Many of you are asking about choir and music programs as Fall arrives next month (Oh, it pains me to use that word, even though autumn is beautiful in Michigan.....). If you'd like to join us for any music program here at St. Jane, please come up and see me after Mass, drop off your name and contact information at the parish office, or join us at our choir 'after picnic' following the Parish Picnic on Sunday, September 15th. Adult Choir will continue with 9am mass on Sunday, warming up at 8:30am. Choir rehearsals are on Wednesdays from 7:00pm-8:30pm in the church. The first practice is on Wed., Sept. 25. As I wrote last week, we don't 'officially' meet in the summer for practice or church, but any choir member is invited to sing on Sunday, and they certainly have been showing up!

Instruments In Praise (you heard them last Sunday at 11:30am mass) is a small group which plays the first and third Saturdays of the month, and we rehearse prior to those masses at 2:45pm. (Although in September, due to Labor Day, the schedule is switched a little bit).

The Gospel Choir sings on the remaining Saturdays, usually the 2nd, 4th and 5th Saturdays of the month. Since gospel music is more 'feel' than rehearsed, we only rehearse periodically. Many of my gospel choir members have been with me since the 1980's so we sort of know how to sing together pretty well....but that doesn't mean we don't encourage new members....we do!

Bell Choir is led by choir member Fawn Kopas and you are welcome to contact her to join that group. Fawn also organizes the percussion sounds you hear and we can always use extra hands, literally. Contact the parish office with your name and phone number and we will pass your information to Fawn.

If you don't wish to make a full commitment and want to join us for Christmas only, that's fine too. All the groups come together for that great feast and there is room for everyone.

The Angels and Inspiration Music Series will be back, beginning with a holiday concert on Thursday, December 19, 2019, when The Judelaires will perform a return engagement at 7:00pm.

Last week I wrote how Christian Service is often thought of as being the "the hands and feet" of Jesus. It incorporates the Spiritual and Corporal Works of Mercy. I had shared information about the Spiritual Works of Mercy and this week I would like to elaborate on the Corporal Works of Mercy and share some practical suggestions for practicing the Corporal Works of Mercy.

The Corporal Works of Mercy

To feed the hungry; give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, visit the imprisoned; to shelter the homeless; visit the sick and bury the dead

How are you or can you incorporate these Works of Mercy in your life? During this next week, find ways to incorporate the Corporal Works of Mercy into your life. Spend some quiet time with Jesus, he will show you how...

Feed the Hungry

- See to the proper nutrition of your loved ones
- Support and volunteer for food pantries, soup kitchens, and agencies that feed the hungry
- ♦ Educate yourself about world hunger
- Avoid wasting food and share your meals with others

Shelter the Homeless

- Help neighbors care for their homes and do repairs
- Support and/or volunteer at a homeless shelter, build homes, and provide support in the wake of natural disasters
- Consider being a foster parent

Clothe the Naked

- Support the work of St. Vincent de Paul Society
- Go through your drawers and closets and find goodcondition clothes and shoes to donate
- Volunteer to work at a clothing drive or at a shelter where clothing is distributed to those in need

Visit the Sick

- Spend quality time with those who are sick or homebound
- ◆ Take the time to call, send a card or an email to someone who is sick
- Volunteer for the DENIS Connection
- Assist those who are fulltime caregivers for family members

Visit the Imprisoned

- Support and/or participate in ministries to those who are incarcerated or agencies that advocate on behalf of those who are unjustly imprisoned
- Support job-training and educational programs designed to rehabilitate prisoners (i.e. On the Rise Bakery)
- Support the abolition of the death penalty

Give to the Poor

- ♦ Take some small bills or loose change with you to hand out to people you encounter who are in need
- ◆ Throw your coin change into a jar and periodically donate it to a charity
- Make a regular monetary donation to a charity that tends to help the poor

Bury the Dead

- ♦ Be faithful about attending wakes/visitation
- Support or volunteer at a hospice
- Participate in a bereavement ministry
- ♦ Spend time with widows/widowers
- Take friends and relatives to visit the cemetery
- Send Mass cards to families of those who have died
- Offer daily prayers for those with terminal illnesses and for those who have died.

Catholic—what does this word mean to you? How often do you see it, hear it, say it? Are you Catholic or catholic? Both, one or the other, neither but want to explore more about it? Maybe you're asking yourself, "what in the world is he talking about?"

Catholicism is, to me, the Church of Christ in the world. The Church, begun the moment Jesus died on the cross. While Jesus was on Earth,

we didn't need a Church, because **the** Christ was right before us, but when He died, we needed the connection to God through the Church. Jesus came back to help kick-start the Church and Her Mission of spreading God's Word to the nations, but He really just laid it all out there for the Apostles and Disciples to get their rears in gear to go further than one man (even though He was God) could go.

To be catholic (note the small "c" at the beginning of the word) is to be "universal". This is quite the hard topic to write about because it seems that so many people have a different understanding of what the word "universal" means! The Nicene Creed that we *proclaim* at Mass (that's right, it's a statement of BELIEF, not *just* something that we read, not necessarily a prayer, although it *can* be prayed) is proclaimed by different denominations of the Christian faithful, at their services. If you look at the front of our hymnals, and most official printings of the Creed, towards the bottom, the word catholic is written just like that, with a small "c" (some "Wiki-" pages and personal websites capitalize it, but those are not official printings of the Creed). This being "catholic" is one of the four marks of the Christian faith, that of universality.

Does this mean that anything goes? There are no "regulations" in the universality of faith? Absolutely not. We abide by certain rules. We adhere to certain beliefs. Jesus Christ came to Earth and died for me, for you, for each and every one of us: Christian, Muslim, Buddhist, Hindu, etc. It is up to my our own free will(s) to look at this statement, research it actively (not passively), find answers to our questions and believe or not believe. Regardless of our personal understanding and belief, there is an objective reality to this eternal truth. This means that the truth of God (and therefore His Word, Jesus) does not depend on my, or anyone else's, belief. It simply IS. This is part of the universality of faith.

This week's Gospel encourages us to, "Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough." (Lk 13:24). St. Paul wrote, "...do not disdain the discipline of the Lord or lose heart when reproved by him; for whom the Lord loves, he disciplines;" We are but human beings, flawed and limited by our flesh and blood, but redeemed but the Flesh and Blood of the Messiah. A simple yet complex truth that can encourage as well as discourage. This is part of the <u>catholic nature</u> of our Catholic Church.

My search has been circuitous. It has gone around (a few times) but comes back to the simple truth of Catholicism. No matter what mankind does, Jesus Loves us, encourages us and welcomes us back—all we have to do is ask. Welcome to being Catholic.

LETTER OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS TO PRIESTS: Encouragement & Mother Mary

How can we speak about gratitude and encouragement without looking to Mary? She, the woman whose heart was pierced (cf. *Lk* 2:35), teaches us the praise capable of lifting our gaze to the future and restoring hope to the present. Her entire life was contained in her song of praise (cf. *Lk* 1:46-55). We too are called to sing that song as a promise of future fulfilment.

Whenever I visit a Marian shrine, I like to spend time looking at the Blessed Mother and letting her look at me. I pray for a childlike trust, the trust of the poor and simple who know that their mother is there, and that they have a place in her heart. And in looking at her, to hear once more, like the Indian Juan Diego: "My youngest son, what is the matter? Do not let it disturb your heart. Am I not here, I who have the honor to be your mother?"

To contemplate Mary is "to believe once again in the revolutionary nature of love and tenderness. In her, we see that humility and tenderness are not virtues of the weak but of the strong, who need not treat others poorly in order to feel important themselves".

Perhaps at times our gaze can begin to harden, or we can feel that the seductive power of apathy or self-pity is about to take root in our heart. Or our sense of being a living and integral part of God's People begins to weary us, and we feel tempted to a certain elitism. At those times, let us not be afraid to turn to Mary and to take up her song of praise.

Perhaps at times we can feel tempted to withdraw into ourselves and our own affairs, safe from the dusty paths of daily life. Or regrets, complaints, criticism and sarcasm gain the upper hand and make us lose our desire to keep fighting, hoping and loving. At those times, let us look to Mary so that she can free our gaze of all the "clutter" that prevents us from being attentive and alert, and thus capable of seeing and celebrating Christ alive in the midst of his people. And if we see that we are going astray, or that we are failing in our attempts at conversion, then let us turn to her like a great parish priest from my previous diocese, who was also a poet. He asked her, with something of a smile: "This evening, dear Lady my promise is sincere; but just to be sure, don't forget to leave the key outside the door". Our Lady "is the friend who is ever concerned that wine not be lacking in our lives. She is the woman whose heart was pierced by a sword and who understands all our pain. As mother of all, she is a sign of hope for peoples suffering the birth pangs of justice... As a true mother, she walks at our side, she shares our struggles and she constantly surrounds us with God's love".
