayer and sacrifice for healing and the end of these shootings. We encourage Catholics to pray and raise their voices for needed changes to our national policy and national culture as well. We call on all relevant committees of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops to outline a reinvigorated policy agenda and pastoral campaign to address ways we can help fight this social disease that has infected our nation. The Conference has long advocated for responsible gun laws and increased resources for addressing the root causes of violence. ## **Eucharistic Adoration with Recitation of the Divine Praises**

Please join us in the Chapel on Tuesday, August 13<sup>th</sup>, anytime from 1:00pm until 6:30pm for Eucharistic Adoration ending with recitation of the Divine Praises at 6:30pm.

What exactly is Eucharistic Adoration and why is it important? From the United States Council of Catholic Bishops website: (<a href="http://www.usccb.org/prayer-and-worship/prayers-and-devotions/eucharistic-devotion/index.cfm">http://www.usccb.org/prayer-and-worship/prayers-and-devotions/eucharistic-devotion/index.cfm</a>):

"The importance of Eucharistic Adoration is shown in the fact that the Church has a ritual that regulates it: the Rite of Eucharistic Exposition and Benediction. This is an extension of the adoration of the Blessed Sacrament which occurs in every Mass: 'Behold the Lamb of God, behold him who takes away the sins of the world. Blessed are those called to the supper of the Lamb.' Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament flows from the sacrifice of the Mass and serves to

deepen our hunger for Communion with Christ and the rest of the Church. The Rite concludes with the ordained minister blessing the faithful with the Blessed Sacrament."

When you enter the Chapel, you will find the lights are dimmed and silence is maintained. A monstrance that holds the Blessed Sacrament will be found on the Altar table, accompanied by candles. There are also copies of the Bible and other religious books available for your use. A resource on Eucharistic Adoration is provided for

you to explore and pray with. If you are new to Eucharistic Adoration, you may wonder how long you should spend in Adoration and how you are to spend that time with the Lord. If you are starting out, try 15-20 minutes, working up to an hour over time. Spend that time in silent prayer, in thanksgiving and petition. You may also find it is beneficial to bring something to help you pray. You may choose to bring your own prayer books, use the books provided in the chapel, read the Bible, pray the rosary, or just sit and relax and enjoy the sweet peace that comes from simply being in the Presence of God. You may feel that you can't pray well. Don't let this discourage you. The mere fact that you take time out to spend time with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is in itself a prayer of great faith. Please join us on Tuesday, August 13<sup>th</sup> and each month, on the second Tuesday of the month, anytime from 1:00pm to 6:30pm.

Knowledge is one of those things that I think we take for granted! I was just speaking with a friend sharing stories and we were speaking about another person, that we both know, and a job that they had just taken over from someone who had been in their position for almost 30 years as "head honcho" in their particular field. This other friend mentioned how for the past 3 years or so, this 30 year "veteran" had pretty much just sat back while everyone else was doing *his* job. Then we spoke of how all those people worked well together and had developed a

good "team mentality". So my question is, was this leader slacking off and just collecting a paycheck, or did they do what they were supposed to, by developing a team, teaching, instructing and then letting the team go on their way?

This week's readings speak oodles to me about our knowledge base, where we get it and how we use it. The first reading from the book of Wisdom (kind of apropos right?) tells us that our (fore)fathers knew of the Passover, the oaths made, the sacrifices met and knew how it pertained to them. Do we have a working knowledge of that first Passover and what it means to us today? Do we even see the direct ties to the more pertinent Passover, which we celebrate weekly? If we did, I do not think that we would "excuse ourselves" from weekly Mass for any reason!

We each gain knowledge in different ways: book learning, experiential knowledge, observational knowledge, some (few) can even reason their way into knowledge of a particular subject. We, as Christians, have knowledge of a different sort, a revealed knowledge, given to us by God. God also granted us His Grace of Faith, which is the ability to assent to the truth of His Word, even when we may not be able to prove it. Paul in his letter to the Hebrews spoke of Abraham's great faith, which grew his knowledge because of his trust in God's Word. Do we have that kind of trust in God? It is definitely hard, in this age of "prove it to me" and "scientific reason wins out over everything"; but God's ways are not our ways, and the Eternal Truth of God and His ways will never be disproven, even if we might never, in our limited understanding, be able to "prove" those Truths with human reason.

Jesus taught through parables (stories that taught a basic truth, often a moral and/or spiritual lesson). Peter, just like many of us, questions and tests those teachings, wondering if they were meant for everyone or for a select few. Jesus turns the tables, more often than not, on *any* questioner of a teaching, asking them a question in return which causes them to think about a simple story in more complex ways. These parables have been crafted in such a way, that a child (or even someone new to the Christian Faith) can be taught and learn a lesson from it, but then, even someone steeped in faith and knowledge can learn something new from the simple story that was posed. The key is, asking questions of the right individuals who can make us think and respond.

Back to my first story—that individual, who took over the position as "head honcho", had a great teacher and mentor, and was left with a good team, a good working organizational structure, a few manageable issues that can be easily rectified and a group of individuals that respect that leadership position. Isn't this *really* the mark of a good leader? Someone who can sneak out, and leave an organization to run on it's own, and really lend their knowledge and expertise to helping overcome obstacles vs "taking care of problems" daily? Someone who can use what they know to train that next individual to step in, relatively seamlessly, with very little shakeup? I can only hope to be there. This takes work from everyone involved, a willingness to learn, gain knowledge and use that knowledge in real world situations (wisdom). These are Gifts of the Holy Spirit that were bestowed on us at Baptism, and sealed into our very being at the Sacrament of Confirmation. Are we utilizing these gifts to the fullest, or did we stick them at the back of the top shelf of our life and close the closet door behind us?

There are many ways for each of us to grow, so explore what is being offered, share with others what is being offered, invite others to what is being offered. We often speak to our young disciples in Faith Formation and tell them that they will get more out of something if they invest just a bit more into it. Invest a little time to grow, in a group, on your own, at church, online, at the community center. Invest, and see what God does with your life. Do you need help knowing where to start? Ask! If you do not ask, we still cannot (though we keep trying) read minds. The more real requests that we hear for something, the more likely you will see something come to fruition. If you see a need, step up and let someone know (not through an *anonymous* e-mail, letter or survey) how we can do better, but also know that we will need your help because it is more than likely something that we either have not seen a need for or something that we do not know how to approach effectively (we are human beings too, God gave us free will and limited knowledge as well, just like everyone else out there!)

Thank you for allowing me to serve you (and often times torture you with my random thoughts and drivel). I hope to continue meeting more and more disciples on our journey, and please, let us know how we can help you!

Monday, August 12th, is the feast day of St. Jane Frances de Chantal, our patroness! She is the patron of forgotten people; in-law problems; loss of parents; parents separated from children, and widows. St. Jane Frances pray for us!
