The traditional day to celebrate Epiphany is January 6th. This year we celebrate on January 5th, as it falls on a Sunday. Falling twelve days after Christmas, this was regarded as enough time for the Magi to travel to Bethlehem from foreign lands to pay homage to the newborn King. With their arrival, Jesus is now made known to the outside world. Just as the star in the East symbolized the light of Christ shining for the whole world to see, we are called to show Christ in our lives so others can realize the Good News wherever we go.

We might ask ourselves today: To whom do I pay homage? Are they worthy of my respect?

EPIPHANY BLESSING

"Chalking the door" is a way to celebrate and literally mark the occasion of the Epiphany and God's blessing of our lives and home. With time the chalk will fade. As it does we let the meaning of the symbols written sink into the depths of our heart and be manifest in our words and actions the Latin words, *Christus mansionem benedictat*, "May Christ bless the house." A traditional way of doing this is to use chalk to write above the home's entrance, 20 + C + M + B + 20. The letters C, M, B have two meanings. They are the initials of the traditional names of the three magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar. They also abbreviate the Latin words *Christus mansionem benedicat*, "May Christ bless this house." The "+" signs represent the cross and 2020 is the year.

BLESSING THE CHALK

- V. Our help is the name of the Lord:
- R. The maker of heaven and earth.
- V. The Lord shall watch over your going out and your coming in:
- R. From this time forth for evermore. Let us pray.

Loving God, bless this chalk which you have created, that it may be helpful to your people; and grant that through the invocation of your most Holy Name that we who use it in faith to write upon the door of our home the names of your holy ones Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar, may receive health (of body and protection of soul for all who) dwell in or visit our home; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR BLESSING THE HOME

Using the blessed chalk mark the lintel of your front door (or front porch step) as follows:

20 + C + M + B + 20 while saying:

The three Wise Men, Caspar, Melchior, and Balthazar followed the star of God's Son who became human two thousand and twenty years ago. May Christ bless our home and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

Then offer the following prayer:

Visit, O blessed Lord, this home with the gladness of your presence. Bless all who live or visit here with the gift of your love; and grant that we may manifest your love to each other and to all whose lives we touch. May we grow in grace and in the knowledge and love of you; guide, comfort, and strengthen us in peace, O Jesus Christ, now and forever. Amen.

U.S. Federal law defines human trafficking as labor—or the exchange of sexual acts for something of value—under conditions of **force**, **fraud or coercion**.

The legal umbrella encompasses a tragic array of victims:

- An Asian woman promised a high-paying job in the U.S. but instead trapped in domestic servitude
- A homeless person trading sex for food and shelter
- Traveling crews selling magazine subscriptions to benefit questionable charities and not being fed until they meet daily quotas
- A woman who stays with her pimp because he threatens to harm her child or family member
- A runaway from an abusive home who is forced to commit crime for food or shelter

Trafficking victimization has many faces. They're individuals whose lives offer so few choices that relinquishing control over body and future becomes a plausible option. The traffickers seems to be the best available resource for supplying shelter and food, ensuring safety, providing emotional connections and offering a sense of worth. These often lead to exploitive, abusive and dangerous relationships.



The Three Gifts Code

When the three wise men visited baby Jesus, they brought him three gifts. They were gold, frankincense, and myrrh. Each gift represented something special about Jesus. Using the picture clues, figure out what each gift meant.

Epiphany—even strangers that didn't even necessarily worship God, recognized Jesus as someone very special, even when they found Him in a stable. You'd expect a King to be in a palace! To be born in a stable meant that you really didn't have much more than a few pennies to your name. These biblical times were not exactly "customer service oriented". If I came in, saw the inn was full, and offered more than someone else, often times the innkeeper would

boot the person with less money out. All someone needed was to have more money than another person.

These Magi, wisemen from the East, traveled quite a distance and even spoke with the King of Judea—Herod about a newborn King (logical right), but they trusted their signs and followed the star to the baby Jesus, even to a meager stable, and if not a stable, certainly not a palace! Do I have that level of faith? That is quite amazing that these wise, learned people would contemplate such a humble child, in very humble accommodations, to be so important as to lavish upon the family such expensive gifts.

In our lives we are asked to trust God, and put Him first. Attend Mass weekly, receive the Eucharist regularly to strengthen us, and to simply be good to others, for *their* good, not because "I need to get service hours" or because "I" feel good doing these things for *them*. Yet we (I am included in this we) tend to make other things our "idols" of worship. When we listen to God, and His Word (Jesus), we are filled with amazing amounts of His Grace, but to really feel that Grace, we must pass it on to others, often through a little bit of travel and putting ourselves out. When we do this, we open up our lives to receiving even more of His Grace.

As we wrap-up this Christmas season, and spend seven weeks in "ordinary time", let's work at the extra-ordinary task of putting God first and treating our neighbors like ourselves, so that these become part of our Ordinary Lives. I'll see you as we journey the road towards Lent!
