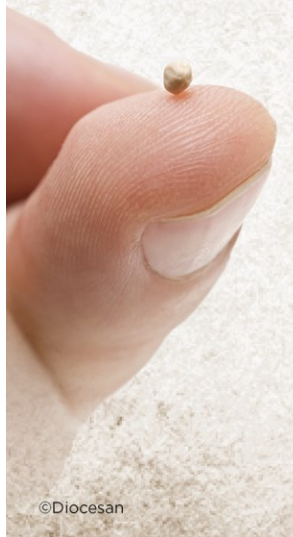

Fr. T's Tidbits: Options

As of late, we have seen many envelopes in the bulletin for what is commonly known as a second collection. As you are aware we do not take a second collection at St. Jane Frances de Chantal. We do provide the envelope and we let you decide if you wish to give to this organization or not.

What you may not know is that some of the "second collections" are worldwide or taken up throughout the United States. Let me say from the onset that these are all worthwhile causes however it can seem to be a bit overwhelming at times. As the pastor of St. Jane Frances de Chantal I do not have the option to pick and choose what envelope is put in the bulletin. The Archdiocese of Detroit makes the decision.

I can only give you the option as to which "second collection envelope" you wish to respond to, if you wish to respond at all. On a personal note I make my contributions to St. Jane Frances de Chantal Parish. Whether that be through the Catholic Services Appeal, the Christmas collection, or the weekly collection, it is earmarked to the parish. That is the option that I choose. In supporting the parish we support the good work that the parish does within the parish and community of Sterling Heights.

I wish to thank you for your generosity to the parish. It is through your weekly support that we as members of St. Jane Frances de Chantal have a parish that is well maintained with a wonderful staff who are good stewards of the resources that we have.

Today, on Respect Life Sunday, we hear Jesus use the image of the mustard seed. The mustard seed is tiny—not much larger than a grain of sand—but when it is planted and nurtured, it grows into a large, strong tree. It takes time, though. All of us were once the size of a mustard seed, but now, loved and nurtured, we have grown in body, soul, and spirit.

Our faith is just like that. Faith, even just the size of a mustard seed, can go a long way. It allows Habakkuk to withstand destruction and violence. It allows Paul to bear imprisonment and encourage Timothy to face his share of hardships. It allows the disciples to serve the Lord, often without understanding his ways.

Seeds are a great image for our faith. A gardener plants seeds in the spring, nurtures the shoots by watering and weeding and fertilizing, tends them throughout the summer, allowing them to flower, then harvests their fruit in the fall. Within each one of us are seeds that were planted before we were born: seeds of kindness and courage, generosity and patience, faith, hope, and love. Do we nurture and care for these seeds? How do we nurture the seeds within us? Nurturing requires attention and action. We nurture the seeds of virtue by exercising those virtues. We exercise kindness and generosity through acts of care and charity. We exercise courage when we stand up for what we believe in when it's easier not to. We exercise faith by placing our trust in God.

Listening to the readings today, let us reflect on how our own faith has allowed us to overcome difficulties and pray for the grace to realize its strength. Throughout this week, consider this: Which seeds have I nurtured? Which seeds will I make the effort to nurture now?



Worship & Music



Here's some fun: I'd like to invite you to come up after Mass sometime and take a closer look at the organ and the pipes so you can see the 'business end' of what makes up our beautiful music every week.

Most people have never seen the *other* side of the organ before....they just see the wooden back, with my head sticking up over the music stand. When they see it as I do, they're amazed at what's there. I was too, the first time I caught a glimpse, at age 16. Fortunately, I was mentored by a very talented Music Minister, Richard Vestuto, at St. Rita's in Detroit, in 1972. Richard taught me the fundamentals of both organ and liturgy and it has served me well. As you may have read in my Bio, I had studied piano from ages 7 until 14 so had keyboard basics under my belt....but not the organ, a totally different animal.

Back at St. Basil's, Greg, a parishioner, sound technician, and musician himself came up to speak with me one day (he always called me Maestro). I was finishing the last song and he patiently stood in front of the organ. I motioned for him to come around on my side. He took one look and gasped, "What IS all that?" He'd never seen an organist in action before, from behind.

Here is a short snippet of what is there: two keyboards (I've played on five before), a pedal keyboard for my feet, more foot fun with a pedal for swell shades (those are the shutters you see move in the middle of the pipes) that control volume, and a crescendo pedal that puts the organ at full capacity, stops for both keyboards, which mimic various sounds of instruments; couplers, which add higher or lower octaves of what I am already playing, other couplers which transfer sounds from keyboard to keyboard or pedal, an instant transposer so I can change keys easily, and pistons where I can preset certain sounds all together. Greg was astounded when I told him that each hand can play a different melody, my foot yet another, my other foot tempers the volume, my hands are also fussing with stops, changing them in mid-song and I am turning pages and singing as well. Add to that directing the choir, monitoring sound, watching Father Tony, noting the processions, timing the music to finish at the right time, and getting the next song ready to go so I don't miss my cue!

I heard that some PhD or cerebral doctor said that it is impossible for the brain to multi-task. Hmm, I beg to differ. I give you....the Music Minister!!! Truth is, if I stopped to think of what all I was doing, I'd say 'that's impossible!'

Respect Life Reflection

Christ Our Hope: In Every Season of Life

From the time we are knit together in our mothers' wombs until we take our final breaths, each moment of our lives is a gift from God. While every season of life brings its own challenges and trials, each season also gives us new opportunities to grow in our relationship with God.

Today the gift of life is threatened in countless ways. Those who are most vulnerable, rather than receiving the protection they deserve, are all too often seen as a burden and as expendable. As new attacks on human life continue to emerge, we can be tempted to despair, but Christ instead offers us unfailing hope.

“Hold fast to the hope that lies before us. This we have as an anchor of the soul, sure and firm.”
Hebrews 6:18-19

Hope is not false optimism or empty positivity. Christian hope is something much more profound and goes to the very depths of our identity as followers of Christ.

Hope is the virtue “by which we desire the kingdom of heaven and eternal life as our happiness, placing our trust in Christ's promises and relying not on our own strength, but on the help of the grace of the Holy Spirit” (CCC, 1817).

Like us, Christ entered the world through the womb of a woman. He willingly experienced the fullness of human suffering. He breathed his last on the Cross at Calvary in order that He might save us. Therefore, “God is the foundation of hope: not any god, but the God who has a human face and who has loved us to the end” (*Spesalvi* 31).

Christians know “they have a future: it is not that they know the details of what awaits them, but they know in general terms that their life will not end in emptiness” (SS 2).

For this reason, a woman experiencing a difficult pregnancy can find the strength to welcome her precious child into the world. A man facing a terminal diagnosis can see that the end of his earthly life is only the beginning of eternal life with Christ.

The Church teaches us that “the one who has hope lives differently” (SS 2). Christ's promise of salvation does not mean that we will be spared from suffering. Rather, the promise of salvation ensures that even in the darkest moments of our lives, we will be given the strength to persevere. By virtue of this Christian hope, we can face any challenge or trial. When the seas of life swell and we are battered by the waves, hope allows us to remain anchored in the heart of God. May we hold fast to Christ our hope, from the beginning of life to its very end.

Some people are called into the academic life, some are called to be executives, some are called into the trades; Some are called to raise families and some are called to forego raising a family for the sake of others. Each and every one of us are called in a distinctive unique way. The question that I have this week is: "Am I listening?"

This past weekend, I was at a conference at a neighboring parish. I did not know the keynote speakers (who they were or what they were about or even where they were from), but because I knew the committee putting on the conference, I attended, with an open mind to hear the message that was to be presented over those two days. Stories were told, examples given, community was formed, rest was had, and all in all—I had a very good experience! The key here, was having a little faith in the people that I know, and opening my mind and heart (oh boy, is he getting mushy now?) to the possibility, the chance, of being changed.

The word faith is used in many contexts. The way in which I am using it today is kind of a compounded understanding (according to Merriam Webster at least...)

"firm belief in something for which there is no proof"
 and
"fidelity to one's promises"

These are ways that we do not just put faith in others, but ask others to put into us.

We are NOT a very trusting society! We used to be, but people in power would abuse that power, whether of their own volition or not and each of us is left with a broken sense of trust. It is hard (if not darn near impossible) to trust, once our trust has been broken. We are told in this week's Gospel reading, "Increase (y)our faith" - Luke 17:5. The Good News then goes on and explains the power of even the smallest amount of faith. Faith in an object or in a living breathing being today, can go wrong. But our faith when directed properly, towards the Supreme Creator can never go wrong. This is the very nature of immutable, eternal Truth. All of our decisions *need* to be ordered with God at the top of the list, *NOT* ourselves! We, our "immediate happiness" can be on the list, it just needs to be further down than where "I" *want* it to be.

Where is God on your list? I am a human being, and my list (for sooo long) has been ordered improperly. I put God at the top, but "I" creep in and up. Each of us is there, and each of us can work on it, so—I ask for your help. I will help you, when I see and hear that desire. My greatest inspiration in the world today, is little children. Their joy and unbridled Love. Let's together, stop making excuses, and listen to our Father in faith, who loves us immensely!



ABOUT THE GOSPEL:

In Sunday's Gospel, Jesus tells the Parable of the Mustard Seed. When his Apostles ask for an increase of faith, Jesus encourages them to trust that the faith they have is strong and pleasing to God.

IN CHURCH:

QUESTIONS FOR THE WEEK:

- ◆ What is "faith"? Look it up and see if it matches your definition.

- ◆ According to Jesus, how much faith is enough?

FAMILY PRAYER:

Lord, help our family to love you more each day. May we live like you. Amen.

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOURSELF NEXT WEEK, IN PREPARATION FOR MASS:

- ◆ Who cares for you when you are sick? Do you thank them for their care?
- ◆ What are different ways that we are healed each day?
- ◆ Who do you care for? Why do you take care of them?

Our Lady of the Rosary

Saint Pius V established this feast in 1573. The purpose was to thank God for the victory of Christians over the Turks at Lepanto—a victory attributed to the praying of the rosary. Clement XI extended



the feast to the universal Church in 1716. The development of the rosary has a long history. First a practice developed of praying 150 Our Fathers in imitation of the 150 Psalms. Then there was a parallel practice of praying 150 Hail Marys. Soon a mystery of Jesus' life was attached to each Hail Mary. Though Mary's giving of the rosary to Saint Dominic is recognized as a legend, the development of this prayer form owes much to the followers of Saint Dominic. One of them, Alan de la Roche, was known as "the apostle of the rosary." He founded the first Confraternity of the Rosary in the 15th century. In the 16th century, the rosary was developed to its present form—with the 15 mysteries: joyful, sorrowful and glorious. In 2002, Pope John Paul II added five Mysteries of Light to this devotion.—Franciscan Media
