Fr. T's Tidbits: Second week of Advent

In this second week of Advent John the Baptist plays a prominent role in the life and ministry of Jesus. John is often referred to as the precursor of Jesus. The definition of precursor is forerunner, forbearer or trailblazer. In reading the Scriptures that pertain to John the Baptist any one of those terms would be appropriate for John. John was indeed a trailblazer making people aware that one more powerful than he (John) was to come.

This Advent season affords us the opportunity to be like John and tell our stories of faith and our spiritual journey. Advent is one of those times that the Church encourages us to see how God is present in our daily life but more importantly to share those experiences of God's presence with those people who are a part of our life

or who enter into our journey for a short time. We all have a story to tell and there are people who want to hear our story.

One of the materials I use every Advent season is what has become known as the, "the little blue book". The little blue book contains writings or reflections by Bishop Ken Untener. These little six minute reflections allows us to center our attention on the season of Advent in the midst of our busy life and Christmas preparations. I would encourage you to pick up an Advent book in the gathering space and spend that six minutes a day reflecting upon the scripture verse, the reflection and the prayer at the bottom of each page.

Whatever prayer form you use throughout this season of Advent may it prepare you to celebrate the great Feast of Christmas. This is a time for us to step back from our busy schedules and focus our attention on God and the many ways in which He reveals and shows Himself to us on a day to day basis.

Many people have asked, what is the meaning of Carpe Diem? It is Latin for "seize the day". I began using the term after I saw the movie: The Dead Poet Society. It is a reminder for us to see God's hand in our work, our play and our interaction with each other. As we journey through this season of Advent, may we seize each day and each moment as a gift from God knowing that He loves us and cares for us!

May we keep in our prayers the men and women who are serving in the military! May God protect them and their families! Let us also remember those women and men who will be away from their families this Christmas season that they may be united in spirit with their loved ones.

Our readings today speak of peace, beginning with Isaiah. Isaiah pairs a lot of incompatible animals in his vision of the future kingdom, from wolves with lambs to cows with bears, culminating with the child and the snake. The picture painted by Isaiah brings to mind Eden before the fall of humanity. The "shoot shall sprout from the stump of Jesse" (Isaiah 11:1) is fulfilled in Jesus; Isaiah tells us he will be just and faithful. His justice will result in harmony among all the inhabitants

of the earth. It is interesting that Isaiah's lion will no longer want to eat the ox, he will eat hay with the ox. His nature will be one of peaceable co-existence, leaving behind the aggression needed to survive.

Paul echoes this thought when hoping that the Romans will "think in harmony with one another" (Romans 15:5). He draws people to the church from all backgrounds, from all cultures, and from all nations, so he does not expect that they all think alike or behave the same way. But he prays that all may think, act, and work in harmony so that they all may be one in Jesus. Many backgrounds, one accord. Many languages, one voice.

Finally, in the Gospel reading, John the Baptist does not give us visions of peace and harmony; he speaks harshly to the Pharisees and Sadducees, accusing them of insincerity and presumption. He called them to repentance, demanding that they "produce good fruit as evidence" (Matthew 3:8). This would be a good lesson for all of us. Repentance means nothing if we do nothing. We are called to bear fruit—in our workplaces, our communities, and our world—to bring about the kingdom John so eagerly anticipates.

As we begin this second week of Advent, let us focus on peace and harmony. Prepare the way of the Lord in your own life. What can you do to bring harmony to those in your life, your family, your neighborhood, the world? Peace, Laurie

In this spirit of Advent, are you sharing the Gospel? Are you being a witness? Where are you willing to share the Gospel? With your family, friends, the person in the line at the store? How do you share the Gospel? It can be as simple as a "God Bless You," or "Have a Blessed Day" or so much more...

A way of sharing the gospel is the "Kerygma". According to Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron in Unleash the Gospel, "The 'Kerygma' is the New Testament word for the simple, radical, countercultural and joyful message of the Gospel—that 'initial ardent proclamation by which a person is one day overwhelmed and brought to the decision to entrust himself to Jesus Christ by faith."

The Kerygma Explained:

God loves you personally and has a plan for your life.

God created us out of love—we are a free creation of his goodness. The original plan was perfect happiness with Him.

Sin separates you from God.

Man said no to this plan. He rebelled against God by being deceived by the Evil One. When sin entered the world, it separated humanity from God. Redemption was necessary in order to make eternal life with God possible.

Jesus died on the cross to atone for your sins. This makes heaven possible for you.

However, God did not leave us in sin, and He responded to our infidelity with his fidelity. Christmas is God sending His Son to offer His life for our sins and to rob sin and death of its power. Jesus is the answer to sin and all of its effects.

Jesus is inviting you to accept His gift of salvation.

Through Baptism, we share in His victory over sin. We share in His identity (because He took on our flesh and was not ashamed to be called our brother). He gives us the power to live as His disciples; to be free!

Do you want to accept that gift and follow Him as a disciple?

Being Jesus' disciple changes our identity. We are claimed by God and are then co-heirs with Christ of eternal, perfect, almost-incomprehensible joy in heaven.

In reflecting on the Kerygma, we need to remind ourselves and share with others of the life-changing call of Jesus.

How have you encountered Christ and how has it changed you? Why do you follow Christ? Have you accepted His gift of salvation? Do you follow Him as a disciple? What does this mean in your life? Can you share with others?

As we approach Christmas, Advent gives us the time to reflect on the true meaning of Christmas and the greatest gift of all. Take the time to reflect and open yourself to His love...

Health Ministry Hepatitis A Vaccination

Hepatitis A (HepA) is a highly contagious liver infection caused by the Hepatitis A virus (HAV). It can range in severity from a mild illness lasting a few weeks to a severe illness lasting several months and can result in liver failure and death. Since August 2016, there has been an increase incidence of Hep A in Michigan, with 905 cases reported. Eighty percent of these people required hospitalization, and 28 have died.

Symptoms of HepA include fever, vomiting, grey-colored stools, fatigue, abdominal pain, joint pain, loss of appetite, nausea, dark urine and jaundice. However, not everyone who has HepA feels or looks sick and can still spread the disease. HepA is spread through contact with the stool of an infected person. This can happen easily if someone does not wash his or her hands properly after using the bathroom, or after changing the diaper of an infected person. Hepatitis A also can be spread through contaminated food or water. Contamination of food can happen at any point: growing, harvesting, processing, handling, and even after cooking.

The best way to prevent HepA is to get vaccinated. HepA vaccination is an inactivated (killed) vaccine. You will need 2 doses, given at least 6 months apart, for long-lasting protection. Children are routinely vaccinated between their first and second birthdays (12 through 23 months of age). But Hepatitis A vaccine was not routinely given before 1996, so many adults are not immunized. It is also recommended to wash your hands well with soap and water after going to the bathroom, and when preparing meals, or eating. Use your own towels, toothbrushes, and eating utensils. Do not have sex with someone who has HAV infection or share food, drinks, or smokes with other people.

Our New Year has begun. Like many New Years (in January) we are filled with Hope as we were reminded last weekend when we celebrated the first week of Advent, but where do we see Hope, when we are surrounded in negativity, surrounded by the (oftentimes) upsetting 24 hour news cycle? Encompassed by injury, death, bad news, natural disaster, human beings out to hurt others in the name of a "god"?

This past week, I was at a breakfast gathering with my family, where an aunt and uncle brought their 4 month old grand-daughter. In the restaurant, talk ranged from Christmas (ribbing one another about gifts, past and future) to the earthquake in Albania last week. Through this, my cousin's daughter sat in her car seat, smiling, peeking, waving her arms, smiling more and looking intently at different voices from around the table. Amid all the discussion and chatter, a tiny little face, amazed by voices and vocal intonations. As adults, do we ever stop and listen, or do we feel compelled to be part of the conversation?

Hopelessness can creep up on us just like these days that are getting darker longer, but there is no "natural cycle" to bring us out of this internal darkness. We must look to the "little things" like the face of a new child experiencing so many "firsts" in their life. We have to look to others and soak in some of the happiness that they are going through but most of all we have to learn about, and rest in, the PEACE that Christ's life, death and resurrection brings to each of us. Mercy, forgiveness, compassion towards me and everyone, even when (especially when) we deserve it the least. We rest in PEACE knowing of the forgiveness of our sins, when we approach God with a contrite (a remorseful) heart, which means we know we did wrong, we don't want to do this wrong again and we want to do our best to make up for this wrong that we have done.

Look towards our traditions as signs of Hope and Peace. Each week, a new candle is added and lit to our "evergreen" wreath. A reminder that life and goodness still exists in the darkness that we experience and week by week, we get brighter and brighter, until we reach the point that happiness and peace are easier to see, and the days get brighter. Look to the Good of things, put negativity aside. Share the good that you feel with someone who may not be able to pull themselves from a dark funk. Empty your good onto others, so that God may fill you all the more with His Hope and Peace, so that you may be His hands, feet and body in the world.


